Later that week, Battambangborn artist, Oeur Sokuntevy opened her second exhibition at Java Café and Gallery. Entitled 'Something in the Signs' Sokuntevy created sculptures to represent the twelve characters of the Cambodian signs. The exhibition, curated by Ali Sanderson, represented a return to form for the young artist who promised so much in her debut exhibition, also at Java, in December 2006, but whose subsequent exhibitions have disappointed.

The artist, herself, is very down-to-earth when talking about her artistic process. "I like to keep it simple and experiment," she says. "These sculptures basically come from playing around with different materials creating artworks through trial and error."

#### DOMESTIC RUGBY SEASON CONCLUDES

The 2008 domestic rugby season reached a fine climax on Apr. 6 at Phnom Penh's Old Stadium. In the men's senior final, the PSE Garudas - featuring several members of last year's Cambodian national men's rugby team - used their superior speed to defeat Stade Khmer, 31-12.

In the women's final, the Scorpions edged the Happy Girls 5 - 0, while in the under-20 men's final, Lycee Rene Descartes blanked the Kangaroos, 17 - 0. The younger age groups also featured competitive finals, with Sarika prevailing over Tonsay Prey, 7 - 0 in the under-17 boys, while in the under-14s, the Cats outlasted the Spiders 25 - 15. In a special women's touch competition the Lycee Rene Descartes overcame Neary 5 - 0.

Cambodian Federation of Rugby Secretary General, Philippe Monnin, praised the teams who participated in this year's domestic competition. "Since January, we have been playing every week without rest, organising 156 games, including thirteen senior 15-a-side

matches'" he said. "It was difficult because of the short schedule and I thank all who were involved for their hard work and patience."

The Cambodian men's national side, the Koupreys, will play Laos in Vientiane on Jun. 1 in the first in a two test series for the Mekong Cup. In mid-June the Federation Cup – a seven-a-side tournament for all junior teams will take place and on Jul. 12 and 19. Finally there will be two test matches in Jakarta against Laos and Indonesia in the Asian 5 Nations Regional Division.

The winner of a number of awards, including the 2005 The Photo Review's Annual Competition, Rouse began his photographic career at the age of 16. His work has been described as a "surreal world ruled by the ruthless logic of dreams, where dark forces wrestle with ethereal beauties amid the ruins of hybrid civilisations."

Narisara Murray, curator of the McDermott Gallery, said the artist was selected for his "very powerful vision and unique technique in digital manipulation, combining objects with the people he shoots." Rouse's works are displayed on the first two floors of the gallery and the exhibition will continue for two months.

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## Storyboard Phnom PenhLIFE Pop Idols Streetsmart Phnom PenhLIFE Carry on smiling

Be it a cleft palate, surviving the tsunami or facing a blank canvas, Australian artist and secretary of Operation Smile, Fleur Childs believes that every experience can bring inspiration. Words by **Anita Surewicz.** 

FLEUR CHILDS HAS LIVED in Cambodia for the past 18 months. In this time she has not only managed to create and exhibit art, but has also become actively involved in numerous voluntary projects. As the Secretary of the Board of Directors of Operation Smile, Fleur facilitates missions by foreign medical staff to Cambodia, as well as promoting the organisation and its work.

Considering herself fortunate to be involved in activities she feels passionate about, she recalls one moment last year. "I was working around the clock on Operation Smile's 25th anniversary mission and at the same time I was frantically putting the finishing touches on some canvases for a group show. I was living on a few hours of sleep a night and it hit me that for not one minute did it feel like hard work."

#### FLEUR AND HER ART

She discovers her artistic inspiration from everyday life. "I believe that every experience leaves its mark on us and influences us," she says. "Be it a visit to a great gallery, a chance encounter, a trauma or a moment of great joy."

Whether working in oils, charcoal, pencil or even collage, it is portraiture that Fleur ultimately returns to.

"People fascinate me," she says. "Something as simple as somebody's posture or a few of their wrinkles can tell you so much about them and the world."

Having run workshops to promote contemporary art in Cambodia, Fleur is excited about the next generation of emerging artists in this country.

"I've had the chance to meet a few contemporary Khmer artists that are really leading the way in here, not expats," she says. "Hope-

terms of art practice here, including [Leang] Seckon and [Pich] Sopheap," she says. "They have been a great inspiration."

However, she is realistic of the role that as an international artist she can play in the development of contemporary art in Cambodia. "It will be Khmer artists that define what contemporary art becomes here, not expats," she says. "Hope-

fully we can participate in the dialogue and inspire each other."

#### A CATHARTIC EXPERIENCE

Perhaps her most significant artistic experience has nothing to do with either Australia or Cambodia.

Recalling the day she survived the 2004 tsunami in Sri Lanka, Fleur says that her most memorable exhibition also doubled as a therapeutic experience. "Showing large oil on canvas portraits of myself nearly drowning in the Boxing Day tsunami was a very cathartic experience," she explains.

#### OPERATION SMILE

Fleur's face lights up as she talks about the work of Operation Smile Cambodia.

In existence for over 25 years and with foundations in 26 coun-

tries, Operation Smile was formed in Cambodia six years ago. Since then it has given free medical reconstructive surgery to over a thousand children and young adults. "The programme also provides free medical training to Cambodian medical students and practitioners," she points out.

Born with a cleft lip and cleft palate, Fleur felt an instant passion for the project.

"I stood there in medical scrubs watching a little child receive the same surgery that had once changed my life," she explains. "It was a big moment for me and since then I've been proud to volunteer as a spokesperson and honoured to serve as a board member. We have only just started and there are so many more lives that can be changed forever."

#### THE FUTURE

To date Operation Smile has only operated in Phnom Penh, Siem Reap and Battambang, Fleur explains that there are moves to go north and south in 2008 and 2009. The organisation also plans to open a care centre in Phnom Penh where children can receive year-round care and comprehensive post-operative care.

Fleur the artist also has plans for 2008. Having exhibited in both Western Australia and Sydney, she tries to have a solo exhibition at least once a year. This October she will exhibit two series of portraits at Java Art Café in Phnom Penh.

"The portraits will be the culmination of about twelve months of work and before that exhibition even begins I should be halfway through working on my next series," says the workaholic artist.

## Pop Idols

While Dengue Fever grips the west coast of America, back home in Phnom Penh, the local music scene is really taking off. Charis Shafer talks with two rappers, a DJ and a rock band.

#### THE DREAMER

Rapper Poukhlaing is an educator. He believes his brand of soulful, lyric-inspired lines will update the population of Cambodia about what is going on in the world of music outside the country. "It's going to catch the teenagers up to hip hop," he says of his most recent album. His love for the country he left when he was young is apparent in one of his most popular hits, "Save the Khmer Music." To him, it is a love song to the culture and the people of Cambodia. He has also begun to incorporate more traditional Khmer music into his songs. Of his fans, he hopes they will enjoy living, but start thinking about the future. In his song, "Because I'm drunk," he describes all the idiotic things that could happen while drinking. He is not advocating a dry Cambodia, but encourages fans to enjoy themselves while being responsible. After suffering a long time, Cambodian youths are finally ready to do that, Poukhlaing asserts. "They just want to live more than anything else right now." One of his motivations for "making it" in Cambodia, is that he wants his daughter Emily, who is currently in the U.S., to be proud of her dad when she comes to Cambodia.

#### THE IT GIRL

Adda has just released her first album called New Generation. She can hear herself everywhere. "Teenagers have my songs on their ring tones," she laughs. Her inspiration is talking with other teens and then using their stories in her songs. She has widened her fan base by touring the country, organised by Suzuki. Having appeared on numerous Khmer-language television shows, she gets lots of press over her style. With a gleaming gem in one tooth, her new asymmetrical bob and characteristic heels, she is the picture of Cambodia's hip set. She recently was on the InStyle show on TV3 discussing her particular look. "I like free style," she says taking as much liberty with her English as she does with

her look. "They call me up and ask me where I bought this or that," she says of her fans. "I don't know where the hell I got it from," she says smiling. She may not know where it came from, but she certainly has it.

#### THE LONER

DJ Illest likes to keep busy. He regularly DJs in Phnom Penh at Riverhouse Lounge, but finds time to skip off to Bangkok to play at Qbar there with occasional stops in Singapore. From commercial music to old school, this French-raised DJ has made a name for himself in his native land. How does he set himself apart? "The way I make myself different is using turntables," he says. Though vinyl can be difficult to use, DJ Illest still sticks by it. He uses the records and records them to mp3s, which he

#### THE REBEL

Sam Pety is the leader of the pack. The band Coconut, who recently supported Stacie Orrico at the qb concert at the Olympic Stadium, has been together since 2006 when a group of Royal University of Fine Arts classmates got together and began to play. The club, Spark needed someone to play and the group stepped in. "Then we wanted to produce new songs," Sam says. "We convinced Spark to build a studio." Bringing a new sound to Cambodia has

not been easy. With influences like Limp Biskit, Linkin Park, Korn and Hillary Duff, it is not hard to see why there was a disconnect with a Khmer audience. Sam is positive. "Now, it's beginning," he says. Sam waxes on about rock versus pop. Pop songs talk about love, he reports and rock talks about people enjoying themselves. The band has been touring around Cambodia. "Sometimes they don't understand - they wonder, 'what kind of songs are these?" he says. But his persistence has paid off. "Now, we have got successful." Coconut has just released its third album, 'Try to Wipe Away the Tears' which he says is very popular now. The title track is about love and betrayal. Though with their recent success, it seems Coconut has nothing to cry about. A

## Streetsmart: Tuol Kork

Tuol Kork is on the rise. This area in northwest Phnom Penh, once best known for its karaoke bars, is gentrifying fast. The massive and relatively inexpensive villas are luring more expats into the area. With them has come an increasing amount of services. THE MAIN THOROUGHFARE in Tuol Kork is Street 289. This northern continuation of Mao Tse Tung Boulevard leads from the Sokimex roundabout to the large radio antenna that dominates the area. Lined with small shops and local restaurants of no particular interest, a few places stand out.

Coming from the south, a branch of **T&Coffee** (open 6am to 10pm) is hidden behind the Sokimex petrol station, left of the roundabout. While its atmosphere does not stand comparison with places downtown, it is seemingly the only coffee shop in the area and offers free WiFi. Most importantly, the freshly ground coffee is good, making it ideal for decently priced takeouts on the way to the office. Espresso is 3,200 riel, cappuccino 6,000 riel, iced coffee 4,000 riel and great smoothies 6,000 to 7,000 riel.

Venturing further north, a bit of effort finds you Kanya Massage (38 Street 289, open 9am to 9pm). Run by the Cambodian Acid Survivors Charity this haven of tranquillity is staffed entirely by professionally trained acid burn survivors. Massages start at US\$4 for an hour's Thai massage, up to US\$15 for a slimming massage. Pedicures and manicures weigh in at US\$3 and US\$2 respectively. You can also pick up 'babs' purses made by acid burn survivors, some of them blind. Coming in three sizes (US\$3, US\$5, US\$10), they can be custom made on demand.

Towards the antenna end of street is the **Long Beach Plaza Hotel.** This hotel is most note-

worthy for its large pool. Open 7am to 7pm every day, except for Monday, when its open from 12pm, a dip costs only US\$1. Despite the less than glamorous surroundings, its relatively unknown status lets you swim with few, if any, onlookers and fellow dippers.

#### STREET 566

Whether by coincidence or not, Street 566 (second left off Street 289, after the roundabout) is becoming the restaurant street of Tuol Kork. Aem Nyirady owns the newly opened **Sarika Garden Grill** (69 Street 566, open 10am to 12pm). Owner of both Riverhouse Lounge and Lemongrass, she had no qualms about opening in Tuol Kork, "My son's school is here and our house is around the corner – it's convenient," she explains. It is convenience that she hopes will bring customers to her beautiful restaurant and bar. Private table barbeques are from US\$12 and there's a 5pm to 8pm happy hour with two-for-one drinks (cocktails start at \$3.50). With facilities to host private parties, live bands in the near future and the **Diplomats Bar, Sarika** is undoubtedly the classiest place to dine in Tuol Kork.

A few blocks down, the owners of Korean restaurant **Bi Won** (open 11.30am to 2.30pm, 5.30pm to 9.30pm) are similarly banking on convenience. Specialising in BBQs (from US\$20), these come with a distinctly Korean flavour. Multiple side dishes, including kimchi, are free and unlimited with every meal, and can be accompanied

by the Korean 'vodka', soju, to complete a truly authentic experience. While the local staff may have little knowledge of what they are dishing up from the Korean-run kitchen, the place is popular with Koreans. Don't expect it to come cheap though.

While most local 'restaurants' in the area may scare expats off with their blaring karaoke and dolled-up girls at the entrance, Srov Tom on the corner of streets 289 and 566 is more welcoming. No plastic chairs in sight here, instead it is all rattan with a touch of greenery. The roadside barbeque has Anchor Beer on tap for 2,000 riel a glass. The food is essentially Khmer, with cockroaches, grasshoppers, and even snake on skewer. Not your most amazing culinary experience, but for a local night out this buzzing place is not to be missed.

The street is not just about food. Resplendent in multiple colours and with an inviting 400 square metre children's playground next to the street, the kindergarten and primary part of **Zaman International School** is at the junction of Street 315. The non-profit school, founded in 1997, has over 800 students from 4 to 18 years of age.

#### THE SIDE STREETS

Following Street 315 northwards is the main office for **Cambodia Brewery Limited** (56 Street 315). The company brews Tiger,

Anchor, ABC Stout and Gold Crown beers. In truth there is little of interest in visiting the head office, as the brewery is out of town. Further along the street is the office for **Bassac Orchid** (10B Street 315). This advertising agency has been involved in Cambodia since 1996, acting as a stand-alone agency for the last few years, with clients including ANZ Royal and Coca-Cola.

Situated on Street 295 by Tuol Kork market and claiming to be first of its kind in Cambodia, the **Garden Shop** sells seeds and seedlings for fruits, vegetables and flowers. It also offers a variety of advice in both English and French on gardening, landscaping, and pesticide and fertiliser use. It's a good stop for both keen gardeners and those less prepared to muck in, but who nevertheless want a nice garden.

Heading back towards the Sokimex roundabout, on Street 592, is the Royal Rattanak Hospital (11 Street 592). Brand new, it is more like a hotel than a hospital. In-patient rooms, starting at US\$145 per night, have everything you would expect in a hotel room, including flatscreen TV. Part of the Bangkok Hospital Network, the staff are Khmer and Thai with good English-language skills. Consultations for expats are US\$24. The hospital is also open for 24-hour emergency care.

## Iconic Phnom Penh: Independence Monument

Harking on the past glory of the Khmer empire, yet constructed and designed in a contemporary manner reflective of mid-century Cambodia's explosive growth and development, few structures rival the Independence Monument for its iconic presence in the capital. Words by **Andrew Turco.**

ALTHOUGH INDEPENDENCE Monument wasn't officially inaugurated until 1962 – nine years after Cambodia gained independence from France – plans were underway and construction had begun long before the actual dedication. Phnom Penh in the 50s and 60s experienced a period of rapid growth, thanks to the optimism of independence, a booming economy, and the migration of hundreds of thousands of rural residents to the capital.

Vann Molyvann, often credited with the design of Independence Monument, states in his book Modern Khmer Cities that the 1950s and 1960s were not only a time of infrastructure development and growth, but also a period of beautification. Independence Monument was built within the parks and boulevards that were built when the East-West canal under Sihanouk Boulevard was filled-in.

King Norodom Sihanouk was dedicated to showing Cambodia's growth and embarked on a slew of public works projects that would change the face of Phnom Penh, and many of Cambodia's other cities as well. The Monument is one example of the result of King Sihanouk's desire to show the success of one of Southeast Asia's newly independent nations. The midtwentieth century was a time when Cambodia was introducing itself as an independent nation, and the city needed monuments and sights to exemplify the new spirit of the country.

#### THE ORIGINS AND DESIGN

Vann Molyvann's drawings of the monument are dated March 1957, according to Helen Grant Ross and Darryl Leon Collins's writing. Although Vann Molyvann was thoroughly involved in the project, Ross and Collins also note that more preliminary drawings from January of the same year by Du Ngoc Anh, an engineer from Saigon, exist. While mysteries still remain about the details of the monument's exact origins, its symbolic importance is unambiguous.

At the request of King Sihanouk, the design for the monument was inspired by Angkor's Banteay Srei, according to Ross and Collins. Although the design motifs reflect Angkorian temples, the structure remains unmistakably modern. It does not feel like a lazy copy of past Cambodian buildings. Both its construction and design are unmistakably modern, and at the same time pay respect to past Khmer architecture.

"Conceived in the Angkorian tradition, the monument relied on an integration of Le Corbusier's Modular for its proportions," writes Vann Molyvann in Modern Khmer Cities. Perhaps as a result of these proportions, the monument appears contemporary without making use of the angular, modernist surfaces common in the New Khmer Architecture of the time.

Because the land under the Independence Monument is fill and therefore soft, extensive pilings were required in order

to support the weight of the structure. Underneath its surface, the core of the monument is concrete, which was then clad in crushed red marble, according to Ross and Collins. Over time the stone has been painted, giving it the familiar colour and surface that is recognisable today.

#### THE MONUMENT WITHIN THE CITY

Standing tall over the intersection of Norodom and Sihanouk boulevards, the Independence Monument serves to anchor the surrounding sections of the city. Just as Sixtus V arranged Rome and Baron Haussman organised Paris, Independence Monument serves as a focal point in the organisation of the city. It serves as a recognisable landmark, serving as the starting point for two of the city's main boulevards. Its deep brown colour and its elevated pedestal give it an understated and dignified position in the urban fabric of Phnom Penh.

Modest renovations in 2007 have given Independence Monument a new look. Lighted fountains have replaced the shrubs around parts of the perimeter. The former coloured spotlights that used to shine on the monument in a blue-redblue arrangement evocative of the Cambodian flag have been replaced by simple and elegant white lighting.

During the renovations, when green construction hoarding surrounded the site and blocked sightlines across the monument and its small plaza, the importance that the monument plays in anchoring and weaving together the surrounding neighbourhoods became apparent. Without being able to see across the space the monument occupies, the area felt disjointed and incomplete.

Now at sunset, when the fountains and lights are turned on, couples sit by the edge and parents bring children to marvel at the dancing water. Food carts surround the area, and bicycle vendors selling inflatable toys walk their bikes around the circle of the monument. Yhe lace is full of life.

#### THE MONUMENT AS A SYMBOL

Today, Independence Monument has evolved into a symbol as powerful as many of Cambodia's other famous landmarks – foreign dignitaries are still brought by the monument during their visits. All it takes is a look at a 100 riel note or the covers of many of the publications about Cambodia to see the familiar silhouette of one of Phnom Penh's most iconic structures.

New and increasingly upscale restaurants and spas are popping up across the cityscape at delightful rates. But why now? What is it about the country, city, or its many inhabitants that have led to this boom? Words by Lis Meyers.

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STAYING ON TOP OF THE CITY'S restaurant and spa scene is becoming increasingly difficult. An explosion of new places has led to a renaissance that is fine-tuning standards of service, quality, and taste throughout the city. This boom can be explained by a variety of factors that have merged together at this particular moment to create new and increasing markets and demands, facilitated by increasing development. Put simply, people in Phnom Penh, Cambodians, business people, tourists, and expats, are hungry for more.

Phnom Penh's residents are increasingly seeking new alternatives and more op-

tions in their daily lives. Corner 33 is a five-month-old café with a laid back but sophisticated lounge atmosphere and free WiFi and Internet stations. Despite little formal advertising, it is thriving. Owner, Tom Huynh, attributes this success to word of mouth and a general trend to seek out novel alternatives. Julian Grant, managing director of S&A

Enterprises, which recently launched Sarika Garden Grill, feels similarly. "It's not enough for someone just to open a restaurant, you have to have something different," he says. "The standards have been raised. You have to go that extra mile when it comes to competition."

#### FRESH PLACES, GLAM SPACES

The thirst for the fresh and new seems to be linked to an increase in up-market options. The arrival of restaurants such as Van's, La Residence, Yi Sang, and Passage 2 India, as well as Amara and Nata Spas, indicate a growing desire for glamour and luxury.

Most expats are sure to have noticed the latest newcomer to the riverside, Amara Spa, a stylish day spa with a striking Zen-like interior and indulgent services and treatments. Manager, Patricia Tan sees the spa as offering a lifestyle rather than a simple massage. "More people have spending power and are looking for luxury and quality," she says. "I have tried so many spas in Phnom Penh and you can only get high quality services in the top hotels."

While Patricia hopes to bring luxury spa services to non-hotel guests, she also intends to offer affordable prices so that these services are accessible to a wider range of people.

Similarly, the one-year-old Nata Spa aims to provide a top end spa alternative, catering to high-end and walk-in customers, offering a "VIP" experience for all.

Porleng Van, owner of Van's Restaurant, a gorgeous classical French restaurant in a heavenly colonial estate beside the Post Office, believes her restaurant is filling a much-desired market. "I found that Phnom Penh city does not have enough high-end restaurants," she says.

Van's is not the only high-end restaurant to open recently.

The sumptuous La Residence Restaurant is located in a luxurious colonial mansion, featuring large, contemporary dining rooms, a delightful garden in the centre of the city, and a swimming pool area. The main focus of the restaurant, however, is its haute cuisine. Ansiau La Planeta, proprietor of La Residence, felt this was crucial to the restaurant's success. "We were really looking for a good chef. For me this was key." Ansiau eventually found a chef to meet his standards, bringing Japanese chef Takeshi Karo from a Michelin starred restaurant in Verriere, Switzerland.

Ansiau believes it would have been nearly impossible to open La Residence a few years ago. "In 2002 and 2003 there were less business men and people were not in this habit of going to nice restaurants," he explains.

This raises the question, why now? What is it about the present moment in Cambodia that is prompting this sudden explosion of fresh places and glam spaces?

#### THE CITY THAT COULD

The city has gone through tremendous changes in the past few years. Julie Thai, owner of Le Wok, a leisurely French and Asian Restaurant across from the National Museum, describes a true transformation. "It was so different six years ago. After 10pm everything was dark and no one was out," she says. "Now I almost eat better than I do in France."

Phnom Penh is becoming increasingly stable for development, encouraging foreign

and local investment that is bringing increasing amounts of fresh cash and people to the city. "There is a lot of development," says Tom. "Apartments are being built, people are investing, and more and more people are coming through."

Katrina Vynagredenko, manager of Mes Amis, a tiny eatery in Boeung Keng Kang offering pastas and pizzas, cites the new apartments that are being built throughout the area. The renovation and reconstruction along the riverside and large projects by Tower 42 and De Castle are telling examples of the city's growth. These in turn prompt the sudden expansion of service industries. Recent months have also seen a rapid increase in international franchises, including Swensons and KFC, testifying to the increased faith and security foreign developers are feeling in deciding to invest.

Development is also expanding outwards into new areas of the city. Sarika Garden Grill offers western and Asian cuisine in a lush tropical garden and 1960s Cambodian wooden house in Toul Kork - an untapped market within the city.

"There is a lack of space in the centre of the city, and people are moving outside of town for cheaper rent," says Julian. "You can rent a villa in Toul Kork for a reasonable price." As a result, Julian believes more and more businesses will soon be arriving in Toul Kork.

#### BUSINESS LUNCH

Increased development has created an influx of businesses and business people in the area. As corporations are investing within the country, they are bringing with them experienced staff with great spending power. Numerous restaurant owners attribute part of the restaurant explosion to an increased presence of business people in the city.

Cambodian chef Luu Meng is opening Yi Sang, an upscale Chinese restaurant, in May.

"There are more business people in town and it's good to have a few different choices for them," he says. A partner of Malis, Bai Thong, and Café Sentiment, Luu Meng wants to be part of this growing market.

Upscale restaurants offer impressive spots to discuss contracts, deals, and proposals, or to wine and dine clients.

Sarika and La Residence foresee such needs, opening private and VIP rooms within their restaurants to cater to businesspeople.

Doing business in IT consulting, Tom conceived of Corner 33 with his own market in mind.

"Corner 33 came about because we had trouble finding places to go to discuss business," he says. "The city needed a place where people could sit down, have a coffee, and discuss business."

#### THE RISE OF THE MIDDLE CLASS

Change is also being prompted from Cambodians themselves, as more and more Cambodians are starting to eat out, get out and chill out. It is no secret that the Khmer middle class is on the rise, creating larger numbers of Khmers with money to spend on dining out, travelling, and developing cosmopolitan tastes.

Porleng sees how increased development has launched a change in Cambodians themselves. "The country is developing and more and more Cambodians can afford to enjoy life – they want to try new things," she says. Increasingly Cambodians are travelling overseas, returning with higher standards and tastes. "Cambodians are really starting to learn how to enjoy food and wine," she says.

Speaking to the strength of the middle class and increased spending power, restaurants and spas are seeing high levels of Khmer customers. Close to half of La Residence's clientele is Khmer, suggesting a change in Cambodian taste buds.

Remy Meas runs Le Quay, the café located outside of Amara Spa. "Local people like to eat out and will sometimes go out seven days a week," he says.

Celine Jacobelli owns Aziadee Spa and the recently opened Amret Spa. She is finding that high numbers of Cambodians are coming to Amret. "There is an increasing middle class where people have more money to spend on themselves – they are starting to really enjoy themselves," she says. "There is a big market for services catered towards Cambodians."

Similarly, 20 to 30 percent of all customers at Dermal Spa are Khmer. "Cambodians are getting more modern and making more money," says the spa's Cambodian manager Rathna Ly. To tap into this expanding market, Rathana has created an ambience and atmosphere at Dermal that both Asian and western patrons will respond to. She also emphasises steam treatments to appeal to her Khmer clientele.

"People are looking for serious alternatives on where to go," says Julian. "Cambodians are feeling a bit more experimental." He cites the queue outside the bustling KFC as evidence of this. "There are a lot of people who have spent time outside of the country," he points out. "They might not be as far removed from western tastes and styles as people think."

#### WILL TO SUCCEED

Waiters, chefs, and spa therapists are becoming increasingly well trained and qualified. They have built up the skills and experience needed for such upscale businesses to thrive and succeed.

In selecting staff for Mes Amis, Katrina found it surprisingly easy to find capable local individuals. "Khmer staff are becoming increasingly trained," according to her. "It was easy to find experienced and professional English-speaking staff." Similarly, Donna Gubaton, operations manager of Nata, was able to obtain masseurs and spa technicians with impressive experience.

All of the staff at La Residence are from a training school in Siem Reap. "It would have been much more difficult to find people throughout the country without the school," remarks Ansiau. "They like making something different," he says praising his team. "They are passionate to work at this restaurant and are learning a lot in a very short time."

Yet, this by no means signifies that all service is in tiptop shape. Only development will propel Cambodian skills and knowledge upwards to great new heights. In order to provide the best for her customers, Patricia brought in Thai-based Horwath Spa Consulting to train Amara employees on new techniques and products featured at the spa. Ansiau, too, is taking his time to train his staff so they can meet the high standards of the market La Residence caters to.

#### THE PLACE TO BE

The growing flow of tourists to the city is another contributory factor to the number of spas and restaurants being opened. Cambodia is finally perceived as safe for travel and is gaining international prominence as a tourist destination. Rather than stopping only in Siem Reap, visitors are choosing to add Phnom Penh to their itineraries. While not overloaded with breathtaking and noteworthy sites, the city still has a great deal to offer for its mostly transient guests.

"Tourists are increasing. They don't just stop in Siem Reap, they are interested in seeing the capital," says Porleng. "There is an opening of borders, and more and more people are coming from within Asia and around the world."

Julie believes there is a new type of tourist coming to Phnom Penh. "All the people whom I meet now who stop in Phnom Penh say 'I would have missed Cambodia if I hadn't stopped here,'" she says. "Angkor is the place to see and Phnom Penh is the place to be – tourists are starting to realise this."

The restaurant and spa boom should also be examined via the city's expats. Aspiring restaurateurs and spa owners have a great deal of personal incentive these days. Rob Huxley, the owner of Huxley's, a British pub and European restaurant a street back from the riverfront, believed this was the time to make his big move. "It seemed like a good choice to do it now before prices go up too much," he says. "The cost of doing this would be ten times higher later on."

Both Tom and Katrina have relished the opportunity of starting their own restaurant, something they believed would have been much more difficult and costly in their home countries of New Zealand and the Ukraine, respectively.

"There is so much opportunity here, anyone can do anything," says Tom. "I don't think I could have done this in New Zealand.

Katrina agrees. "It is easier to invest and open a business here than it would be in many of our home countries," she says.

Moreover, expats are increasingly falling in love with Phnom Penh and deciding to stick around. For many, starting a business seems like a good way to sprout roots. "You have many people who visit the country, fall in love with it, and decide to open up a business," says Remy.

Rob agrees. "You don't invest to make money here. We do it because we want to stay and have stability. We build something we'd like to go to ourselves." Rob sees his

pub as a way of investing in the country he has come to love so much. "I felt it was a good time to reinvest in the country. I wanted to show that I had a commitment to staying here and that I was looking towards the future."

This love is not merely felt by Phnom Penh's expat crowd. Luu Meng views his string of restaurants, cafés and hotels as a means of helping his homeland. "In creating businesses, you create jobs," he says. "We are not only a business to make money, we are also building something for Cambodia."

#### STILL HUNGRY

Phnom Penh is hungry for change and it seems that development in the spa and restaurant industries is only just getting started. Phnom Penh residents will have the daunting and busy task of keeping up with the plethora of places that will surely be arriving on the scene in the coming months and years.

Many of the restaurant and spa owners interviewed have plans to keep building and expanding. In two months, Corner 33 will be expanding to include a bar on its second floor. Porleng will open a coffee bar/ French bistro across the street from Van's in a completely different style. She also hopes to bring a new, light lunch menu to Van's focusing on simpler fare. Sarika Garden Grill will also officially open the high-end Diplomats Bar this month, considered by Julian to be "a serious alternative to the Elephant Bar."

Nata Spa will be opening its own Salon in May, offering modern hairstyles and top-end products. Nata will also be expanding to Siem Reap.

Such continued development will mean great things for the city and its inhabitants, according to Julie. "All the new places will encourage the city to improve in terms of service, quality, and novelty," she says.

Everyone seems greatly energised by the ever-expanding market. "Two years ago there were just a handful of places to go to," says Tom. "I think you will see a lot more quality restaurants and cafés coming. There is a lot more buzz in Phnom Penh now. It's going to be very exciting."

## **Boutique Blossoming**

Restaurants and spas are not all that's new in the city. Internationally boutique hotels are very much in vogue these days and Phnom Penh is no exception. Lis Meyers explores the city's rapidly developing boutique hotel boom.

THE INCREASED NUMBERS OF TOURISTS staying in Phnom Penh after temple hopping in Siem Reap shows that Cambodia is no longer a one-stop destination. Looking for charming yet affordable places to stay in this rapidly developing city, many opt to stay in smaller, boutique hotels that offer service and comfort at appropriate prices. As a result, boutique hotels have become all the rage. Operating at close to maximum capacity, the market can barely keep up. New boutique hotels are being developed throughout the city and across the country.

#### FULL HOUSES

Widespread bookings and near bursting occupancy are testament to how much in demand boutique hotels are these days. Villa Langka has found itself filling up since two weeks after opening, despite minimal advertising.

Pavilion, the sanctuary boutique hotel that also serves as a haven for many of the city's expats, runs at close to 100 percent occupancy, even after doubling in size to include the house next door. Many of the rooms at Pavilion have already been booked for New Years Eve 2008. To meet the high demand and expand into new markets, Pavilion has developed two new properties, the recently opened Kabiki and the upcoming Blue Lime.

With its nine rooms, the FCC Phnom Penh is running at 95-98 percent occupancy. The Quay, a hip and contemporary hotel along the Riverfront, was opened by the FCC on Apr. 10. Having recently purchased a highly sought after colonial estate on Sothearos Boulevard, opposite the National Museum, the company hopes to do something spectacular with it in the coming years.

Similarly, Anise Hotel reports being 90 percent full, with bookings being made at least two weeks in advance. Anise, too, will soon find itself with a sister hotel. As of going to press, Almond Hotel was due to open at the end of this month.

The market is also attracting new players to the city's scene. Those behind the Kepbased Knai Ban Chatt hope to soon bring their brand of exclusivity and escapism to both Phnom Penh and Siem Reap.

#### PRICES THAT CANNOT BE BEAT

Until now, Phnom Penh's visitors have only had the very top and the very bottom of the market to choose from in selecting where to stay in the city. Tourists could go budget, staying for US\$10 to US\$15 on the Golden Street (Street 278) or superbudget at the lake. The alternatives were either the five-star hotels, or a few quality hotels along the riverfront, such as FCC Phnom Penh, Bougainvillier and Amanjaya. Accommodation for around US\$40 to US\$50 was very much limited, with the Billabong, Anise and Scandinavia Hotels as notable exceptions.

Offering decent prices alongside charm and modern amenities, boutique hotels can fill that large gap. Despite rates that are much lower than your standard big hotel, boutique hotels offer quality comfort and service that often cannot be beaten.

"There is a big market for mid-range hotels," says Nathalie Parize, co-owner of Elsewhere and owner of Villa Langka. "There are a lot of guesthouses for US\$5 to US\$15, but some people want more comfort and something with a pool."

#### ROYAL TREATMENT

In staying small, boutique hotels are able to treat all guests like royalty. Luu Meng, a partner in Anise and Almond Hotel believes they offer quality treatment with great attention to detail. "You pay a certain amount and get extra service," he says. "We will take care of the needs of any particular client."

Service can be highly personalised, according to Michelle Dunkin from the FCC. "With 16 rooms you should know the name of everyone who walks through the door," she says. FCC's Director, Steve Hayward, agrees. "You are more than a number. It is more intimate."

Even with hosting just 11 rooms, Knai Bang Chatt has developed a reputation for delivering personalised service and raking in the essence of Kep as a de-stress retreat. "We offer that special touch that makes you feel so at home but yet away," says Jef Moons, co-owner of this southern lifestyle property. Recognising that an ideal retreat spells different things for different people, Knai Bang Chatt offers tailor-made packages based on the desires of each individual guest."

#### LOCATION, LOCATION, LOCATION

Alexis de Suremain, owner of Pavilion, Kabikia, and Blue Lime, believes that for boutique hotels, another factor is vital. "The key issue in Phnom Penh is not the clients or feel, the market, or marketing, but finding the appropriate location," he says. "The toughest thing is to find the right space." Alexis visited hundreds of houses to find the right space for Pavilion, using nearly every real estate agent in the city.

Location has also proved essential to the FCC, choosing to locate its properties along the bustling riverside area. "Location is important," says Michelle. "For us it's about trying to find the right place, something central." Thanks to its popular location, the FCC has become a landmark in the city.

While Alexis searched high and low for Pavilion, Nathalie Parize simply happened to stumble upon the site of Villa Langka. "I bumped into the house and saw it was for rent," she says. Unable to turn down the lovely house centrally situated across from Wat Langka, it seemed natural to open a hotel.

#### LIFESTYLE DESIGNS

Due to their small size and personal service, boutique hotels are able to fill particular niches within the market. Boutiques are increasingly concept driven, emanating lifestyle characteristics or catering towards a very specific crowd.

"You have to have a concept if you want to sell," says Alexis. Luu Meng also sees his hotels as very concept driven, branding Almond as Phnom Penh's premier business hotel. "Concepts create a unique feeling," he says. "People today want to see more variety."

Nathalie agrees. "The point of a boutique

is to have its own specific charm," she says. No one seems better able to tap into these niches than Alexis. "We are cutting the market between families, young people, and those who want privacy and calm," he says.

Pavilion offers a peaceful sanctuary. Centred around a lovely pool and garden area, it makes the perfect escape without having to leave the city limits. "It's key to have a garden and pool," says Alexis. Going the extra mile, some rooms in the newer part of Pavilion have their own private pools.

Yet, in order to preserve the tranquil atmosphere, Alexis discourages children at the Pavilion. As a result, Kabiki Hotel has been designed to cater specifically to families. Alexis realised that people were increasingly bringing their children with them to Phnom Penh, and had few options to stay. The restaurant features high chairs and child-friendly food like burgers and shakes. The large garden space can accommodate roller-skating and bike riding, and a playground area will soon be installed. Small garden areas in front of each room have a gate that locks, creating a safe playing space for the young ones to ensure they will stay within their parent's reach. Rooms even feature bunk beds.

Blue Lime, Alexis's third property, is meant for a younger, more hip crowd. It has a novel, cutting edge design, decorated with stark grey concrete and vibrant silk accents. The dynamic space embraces the city, rather than shielding guests from it.

The Quay will also help to tap into some of this younger crowd. The space already stands out against the cluttered riverfront facades. "It will be more modern and very city chic," says Steve.

Villa Langka has also positioned itself as a family friendly place. "Little by little families are coming to Cambodia," says Nathalie. Large rooms can easily accommodate extra beds for children and the pool area serves as a great place for kids. Simultaneously, Villa Langka has also been able to position itself as a suitable accommodation option for business people with free WiFi and large desks in every room.

Although in a much higher price range than other boutique options, Knai Ban Chatt, will soon be bringing its own unique concept and essence to the cityscape. Fashioned as a "lifestyle property," it aims to provide the ultimate experience in luxury, beauty, and serenity, while maintaining a distinctive Cambodian feel.

#### GENERATION X

Boutique owners and developers also believe there is something special about Generation X that makes charming, mid-range hotels appealing to them.

"It's that range of people aged 35 to 45 looking for something more special," says Nathalie of this new clientele. "These people backpacked around when younger and would now like to stay somewhere unique, rather than being in a hotel that is everywhere in the world."

Alexis agrees. "It's the first backpacker generation and they are still feeling nostalgic from earlier trips," he says. "But they have grown richer and don't want to go somewhere too budget – they want something nicer and more relaxed."

As Generation X continues to travel to Phnom Penh and Cambodia, boutique hotels will, no doubt, grow and flourish, bringing their added charm to an already charming city.

Strolling around Stung Treng, you cannot help but think of Wild West towns – a feeling evoked by its location as a gateway to some of Cambodia's wildest areas and its very own blend of Lao and Cambodian culture. While the town itself does not have very much to offer beyond its rough charm and stunning river views, there is an overwhelming choice of things to do and see around Stung Treng. BLESSED WITH A LARGELY unspoilt stretch of the Mekong and Sekong rivers, the province has protected forests, magnificent waterfalls, welcoming villages and the rare Irrawaddy dolphin. The river and its banks are really the main attraction of the region and the developing tourism industry is increasing the possibilities for visitors to explore the area. Access to Stung Treng has now become much easier thanks to the new Sekong Chinese Friendship bridge linking the town with Kratie province, although cars still had to cross the river by ferry, as at the time of writing. Motorbikes and bicycles, however, can use the bridge.

The 190km-long stretch of the Mekong river from the Lao border to Kratie is one of only five remaining freshwater dolphin habitats

**STUNG TRENG AND SURROUNDS** Before heading out to the countryside surrounding Stung Treng, take the time to visit Thala Barivat, a Chenla temple on the west bank of the Sekong River. To get to this ancient temple, take the ferry from the town centre across the river (1,000 riel per person). Several ancient temple ruins in the area are worth exploration, such as Prasat Preah Ko west of Thala Barivat. Completely submerged by vegetation, these ancient ruins are likely to awaken the dormant Angkor explorer in you. Close to Thala Barivat are a new pagoda and the Nopaana orphanage.

The first port of call for most travellers to Stung Treng is Mr. T's Riverside restaurant and café. Mr. T is most knowledgeable about the area. He organises one or two-day boat trips to the nearby dolphin pools and waterfalls, as well as homestays and trekking tours, including a three-day trek along the Ho Chi Minh trail. He can also arrange onward travel to Ratanakiri and most places in Cambodia.

Two dolphin pools – Koh Konsat and Koh Santuk – are some 20km south of Stung Treng. A visit to these can be combined with another highlight of this area, Koh Preah, a beautiful island with pleasant beaches and good swimming. To get there, rent bicycles and spend the day watching dolphins, swimming in the rapids and trekking on Koh Preah island. Boats for rental are available at the river guard stations at Damrei Phong.

A visit to Stung Treng's Mekong Blue Silk Weaving Centre is the perfect opportunity to pick up a present or two for loved ones. Mekong Blue is a project of the Stung Treng Women's Development Centre, a local NGO. Producing some of the finest silk products in Cambodia, the organisation has a selection of products ranging from silk scarves to bedding, clothing and accessories. Include a tour of the workshop and mulberry fields in your visit.

For sunset, head out to the place locals refer to as "where the temple fell into the water." Artefacts litter the site of an ancient temple located about 3km out of town along the riverside road to the Mekong. Situated at the junction of the Sekong and Mekong rivers, there are beautiful views over this massive stretch of water.

Close to Stung Treng, Virachey National Park's western end is accessible through Siem Pang village. Both trekking and stunning river trips can be booked through the Ministry of Environment in Stung Treng. Two homely guesthouses in Siem Pang village can be booked through the guards at the National Park.

#### HOMESTAYS

One great experience that the province affords is a homestay in charming Ou Svay commune. While Stung Treng offers some reasonable basic and mid-range accommodation, these village homestays are a much more rewarding option.

Ou Svay is one of five artificial villages created by King Sihanouk in 1962. King Sihanouk sent people there from different provinces to protect the border with Laos. Back then, the villages had a school, a hospital, good roads and even an airport. During the Khmer Rouge regime, people were forced to leave the village, and the infrastructure was destroyed during the war. Now, the village is working towards improving its infrastructure again by developing sustainable ecotourism.

A visit to this village does have a very fresh feel to it. According to Touch Sophany of the Culture and Environment Preservation Association, only six foreigners have visited Ou Svay since last year. Visitors are welcomed by a short ceremony

held by the village elders, intended to introduce visitors to the local spirits.

While a beautiful village in its own right, Ou Svay is also the perfect base from which to explore the area's many riches. "Visitors can see flooded forests, waterfalls, dolphins, birds and other animals," says Touch Sophany. "We can take them on trekking tours, boat tours, cycling tours, camping trips to the islands, and fishing tours with the local fishermen."

#### TOWARDS THE LAO BORDER

From Ou Svay, Son Phamit Waterfall at the Lao border can be reached via a scenic boat trip (US\$20 per boat). Combine a visit to the waterfall with a stop at Anlong Cheuteal dolphin pool, which boasts a sizeable population of the rare Irrawaddy dolphin.

Located near the Lao border, in a stunning stretch of river, the pool has spectacular mountain backdrops. The best chance of sighting the rare mammals is to visit the dolphin pool at 10am to 11am or between 4pm and 5pm. Enjoy a cool drink at the local stall on the beach or float around on your boat or a hired tube.

#### habitats. It is thought to be home to around 80 to 100 dolphins, according to WWF. Remnants of the French railway built in 1893 can be seen opposite the dolphin pool. From here, it is possible to trek to Phnom Bong Khouy Mountain, which offers stunning views over the river and towards Laos' 4,000 islands from its peak.

To trek to Phnom Bong Khouy Mountain from Anlong Cheuteal, ask the river guard post to organise a guide from Preah Rumkel. The trek takes about three hours.

Another gem not to be missed is the Ramsar wetland reserve. Identified by the WWF as a biodiversity hotspot, a boat trip along this stretch of the Mekong will take you through islands of flooded forests, unique to this part of the world. Bird-watchers will delight in the diversity and number of waterfowl.

The Culture and Environment Preservation Association can organise your homestay in Ou Svay (US\$2 per person, US\$4 including a home-cooked meal), as well as a traditional Khmer dinner at the local pagoda – a distinctive experience not to be missed!

While taking a walk through the village, also look out for that inconspicuous stall in front of the pagoda – it has reportedly the best barbequed beef in Cambodia, perfect with a beer or two to wind down at the end of the day and soak up some village atmosphere after a rewarding day exploring the river's many treasures.

The newly developed Mekong Discovery Trail website provides visitors to Stung Treng and Kratie with a wealth of information on the region, as well as suggesting itineraries for independent cycling and walking tours of various lengths.

Travelling from Vietnam to London by motorcycle, Mike Gracey and Lotta Väänänen drive trough Iran and towards the Turkish border.

DESPITE FIGHTING STRONG side winds, the road conditions in Iran were terrific. Beyond Kerman we no longer required armed escorts and were delighted to cruise at our own pace. However, we remained cautious and did not stray away from the main highway.

We stopped in the ancient city of Yazd, consisting of mud brick buildings and wind towers dating back to the Sassanian period (220 A.D.). We were thankful to gain visa extensions at the local 'Aliens Bureau' rather than the intimidating sounding 'Disciplinary Force for Islamic **Republic of Iran Department** for Aliens Affairs' in Tehran. We spent a month snaking our way across this hospitable country, making numerous friends along the way.

After a relaxing week admiring the magnificent architecture of the ancient mosques in Esfahan and consuming countless coffees at the grand Abbasi Hotel, we headed to Tehran where we visited the impressive National Jewels Museum and took a stroll to

the former U.S. Embassy, today known as the 'U.S. Den of Espionage' and home of the Sepah Militia, a group committed to upholding the revolution. As we approached the building, we could clearly see a mural of the stars and stripes flag with large letters stating 'Down with the U.S.A..' I looked around and grabbed for my camera when a large figure appeared at the entrance of the building and fixed his eyes on us. We were quick to turn around and made our way to the metro getting lost amid the rush hour crowd.

Leaving Tehran we continued on our quest towards Turkey. Arriving in Zanjan for the night, I lost Lotta in the evening traffic! In panic I drove in search of her, and after the worst hour of my life, a young fellow approached me ensuring that my wife was well and that her bike had broken down. He guided me to Lotta. After making sure she was all right I towed her straight to the nearest mechanics.

The following day we drove to the border and the closer we got to Turkey, the clearer we could make out the 5,137m snow-peaked Mt. Ararat. The weather was getting worryingly cold.

Thai Food seeks to fuse the basic flavours of hot and spicy, sweet, sour, and salty into many delectable dishes. As most of us can't just jet set to neighbouring Thailand on a whim, **Lis Meyers** explores Thai Food in Phnom Penh.

The beautiful, sumptuous setting at Bai Thong is adorned with a striking stone wall, sweeping drapes, and accents of maroon and gold. Chicken satay at US\$4.20 is expertly cooked and nicely marinated, with a thick peanut sauce on the side. For something special, order the duck with tamarind sauce on a bed of crispy noodles and Chinese greens for US\$7.40. The tamarind glaze adds a level of sophistication to tender slices of duck. Thai food lovers can order the set menu, a five-course meal at US\$11.90. Bai Thong offers some of the best Thai food sampled and the service is spot on.

#### BUA THAI RESTAURANT

Ground Floor, Phnom Penh Hotel, Monivong Blvd., Tel: 023 990 098 or 011 49 94 60 Located inside the Phnom Penh Hotel, Bua Thai is a pleasant surprise. The menu features over 200 dishes and features vibrant and appetising pictures of a number of the dishes. Koong Chochee (US\$12.50), sautéed prawns with chuchee chilli paste, is absolutely divine. The enormous prawns are cooked to perfection in the spicy chilli and peanut sauce. Pad Seew (US\$6), sautéed rice noodles with vegetables and meat, in a sweet soy sauce has a subtle flavour and is perfect for those with more delicate palates.

#### TOM YUM KUNG

10 Street 278 Tel: 023 359 293 Those who like their Thai food with a great big kick will love Tom Yum Kung. Most dishes come red hot spicy so be sure to have plenty of water and rice on hand! Order fiery green curry (US\$2.50) and your mouth will tingle long after the meal. Spicy squid salad features large portions of nicely textured and fresh-tasting squid. The fried spring rolls (US\$2.25) were a bit disappointing, especially when compared to the rest of Tom Yum Kung's more exciting offerings. The restaurant attracts a large mix of Thais, Khmers, and expats in the know. The prices here cannot be beaten.

#### KHMER THAI RESTAURANT

26Eo Street 135

Tel: 092 810 812 Offering delectable Thai food in a lovely setting for those on any budget, the atmosphere at Khmer Thai is both charming and elegant with alfresco and indoor seating. Thickly wrapped spring rolls for US\$2 are filled with glass noodles and vegetables, with a tasty doughy texture. The satay Gai or grilled skewered chicken (US\$2.80) is out-of-this-world good, especially when combined with a scrumptious peanut and minced pork dipping sauce. The restaurant also does some fabulous curries at US\$3.50 to US\$4.

Both chilled tea and steamed rice come with the meal and are refilled frequently. Khmer Thai Restaurant is the perfect spot for a casual but enjoyable meal with good friends or family.

#### LEMONGRASS

14 Street 130 Tel: 023 222 522 Located adjacent to the sprawling riverside, Lemongrass takes you away from the bustling streets for a relaxing meal. The warmly decorated interior blends soothing yellow walls with dark woods, and a variety of Thai antiques line the walls. Tom Yung Gung, a fragrant lemongrass soup with prawns, (US\$5) comes beautifully prepared in a clay pot with mushrooms and hot peppers. The soup was smooth and wellspiced. Gai Pad Met Mamoung, a chicken stir-fry dish with cashews, onions and peppers is equally good. A very sophisticated Thai experience.

Compact fried spring rolls (US\$2-3) come in two varieties and offer a great crunch with an almost creamy texture inside. A spicy dipping sauce accompanies the rolls. Watery massaman curry (US\$4) had more of the consistency of a soup than a curry and came with more fish than seafood. All food is prepared without MSG and the restaurant will gladly deliver to your home.

#### CHIANG MAI RIVERSIDE

227Eo Sisowath Quay Tel: 011 811 456 Barely noticeable along the busy riverfront and set amongst uninspired décor, this restaurant was quite the diamond in the rough, offering good food and speedy service. Seafood lovers will enjoy the Poo Pat Pang Knee (US\$7.00), a stirfried yellow curry crab that is both tender and tasty. Give up all hope of retaining an air of sophistication as this dish is quite messy to eat! Pat See Yeuw (US\$2.50) makes a great alternative for those tired of the traditional Pad Thai. The thick noodles will leave you feeling full and satisfied. The menu has numerous vegetarian offerings, all clearly marked on its menu, and will also allow you to indicate the level of spice you want on a multi-pepper scale.

#### BANYAN RESTAURANT

245 Street 51 Tel: 012 850 065 Banyan offers a cheerful garden setting and an all-youcan-eat lunch buffet for US\$2.50 with a solid selection of options. However, quantity far surpasses quality, as nothing sampled proved particularly good. Pork ribs for US\$3.50 were far too fatty to be properly enjoyed. Clear soup with minced pork and vegetables at the same price faired slightly better. Dishes are bland and oily, as the restaurant seemingly caters to the misconception that

westerners just don't like their spices. The food suffers severely as a result.

#### REGENT PARK HOTEL

58 Sothearos Blvd. Tel: 023 427 131 or 023 427 674 Both Thai nationals and expats rave about the little known Thai restaurant in the Regent Park Hotel. The restaurant serves well-prepared and wonderfully spiced Thai cuisine for very reasonable prices in a subdued elegant setting. Long and thin spring rolls for US\$3 are arranged vertically in a glass vase and are a definite cut above the rest. Be sure to try the Tom Yung Kung (US\$4.50 to US\$6.80). With a wonderful aroma, this lemongrass and lime soup comes with shrimps galore and a big kick for those who like fiery food. The Pad Thai (US\$3) has great sweet and sour flavours, although the dried shrimp are a bit too chewy. The green curry is US\$4. Large slices of roasted beef are served alongside thick, spicy curry with huge chunks of vegetables.

#### PHNOM PENH ORCHID

7 Street 360 Tel: 023 351 10 78

Chef and owner Sotha Srong opened this small restaurant several months ago in order to bring more Thai food to Phnom Penh. The restaurant has a

simple ambience and makes for a nice air-conditioned lunchtime spot. Soft-shell crab, a rarity in Phnom Penh restaurants, was a tasty treat at US\$4.50 for eight. With a crispy fried exterior, the meat was soft and delicately accented with sautéed garlic and pepper. The red curry with roasted duck (US\$5.50) was slightly disappointing. While the curry was hearty and enjoyable, the small pieces of duck had very little meat and were difficult to eat.

#### TIC'S PLACE

#### 21 Street 63

Tel: 012 559 311 Slightly more expensive than some of the other budget Thai places, Tic's Place might not be worth the extra price for such inconsistent food and barebones atmosphere. While some dishes soar, others fail miserably. Tom Yam soup (US3.50 to US\$5) was the most boring soup sampled over the course of the review, with no hint of spice or flavour. While noodles in Lad Na (US\$3 to US\$4) were thick and enormous, they were absolutely smothered in a murky pool of oil and sauce. But perhaps the Panang curry alone warrants a visit. The coconut-peanut sauce is thick, spicy, and absolutely incredible. It very well may be some of the best curry in town.

#### INTHANOON RESTAURANT

84Eo Monireth Blvd. Tel: 011 214 949 Perhaps the city's best-kept secret for cheap and tasty Thai food, Inthanoon was a great find. Tom Ka Kai, a soup with tender chicken in simmered coconut milk, had multiple layers of flavours and soothing texture. It might just be the best Tom Ka Kai in the city! Sweet and sour

shrimp come with juicy pineapple and large chunks of vegetables. None of the food was excessively oily, unlike other places in the same price range. Typical of any great hole-in-thewall restaurant, there is little ambience aside for pink faux-Burberry tablecloths. Inthanoon is a great place to go for a massive meal as all dishes range from US\$2 to US\$3.50. A bit out of the way and hard to find, look out for the large clinic next door. 🚺

## Food Talk: In Search of Good Meat

Steve's Steakhouse brings both the taste of Greece and the wild, wild West to Cambodia. Lis Meyers chats with Steve about his longstanding restaurant and his passion for great meat.

WHEN STEVE BILLINGTON moved to Cambodia in 1997 to start the "Home of English" school, he found himself desperately seeking good meat. Having lived in Asia for over 28 years, he had spent most of his life in the field of education, starting the school in Phnom Penh for Khmer and expat children. Happening upon an opportunity to take on his own restaurant, Steve decided to provide Phnom Penh with top quality meat and the best of Greek cooking.

#### GREEK GOES WESTERN

While it seems that Steve's Steakhouse has been in town forever, the restaurant originally functioned under the name of Athena, selling strictly Greek fare on Norodom Boulevard. Steve enjoyed the food and ate there frequently. When he learned the restaurant was looking to be sold, he decided to buy the place. "The opportunity was there and I wanted to keep it alive," says Steve. Hoping to achieve a better atmosphere, he moved Athena to its current home on Street 51, just a few metres from his school.

He maintained the restaurant's Greek cuisine and original name for two years, but decided to expand into steaks and meat. "The market for Greek food at the time was so temporary," he explains. "Greek cuisine is not known by everyone and there was no local market. Steaks and burgers have a much broader appeal. So I kept the best of the Greek food and added the meat. And it just seemed natural to go with the western theme." So Steve's Steakhouse was born.

#### BETTER BEEF

Much of Steve's decision was influenced by his desire to bring better quality beef to Cambodia. He was desperate for a good steak or hamburger. Feeling this was impossible to find, he began importing top quality meat into the country.

Hoping to raise the standards of local meat, Steve began raising cows at his farm, located thirty minutes from the city off Highway One in the direction of Vietnam. Steve's father, who at the age of 87 is perhaps Phnom Penh's oldest living expat, runs the farm. Steve praises the tenderness and taste of the meat.

Steve also ensures that all cows on his farm receive humane treatment. He describes witnessing the atrocious treatment of animals at Cambodian slaughterhouses that would make anyone vegetarian. "We have the happiest cows you will ever want to see. They are well fed, well taken care of, and we make sure they never once have to suffer, not even for a second," he says. Stalls are even equipped with fans to keep the cows cool in the hottest months.

#### WELCOME TO THE WILD WEST

The restaurant has a distinctive wild-west feel. Walls are adorned with a whole range of saddles, ropes, harnesses, antique Mexican spurs, cowhides, and horseshoes, all imported from a saddle company in the states. The expansive space includes an outdoor bar area, an upstairs terrace, an air-conditioned dining room, and a recently opened VIP room for private parties.

The menu boasts an impressive array of bovine offerings hailing from the U.S., Australia, New Zealand, and Argentina. Imported steaks are sold at a **FF** We are American-style. We don't serve small portions and prefer people to go away full and not hungry **J** 

wide range of prices from US\$10 to US\$22, depending on origin, cut, and size. Local grilled steaks range from US\$7 to US\$14. The meat is juicy and tender, coming in sizes guaranteed to leave you well satisfied.

"We are American-style," Steve says. "We don't serve small portions and prefer people to go away full and not hungry." Even the smallest steaks are massive. All meat products are safe and high quality, with Steve promising that this is one of the few places in town where food can be ordered medium-rare or rare, without risking a visit to SOS the following day.

Steve's restaurant continues to be the only place with Greek food. Those wanting a large sampling of Greek flavours can order a US\$5 mezze plate with various "tidbits of the day," including tzatziki, melitzana, skordalia, and spanakapita. Steve raves about the genuine Greek salad that can be purchased for US\$4 to US\$5, depending on size.

#### THE HAPPY CARNIVORE

Steve can be found there most days around mealtime. "It's about doing something different and doing something I enjoy," he says of his business. "It's still small and friendly and the staff are like family. If the day comes when I don't enjoy coming in to the place, I will put it up for sale."

# **Recipe Corner: Ocean Grilled Seafood** with Fresh Herbs

This traditional Mediterranean recipe combines the flavour of seafood with exotic spices and fresh herbs.

INGREDIENTS (SERVES 1) 80g fillet of red snapper 80g large shrimps 80g squid 1 clove garlic Fresh herbs Olive oil Butter

Preparation time: 5 minutes

Cooking time: 10 minutes

#### **PREPARATION**

Cut the fillet of red snapper, shrimp and squid. Wash thoroughly as this is a sea fish. Chop the garlic and fresh herbs and then place to one side.

Soak the snapper and seafood in a simple marinade of salt and black pepper for at least a minute.

Place the snapper and seafood in a pan and cook on medium heat for two minutes. Add the garlic, fresh herbs and butter. Cook for a further five minutes.

Serve on a plate with courgette gratin and mashed potatoes, or other vegetables of your choice.

# **Instant Bargain Bucket**

Instant noodles are quick, easy and ridiculously cheap. They come in a plethora of flavours including chicken, pork, beef and seafood. Just throw in some boiling water and grab a spoon and fork for a speedy snack or meal. Lis Meyers browsed the aisles of Lucky Market to check out its large instant noodle selection. We selected six different brands for the ultimate bargain bucket taste test to determine which instant noodle reigns supreme!

#### Mama Instant Noodles

(US\$.40) comes in an enormous array of Thai dishes. Dried noodles appear to have already been seasoned. Nearly inedible, the broth seems to be more MSG than pork. Standard ramen noodles are boring and lacking in quality. While the package lists most of its ingredients in Thai and English, it discreetly includes its 0.95 percent MSG content only in Thai. Mama faired a distant 6th in this competition.

Vina Acecook Noodles – with large "Good" on package – (US\$0.15) is available in standard chicken, beef, pork, and seafood. While the noodles look appetising, they prove quite off-putting. The seasoning contains a strange aftertaste that does not resemble meat in any way, shape, or form. A forgettable instant noodle experience overall.

Wai Wai (US\$.20) is sold in only a few flavours including vegetable for those ramenloving vegetarians and Pork Soeng Kreung. The noodles look incredible on the package – thick and plentiful with bright coloured vegetables – it seems like this will be a real instant treat. In reality, it is okay, but not anything special. The broth has a touch of spice. Noodles have a nice texture, but are mostly ordinary. Only Thai readers will be able to discern that the dish has 0.54 percent MSG.

Goodnk Gink 4-me Instant Classic Noodles (US.30) varies from the rest in that it features glass noodles instead of the standard ramen. Made by a Thai company, the package comes with a seasoning pouch and sauce packet. While the noodles fail to look particularly appetising when raw or cooked, they are actually enjoyable and go nicely in its very spicy soup. Perhaps one of the best broths of the bunch, it actually tastes like Tom Yum! Servings are rather small and contain a whopping 1.7 percent MSG. These noodles are best enjoyed as soon as prepared, as the glass noodles will absorb the broth and congeal if allowed to sit too long.

Nong Shim Noodles (US\$.80), a Chinese Brand, comes in slightly more exciting flavours such as Shanghai Tangmyun Chicken and Hot and Spicy. The package is much larger than other brands, coming



with a large portion of thick noodles, a seasoning pouch, and a packet of dried Chinese cabbage, carrot, and chives. While definitely on the pricey end of the instant noodle spectrum, the quality of the noodles far surpasses the competition. Thicker than the average instant noodle, they are soft and tender. But the dried vegetables seem to be more decorative than taste enhancing, as the broth is disappointingly mediocre. While the soup has a subtle taste, it is over-salted and could do with a bit more of a kick to highlight the delectable noodles.

Chinese Jishihefen Noodle (US\$.40) comes in the standard flavours and Korean flavour with a generous supply of flat rice noodles, a seasoning pouch, a sauce packet, and a bag of dried vegetables. According to the package, the sauce contains palm tree oil, flour, hot pepper oil, and vitamin E. The pork broth is rich and has a nice kick that goes particularly well with tasty thick rice noodles. Coming in a hefty portion, it can easily serve as a meal on the go. We have a winner!

#### OODLES OF NOODLES: CONCLUSION

Chinese Jishihefen Noodles reigns supreme, while Mama Instant Noodles brought up the rear. Nong Shim is noodlicious and Chinese Jishihefen has the best broth. Goodnk Gink 4-me is also a nice surprise with glass noodles rather than ramen. All dishes contain MSG. For your own instant noodle taste test and ultimate bargain bucket, head to the pasta aisle at Lucky Super Market and try, taste, and slurp away!

A growing number of Phnom Penh bars, cafés and are hosting exhibitions featuring Cambodian and international artists. Today some of the most interesting and important works are displayed in such informal settings. Words by **Anita Surewicz.**

#### ART CAFÉ

84 Street 108, Tel: 012 834 517 www.artcafe-phnom-penh.com A sophisticated bar and bistro in the tradition of European coffeehouse culture, Art Café supports musical performances and frequently hosts art exhibitions. Anton Isselhardt started Art Café as a platform for artists to do solo exhibitions. With evening performances each weekend and revolving displays every two months he is slowly fulfilling this dream.

Art Café is currently presenting numerous musical performances supplemented by films and talks to celebrate the hundredth birthday of composer, Oliver Messiaen.

'The cuisine comes from the southwest of France, near the German border, where I was born," says Anton. Authentic Alsace-Palatinate flame cakes (US\$5.80 to US\$6.90) - a very thin-crust form of pizza with sour cream as a paste – sit alongside goulash (US\$6) and an Alsace choucroute with sauerkraut (US\$8) on the menu. The wine list includes a very dry Riesling (US\$4.20 per glass). Spending an evening here is like having a concert performance in your living room. Open from 11am to 2pm and 5pm to 11pm.



**CAFÉ LIVING ROOM** 9 Street 306, Tel: 023 726 139 Opened last August in a large two-storey villa in Boeung Keng Kang, Café Living Room features gourmet and Japanese food and has an abundance of organic vegetarian options.

"We support local businesses by using and selling organicallygrown vegetables and food that is produced and supported by established non-profit organisations and shops," says Owner Megumi Kitabatake. Some of the Living Room specialties include an array of dips (US\$3.50) curryflavoured Mekong fish (US\$4.75) and sushi (US\$5).

Art displays are changed every two months, with the next exhibitions of African art and photography by a Cambodian artist due to begin in mid-May. American artist, Leah Newman, also runs art sessions aimed at getting kids' creative juices flowing. Open from 7am to 8.30 pm, it's closed on Mondays.

#### OCEAN

11 Street 288, Tel: 012 176 6690 www.equinox-cambodia.com The freshest entrant to the list of restaurants featuring art displays had not even hosted an exhibition as of going to press. Catching the art patron bug, Ocean's owner, Herbert Ludwikowski, will exhibit paintings by the Khmer artist Chhim Sothy, throughout this month, starting May 9.

The plain white walls of the restaurant should make the ideal backdrop from which to hang the paintings. The vibrant colours of Sothy's works standing in contrast with the minamalist blank canvas.

The Mediterranean food at Ocean is equally refreshing, with the fish dishes standing out.

Time will tell whether Ocean proves as popular a venue for the arts as the two other German owned establishments – Art Café and Meta House.

While the menu is still built on wood-fired pizzas (US\$6 to US\$8.50), the heart of the menu remains a finely crafted blend of Asian, Mediterranean and western-influenced flavours. It's best to arrive during the half price happy hour from 5pm to 7pm. Open 7am to midnight.

"We will still exhibit art in the bar area as well as in a specifically designated indoor area," he says. Fans of the recent exhibition of graffiti art by French artist Theo Vallier will be pleased to hear this. Open from 7am to midnight, it's closed on Mondays.

In the past Java has pioneered events such as artistic exchanges between Vietnamese and Cambodian artists as well as video projections. Java has premiered the works of up-and-coming Cambodian artists such as Leang Seckon and Oeur Sokuntevy.

The Java menu is characterised by a great selection of coffees, salads, pancakes and sandwiches made to order on homemade bread. Some dinner options include fajitas (US\$4.50 to US\$5.50) and lots of vegetarian dishes (starting at US\$3.50). The cocktails are worth trying too, especially while watching the adjacent park burst into life from the veranda at sunset. Open 7am to 10pm.

# **Bar Talk: Freebird**

Real Americana



IT'S PRETTY EASY TO find "Dunk" once you step through Freebird's front doors. He's the one wearing the baseball cap and sitting on the stool at the far corner of the bar. He's probably chatting with a few of Freebird's regulars, and if you need further help in locating him, just look below the sign that says, "Explosives, when used properly, can be a wonderful source of entertainment." Since taking over and reopening Freebird on Jul. 4, 2005, Dunk's been overseeing the evolution of the Freebird bar, taking pleasure in seeing the development of what he calls "the Freebird family."

Dunk first arrived in Cambodia in 1990 looking for missing in action prisoners of war, and fell in love with the place. He came back for work throughout the 90s, and even though he feels that the changes between then and now are immense, he's happy to call Phnom Penh his home

A TASTE OF AMERICANA An explosive ordinance technician, Freebird's décor and character reflect Dunk's experience in that field. Filled with Americana memorabilia, including everything from black and

white photos of cowboys to signs for Route 66, the bar's most noticeable objects are those relating to the U.S. military. During his non-bar time, Dunk still is involved in explosive ordnance disposal.

Before Freebird, Dunk used to go to bars after work and, as he admits, wished that they would do this or that differently. "Finally, a friend said, 'Why don't you just do it yourself and make it just the way you'd want it to be done?" he explains.

When he took control of Freebird, Dunk didn't simply continue it as it was. "At first, the old customers were irate with the changes," he says. But nothing stays the same, and over time, Freebird has evolved. He credits his staff for developing the bar into what it is today.

"Originally, the clientele was a rougher crowd, but the staff brought to my attention that this wasn't what they had been told it would be like," he says. As a result, Freebird reformed, under the leadership of the staff, and the majority of Freebird's bartenders are the same ones that started on opening day, a sure sign of the creation of a cohesive family.

# The Sweet Smell of Sweat

Breaking sweat doesn't have to come with a hefty price tag. While local gyms may not be airconditioned, they offer a no-nonsense workout for those who care less about the ambience and more about the muscle. Words by Nora Lindstrom.

#### VIP SPORTS CLUB

Boasting not only a gym, but also a 20-metre swimming pool, three tennis courts, table tennis, steam rooms, a sauna and a small restaurant, this place is definitely worth a visit. Plenty of parking spaces for cars provide an added bonus as do lockers, complimentary towels and drinking water. The gym at VIP is airy and well-equipped with a large amount of cardio equipment as well as fixed weight machines and some free weights. Staff are at hand to explain how some of the more

quirky looking machines work, although they have been known to go on disappearing acts. It's also best to bring along an iPod to drown out the hip hop emanating from the cheap sound system In all, a great spot for a decent workout followed by relaxation in the sun beds by the pool. A visit without access to the tennis courts costs US\$4, or US\$6 with access to the pool. Monthly rates are US\$50 to US\$60 all inclusive. Open 6am to 9pm.

#### PADDY'S GYM

635 National Road 5 just past the Japanese Bridge, Tel: 012 214 940 Bearing the air of boxing clubs in American films, Paddy's

Gym offers an honest, sweaty workout. Open from 6am to 8pm, this place is packed with weight machines recently imported from the U.S., as well as a decent amount of cardio equipment. There's also a very good range of free weights, a boxing ring, several boxing bags and an aerobics space complete with disco lights. No air-conditioning or shower rooms, but the cheerful and helpful staff, will throw in a training programme as well as impromptu personal training. Lockers are available on request. Adding to the feel-good factor at Paddy's is that it also supports a group of street kids through free meals and training. Entrance is US\$3 (2,000 riel for Cambodians), or US\$45 per month.

#### RAMA FITNESS CENTRE

Cnr. of streets 180 and 63 Located centrally on a small side street, at 2,000 riel a workout, or US\$12.50 per month Rama Fitness Centre is definitely cheap. Inside are several fixed weight machines, mainly for the upper body, as well as free weights and a range of cardio equipment much in disrepair. Dirt, dust and cobwebs await inside. There are no lockers and the female toilet is also used by men. If price is

your guide or you are simply looking to lift some weights, it is perhaps worth a try, just remember that price is often an indication of quality.

#### SOMRACH BODY BUILDING CLUB

Western end of Street 182 Well-known among locals and no wonder – it is only 500 riel per visit. Getting there without your own transport will cost you more than the entry. With very basic cardio equipment, some weight machines, and a row of flat bench presses, price reflects quality. However, it is by no means dirty or smelling of sweat. It's open from 4.30am to 8.30pm. Prepare to get stared at, especially if you are a woman.

#### OLYMPIC STADIUM

Monireth Blvd. Whoever came up with the idea of daily aerobics classes at the Olympic Stadium was truly inspired. Starting around 5pm, classes in different styles - try out the traditional Khmer dancing - gather at the breezy top to boogie away in the beautiful sunset. For 500 riel this is a bargain and definitely worth checking out. Follow it by running up and down the stairs to the pitch and back, and you've done a proper day's workout. A

Seaweed, sea vegetables and river moss, have an abundance of precious minerals and enzymes not easily obtained in other food sources. For instance, other than fish, sea vegetables are the only natural source of iodine. Inherent in all seaweeds are vitamins E, A, B1, B12 and C, as well as calcium, iron and some proteins. Each type has specific qualities.

Arame, dulse, hiziki, Irish moss, kanten, kelp, kombu, nori, sea palm and wakame are the most readily available.

Kelp is the highest in calcium. Kelp forests are deeply rooted in the seabed. They form large structures that are strong yet flexible, keeping them anchored during severe storms. Calcium is reflected in their form.

Nori, the black sheet used to make sushi, has the highest protein.

Red dulse is the highest in iron, helpful against anaemia. Some contain sodium

alginate, a compound that can help move radioactive material from the body. All

# Jim Cousins: GET YOUR VACCINATIONS

MANY OF YOU PROBABLY take vaccinations for granted. You come from countries where vaccinations are routinely required in childhood, and where you may have received advice about vaccinations before living or travelling abroad. But, vaccination requirements have probably changed since you were children. They change all the time. Medical and pharmaceutical research has made the world a safer place to travel in than it was only twenty years ago - at least as regards infectious diseases - but the diseases still exist. Being aware of the risks and taking proper preventive measures, will help to keep you healthy.

Vaccination recommendations are usually based on scientific evidence of risks versus benefits. That is to say, the risks of actually having the disease, or of having a bad reaction to the vaccination itself, compared with not getting the disease, developing some lasting immunity to the disease and staying healthy. The goal, of course, is to prevent serious illness, its consequences, and death.

#### THE PRIMARY SERIES: CHILD-HOOD AND ADOLESCENCE

Standard childhood and adolescent vaccination schedules are generally universal in most developed countries around the world, though these may differ somewhat from country to country. These 'primary' vaccination series have pre-determined administra-



tion intervals in order to best provide long-lasting protection. Many require boosters in order to do so. A child, or even adult, may be at risk for a vaccine-preventable illness when travelling to a country where a disease exists for which he was not vaccinated as a child.

# TRAVELLERS AND

Travellers and expats from countries with developed health systems may be at more risk from vaccinepreventable diseases, if not previously vaccinated, than in their home country. These diseases may be transmitted through respiratory illnesses like influenza or tuberculosis, or through contaminated food and water – the faecal-oral route – as is the case with hepatitis A, typhoid, polio, or cholera. Tetanus and rabies – both almost 100 percent fatal – as well as Japanese encephalitis, may be contracted from injuries or bites through the skin. Hepatitis B is a bloodborne disease transmitted through infected body fluids, usually sexually transmitted or through blood transfusions, which may not be entirely safe in developing countries.

#### PROTECTING YOURSELF

Most vaccines can be given on the same day. This is not a very fun way to get vaccinated, but is useful for travellers who haven't planned well enough in advance. Some childhood vaccines are grouped together into a single injection. This is not usually the case for travelnecessary vaccines.

It can take a month or more for some vaccines to produce protection, so the quick fix or quick catch-up idea is not ideal when going

to a high-risk destination. Some vaccines may require more than one dose for best protection. Preparations of immune globulin - immediate short-term antibody protection for those who may have, or may have had. an unexpected exposure without previous protection - exist for some vaccinepreventable diseases. These formulations are not often readily available and may be very expensive. It's better to be vaccinated.

So, don't make excuses. Get vaccinated! All children and adults should be vaccinated. Get advice from your doctor for your particular situation and geographic location. Verify that you are getting quality, international standard, 'cold chain' protected vaccination products. Carry your vaccination record with you when travelling. The World Health Organization International Certificate of Vaccination is internationally recognised and is usually printed in several languages.

However, bear in mind that vaccinations do not take the place of safe hygiene, health and risk control practices no matter where you are living or travelling.

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# Amrita: Reviving the Past, Creating the *Future*

The current explosion in the Phnom Penh visual arts scene masks the fact that things are moving along pretty well in the performing arts as well. **Mark Jackson** talks with **Fred Frumberg**, executive director of Amrita Performing Arts.

THREE WOMEN ARE SITTING huddled together. They tell the story of their survival from the Khmer Rouge regime. The setting though is not a traditional wooden house somewhere in the provinces, but the stage. 'Three Years, Eight Months, 20 Days' is one of Amrita Performing Arts most original works.

Veteran Dutch theatre director, Annemarie Prins asked the actresses to write down their own stories. These were then set to a style of prose reminiscent of the great post-modern playwright Samuel Beckett, and performed on a stark stage. While talking the women create clay figurines. These represent the victims being marched out of Phnom Penh at the onset of the genocidal regime. As well as being performed in Cambodia, the play met public acclaim at the 2007 Singapore Arts Festival. It is due to tour the U.S. in January 2009.

#### NO VOLUNTEER

Becket-style stage performances are a long way removed from Amrita's origins. Executive director and founder, Fred Frumberg, first came to Cambodia in June 1997 as a UN Volunteer. With a background in production management for the performing arts – including stints at the Netherlands Opera and the Paris Opera – Fred came to Cambodia to help with the revival and preservation of the performing arts.

He first came, on a one-year stint, out of "frustration with the 'heat and serve' style of producing large scale work at the Paris Opera." Once he came here, like so many others, he was moved by the determination and resilience of Cambodian artists. "I soon realised that what they did not need was short-term volunteers

trying to work out karma, so I decided to stay on," he says. After six years of funding from UNESCO. Fired abtained

from UNESCO, Fred obtained a grant from the Rockefeller Foundation and obtained U.S. non-profit status for Amrita in July 2004.

At first the focus of the organisation was the revival and preservation of classical theatre and dance. Already being revived by surviving masters after the fall of the Khmer Rouge regime, Amrita built on this regenerative process.

"The new aspect we were able to add was expertise in production management – the means to put on stage the results of what the artists had already spent years researching, documenting and resurrecting," he explains.

The initial fruits of Amrita's efforts were plentiful. Large-scale public performances, research and documentation programmes, regional workshops and international tours of classical dance throughout the U.S. and Asia progressed. The group also appeared at London's Barbican Centre and at the Melbourne International Arts Festival.

#### MORE CONTEMPORARY ARTS

In 2005, Amrita shifted its emphasis towards more contemporary work.

"It became clear that the young artists were eager to discover their own contemporary dance and theatre vocabulary," says Fred.

This was a delicate process. At the same time as Amrita helped young artists find their voice, it needed to respect and preserve the legacy of the masters of their craft.

Amrita sought out collaborative partners within Southeast Asia. One such partnership, with Pichet Klunchon from Thailand, led to the creation of 'Revitalising Monkeys and Giants." This contemporary reinterpretation of the classical masked dance, Lakhaon Khaol, has been performed in Phnom Penh, Kuala Lumpur and Singapore.

Due to the limitations in the country's theatre, the organisation's approach to work in this medium was different. "Cambodia has a tradition of modern theatre developed in the 40s and 50s that has been revived but remains entrenched in dated French traditions," says Fred. "These are augmented with exaggerated acting techniques inspired by the worst aspects of Thai and Chinese soap opera," he adds.

'Three Years, Eight Months, 20 Days', is an example of a more international approach. "The Becket-style of clear and simple poetry-like story telling proved a valuable tool in getting the actresses to focus on the reality of the story, and not only rely on the emotion," says Fred. Also teachers, they have continued to incorporate this performance style in both their work and teachings, he adds.

The collaboration with Prins is continuing. A new piece with the Dutch director, based on the Khmer Rouge tribunals, is currently in progress. The play is due to tour provinces around Cambodia in early 2009.

#### BUILDING AN ARTISTIC COMMUNITY

Clearly excited by his on-going work, Fred feels that the organisation's goal of reducing the dependency of Cambodian performance artists on others, is being realised. The organisation's other staff – Country Director, Suon Bun Rith; Programme Coordinator, Kang Rithisal; and Office Manager, Sin Sokunthea – are all Khmer. All the artists are hired on a project-by-project basis.

"Cambodia is once again a respected player on the international stage and can hold its own at any international festival or forum," says Fred. He attributes this success to the work of other performing arts organisations, such as the Khmer Arts Ensemble, Cambodian Living Arts, Sovanna Phum, PHARE and Epic Arts.

One example of this is 'Transmission of the Invisible.' Choreographed by Canadian director Peter Chin, the work premiered at the Harbour Front International Arts Centre in Toronto on Jan. 7. Two Cambodian dancers, Yim Savann and Phon Sopheap, joined three Canadian dancers in a piece, reflecting Amrita's own work, that preserves the country's dance traditions while celebrating "its new-found voice **66** Cambodia is once again a respected player on the international stage and can hold its own at any international festival or forum **5**

in contemporary dance," says Fred. The work took four years of research and is due to tour Canada in early 2009.

#### WORK IN PROGRESS

While recognising that contemporary innovation in the visual arts has moved faster than in the performing arts, Fred feels that his artistic medium is catching up. 'Where Elephants Weep', a new Cambodian rock opera composed by Him Sophy, premiered in Lowell Massachusetts in April 2007. The Cambodian premiere is due to be in Phnom Penh on Nov. 28, this year. Amrita is coproducing this premier with producer John Burn in collaboration with Cambodian Living Arts.

Other projects this year include four dancers joining French-Cambodian choreographer Emmanuele Phuon in Florida in August, and two dancers joining the World Dance Alliance global summit in Brisbane in July.

None of this means that Fred has lost focus of the reason he came to Cambodia in the first place. "The process of revival and preservation is far from complete," he says. "Much of the classical repertory has yet to be revived."

Corporate sponsorship is now allowing Amrita to put on large-scale performances of traditional repertory. On Jun. 7 and Jun. 8, Amrita will stage some Cambodian classical dance at the Chenla Theatre, sponsored by ANZ Royal Bank. Fred is seeking more local sponsors to help expand this programme.

Confident of the future of Cambodia's performing arts, Fred looks forward to the day when "a community of dynamic young artists will eventually take the reigns and set the agenda for the future of Cambodian performing arts."

RENOWNED PHOTOGRAPHER and the author of twenty-three books on photography, Michael Freeman's latest book is written in simple English with a jargonfree, comprehensive glossary. The opening section of the book covers hardware, ranging from cameras to scanners and printers. Then follows a complete workshop on the use of imageediting tools. The last two sections cover techniques for taking your camera out "on the road" and producing professionalquality photographs capturing movement, sky tones, buildings, animals and much more. A beautiful book with over 600 illustrations, absolutely teaming with ideas and information on how to improve your photography, it comes complete with a free, updated CD.

"Near to Nirvana" is how Bobby Chinn describes the



flavours and diversity of Vietnamese food. The fusionstyle recipes, photographed by award- winning photographer Jason Lowe, range in complexity from something as simple as chicken wings to more challenging fusion dishes put together by this famous chef. From Egyptian and Chinese parentage, Bobby Chinn was born in New Zealand, educated in England, lived in America and currently resides in Hanoi. The versatility of his experience shines through in both his recipes and the autobiographical narrative interspersing the recipes. For diners who love healthy food, the book abounds with low fat and vegetarian recipes. There are also some delicious combinations of ingredients. Delicious!

*The Art of Undressing* tells the story of Ginger, a trainee

chef and her stripper mother Poppy. Inhibited by her surgically-enhanced, single, beautiful mother, Ginger feels humiliated when she sells sex aids for her mother at her lessons for would-be strippers. Sometimes vulgar, sometimes very funny the novel manages to link food and sex in a clever way. Contemporary concerns of eating disorders among the young, the need for the gym and refusing fattening food is carefully explored. The need to be sexually versatile for its own state is juxtaposed against the view that love should be enough to bring sexual fulfilment. Ginger fears that she will become "a weirdo spinster hoarding her mother's vibrators as if they were going to be collector's items some day." Definitely worth a read if you can

cope with very overt sexual references!

Girl-chic, designer novel, The Great Betraval manages to successfully trivialise the most painful human experiences. Shallow-thinking, sexual stereotyping and the need for designer clothes to assuage feelings of guilt and loss, are endemic in the characters. Millenia Black takes on the universal themes of young death, child pornography, the sex trade and incest, to little effect. We never get a sense of why the characters engage in such extreme behaviour. The two main women in the novel, Leslie and Dawn, never really trust each another and are jealous of each other's successes. The men are totally unbelievable and just let their genitals rule their heads. There is a twist in the tale, but a tasteless one.

This romantic drama was adapted from the best selling novel by Monica Ali. It explores the difficulties that Bangladeshi immigrants have in adjusting to life in inner city London. Childhood images of Bangladesh are replaced by the concrete mass of London's depressing and over-crowded housing estates. Such a monumental transition inevitably brings with it feelings of fear, disappointment, loss of self-esteem, guilt and anger. Gavron explores these emotions by tracing the lives of one immigrant family. A sensitive and realistic analysis of immigrant life in Britain there are strong performances from Tannishtha Chatterjee, Satish Kaushik and Christopher Simpson. Surprisingly good!

#### THE PAINTED VEIL John Curran (2006)



Based on the classic Somerset Maugham novel and set in the 1920s, this romantic

drama depicts the lives of a middle-class doctor Walter (Edward Norton) and an upper-class woman Kitty (Naomi Watts). The couple marry for the wrong reasons to devastating effect. The film explores the pain of rejection and the inability of two people to communicate their true feelings to one another until disaster strikes. Set mainly in Shanghai and a remote village in China, the brilliant cinematography captures the mood of the period. The performances by the two main characters are finely balanced and there are excellent supporting roles by Diana Rigg, Toby Jones, Bin Wu, Lorraine Lawrence and Johnny Lee Don't miss!

ANNIE HALL Woody Allen (1977)



Described as a nervous romance, this Woody Allen film creates its own genre. Alvy Singer (Allen) is a New York comedian, who falls in love with a very nervous and talented singer, Annie Hall (Diane Keaton). Alvy is extremely pessimistic and is obsessed with death. This naturally impacts on their developing relationship. His performance is punctuated with asides to the audience and Allen's trademark ironic one-liners. The film serves as a historic document of love in the 1970s, clearly outlining the romantic idealism and introspection of the time. A true classic!

#### DUFFY



Exactly how pop should be, refreshingly simple, well produced with great vocals and uplifting melodies. The debut album from 23-year-old Duffy (Aimee Anne Duffy), who hails from North Wales, it is reminiscent of Amy Winehouse's brilliant retro sound. This girl may even be better. The music oozes with the sound of the sixties - her brilliant voice has already had comparisons with Dusty Springfield. The title track could easily be Dusty complete with its black and white video. Rockferry - a real place near Liverpool - isn't instantly commercial and failed to make the top 40, but don't let that put you off. The second single Mercy has found its way to the U.K. No. 1 spot. Rightly so, it's the best single this year and with a great video to match. The next single will be the slow and melodic Warwick Avenue. Writing every song on the album, indications are that Duffy has bags of talent. For me it's a must buy!

#### ELBOW The Seldom Seen Kid



This Manchester band has been around since 1991 and The Seldom Seen Kid is their fourth album. This time they have produced, mixed and recorded their music without any outside help. For me, Guy Garvey's vocals just aren't different enough. A good example is the song Mirrorball. At times I found the album difficult to navigate as the melodies are not clearly defined. The Bones Of You has an interesting drum pattern and nice harmonies. Grounds For Divorce, the first single lifted from the album. was a pleasant surprise with plenty of nice open-string guitar and catchy hand clapping along to lyrics, such as I've been working on a cocktail called grounds for divorce. For me it's the album's highlight. I found myself waiting for them to simply jazz things up a bit, eventually losing interest in its slow pace.

#### **U**2

The Joshua Tree



This month's classic was released in March 1987. The bands fifth album went on to win album of the year at the 1988 Grammy's, reaching No. 1 in both the U.K. and U.S. charts. Selling 20 million copies worldwide, it remains their biggest selling album. The sell-out worldwide Joshua Tree tour took the brand to a new level of stardom. With Or Without You was the album's lead single. Standing up well to time, it's considered by many to be the group's most emotional song. I Still Haven't Found What I Am Looking For has always been a personal favourite - a great live version can be found in the Rattle & Hum movie, Where The Streets Have No Name is the only evidence of the old U2. Bono states the lyrics can mean whatever you want them to, but it's often interpreted as a reference to the streets of Belfast. A tribute to America, for all its gloom, there are some brilliant musical moments. 🛃

# The Office: Senaka Fernando

The first in a series of interviews with the movers and shakers in Phnom Penh's business world is with the Chair of the British Business Association of Cambodia.



The accountant Senaka has helped developed the accountancy profession in Cambodia

**AL** – How long have you been in Cambodia?

SF – Last December I had completed 13 years. Initially I came in September 1994 for one assignment and I permanently moved here from the beginning of 1995. I set up the Ernst & Young office, which was closed in July 2000 and sold to PWC. I continued with PWC.

## **AL** – What made you decide to come here?

**SF** – I was in Vietnam for two years and I was asked to come and do the audit of the Coca-Cola operations here. I liked the place. The opportunity came to get the Ernst & Young practice going. I was asked if I was willing to move here and I said fine. In Vietnam I was in Hanoi. In If That's the one thing that I would consider for me as a personal success – training people and seeing them moving on.

1993 to 1994 it was a very difficult time in Vietnam. Vietnam was not liveable for me. This feels more like Sri Lanka – the culture, religion, the people – I feel at home. That's the reason I decided to move here when the opportunity came. **AL** – Why did you decide to stay? **SF** – As an expatriate the financial rewards and the job satisfaction are large. Here you are a big fish in a small pond. Back home in Sri Lanka, or any other country, you are just one of the many. The job satisfaction is difficult to explain because you feel as if you have contributed something ... to the development of this place and the accounting profession as a whole. That satisfaction is great.

AL – Presumably when you arrived here there wasn't much of an accountancy profession? SF – When I opened the Ernst and Young office, there was just one professional staff member, myself, the driver, the receptionist, the office manager, the tea lady, and the guard – that was it. Now at PWC we have more than 100 people.

**AL** – Over the years, what have been the major changes that you've seen?

**SF** – In 1994 / 1995 there were not many rules and regulations for the commercial sector. Gradually over the years many of the laws that were needed have been passed. Cambodia gaining WTO membership is fine. The establishment of the local institute of accountancy, the accounting standards and guidelines, they've all been put in place. And the country itself has developed over the years, the infrastructure has improved, as has the security situation. In 1995 the first piece of advice was not to go out after 9pm. Now it's completely different. It has developed over the years and I hope for this to continue.

AL – What do you think has been your biggest success?SF – It's developing the accounting profession and training of the staff. When

I came here there were not many Cambodians who were qualified in accountancy. Now we have about 12 to 13 professional accountants with an international standard qualification... Capacity building here is an issue. People are very trainable in this country. They are willing to learn, to take advice and progress. That's the one thing that I would consider for me as a personal success training people and seeing them moving on.

AL - How high would you rate accountancy in Cambodia internationally?

SF – Cambodia does not have an accounting qualification as such, so what we do is to put people through the ACCA (Association of Certified Corporate Accountants) programme from the U.K. In total there are approximately 25 to 26 fully qualified ACCA members, PWC has about 13 of them.

AL – What would you say are the greatest challenges in doing business here?

SF – It's retention of staff, at PWC anywhere in the world, we are regarded as a training ground. So here the biggest challenge I face is keeping the good people. After three to four years they become very marketable and attractive to the commercial sector. If someone with three to four years' experience leaves, you can't find a replacement, you have to start the process all over again. That is the biggest challenge.

AL – If you were able to change one policy in order to improve business in Cambodia, what would it be?

SF – To change the perception and image of Cambodia, because outside Cambodia people still think that there are landmines in Phnom Penh, it is a dangerous place, people carry guns, etc. I don't think there are enough people in the government who can go out there and promote Cambodia. They need a good PR person. Road shows for instance, investment promotion – that is something that I would do. To change the image of Cambodia to say it's not the Cambodia of 1975 to 1979 - it's bustling, it's booming, come visit, things are different. 🖪

## Trevor Keidan: Diversification = Protection II



#### LAST MONTH I ADVISED

that diversification is the best way of protecting your investment portfolio from unexpected risks, such as the 2007 subprime crisis. This month I will explain how fund managers can diversify your portfolio.

#### **EQUITIES**

A global equity portfolio is now very easy to achieve by utilising 'fund of funds.' A manager selects different funds in each sector and each country based on a 'best of breed' approach. No single manager can be the best in every single market but a fund of funds allows a manager to construct a portfolio made up of 15 or 20 of the best sub-managers.

#### BONDS

Similarly a fund of bond funds can provide exposure to the best bond managers worldwide. It can provide diversification across sovereign debt and emerging market debt, as well as corporate bonds of all ratings.

#### **PROPERTY**

Despite the current weakness in the U.S. and U.K. property markets, property is still a core asset for any well-diversified portfolio. The growing number of Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) and funds of property funds makes it simple to gain exposure to global property markets. Less cyclical property strategies that invest in student accommodation or reversionary ground rents, can make the return largely independent of property value fluctuations.

#### **COMMODITIES**

Investing in commodities used to be the preserve of large institutional traders but recent years have seen more and more commodityfocused retail funds. Some of these invest in all types of commodities while others are more specialist focussing on single assets such as gold or asset classes such as agriculture. Despite the strong run in the price of many commodities such as gold and oil in recent years, commodity cycles generally last between 15 and 20 years. Many experts suggest there is a lot of upside left for most commodities due to the industrialisation of countries like China, India and Brazil. The JP Morgan Natural Resources Fund managed by Ian Henderson has returned 476 percent growth in the past five years. It provides exposure to precious metals, base metals, energy and soft commodities through a single fund.

#### CTAS

One of the most exciting and useful new fund types for portfolio diversification is the

CTA fund – or Commodity Trading Advisors. CTA funds invest in commodity futures and options, seeking to achieve absolute positive returns.

Whether

markets rise or fall, a CTA fund can achieve positive returns for the fund by taking long or short positions. Most CTA funds use sophisticated computer models to trade commodity markets based on price movement trends. Such models can run 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. The higher volatility and low correlation with traditional asset types make CTA funds ideal tools for diversification.

#### HEDGE FUNDS

A generic term applied to many varied types of alternative investment funds, hedge funds have the ability to go short in a market as well as long, therefore generating absolute positive returns regardless of market direction. The numerous different strategies available for fund managers can be broadly grouped into opportunistic strategies, relative-value strategies and event-driven strategies. Often perceived as high-risk investments for the megawealthy, their performance is more directly attributable to the manager's skill than with traditional funds. Nowadays however there are many different hedge funds with varying risk profiles and a growing number of 'fund of hedge funds.' It is relatively easy to gain exposure to

a wide range of managers and strategies with as little as US\$10.000. Some of the multimanager funds even come with a capital guarantee underwritten by large banks such as Citibank and HSBC - so you can never lose your capital. Furthermore they offer rising guarantees so that each year a portion of profits is

# **Burgers without Borders**

Serving burgers with an exotic touch, Siem Reap's only specialty burger café has the potential to be more than a cool name. Words by **Diana Saw.** 

ALMOST ANY EATERY IN Siem Reap will make you a burger, but for your US\$3.50, you mostly get a thin patty of local beef, with Khmer salad leaves and tomatoes served on a defrosted bun. So when a specialty burger café opened, proclaiming to serve only prime Brazilian beef, it had no trouble drawing in tourists and expats, all craving good old comfort food.

#### NOT QUITE FAST-FOOD

Located in The Passage, just south of Pub Street, Burgers without Borders is simply furnished with exposed brick walls, wooden tables and chairs, and no tablecloths. The partially visible kitchen is reassuring stainless steel. The big, high ceiling fans are perfect for a hot day, and despite the rock music streaming softly through the speakers, overall, the atmosphere is laid-back and breezy.

The burgers are priced between US\$3.75 and US\$4.75. Each patty is made with 150g of Brazilian beef. Toppings, which include bacon, blue cheese and the intriguing cranberry mayonnaise, are US\$1 each. Don't eat beef? There is also a

There is also a chicken burger and a vegetarian one, made with mixed vegetables and chickpeas with a spicy raita topping. If you sense an Indian influence, it is because the café is managed by Karthi Kayen, who runs Karmasutra – the fine Indian restaurant on Pub Street.

Also on the menu are toasted foccacia sandwiches and salads. If you are keen to try the salads, an order of grilled chicken breast is accompanied with two salads of your choice (US\$4.50). I chose the green chilli hummus and the Waldorf.

#### THE MEAL

The two grilled chicken steaks were plump and moist and came with big dollops of salads. I enjoyed the Waldorf with its fresh crunchy apples and liked that they did not stinge on large purple grapes and walnuts. However, the green chilli hummus was not anywhere near as spicy as the name suggested. Nonetheless, it was tasty, if a bit dry. A little more olive oil and it would have been perfect.

We also had the beef burger (US\$3.75). A definite two-hander, the burger was beautifully stacked and did not disappoint. The sesame-seed bun was toasted, the beef juicy. A mild tomato relish, a leaf of lettuce and slices of raw onion and fresh tomato completed the tower. The best burger I've had in a long time, it was only halfway through the meal that I realised it did not come with fries. Of course I ordered some, because what's a burger without fries?

The bowl of crinkle cut fries (US\$1.50) was piping hot and substantial, but clearly from a packet. In keeping with the mild flavours experienced so far, the fries were served plain. When asked why fries are served separately,

Karthi Kayen explained he could not afford to include fries with the burger because he uses expensive Brazilian beef at a cost of US\$13 a kilogramme (a quick calculation shows the patty costs almost US\$2). At the same time, he is unwilling to put up prices. Still, I enjoyed my burger and was quite happy to forgo French fries for a better cut of meat.

#### SOY SHAKES

The drinks menu is limited, with a selection of soft drinks and beers, but shakes are taken seriously. Listed as a separate category, Burgers without Borders' shakes are all made

with soymilk and you can choose from four flavours (US\$2.75). The friendly waitress was happy to accommodate my dining companion's request to replace the soymilk with water, but the result was a watered down passion fruit and raspberry drink. I had the apple cinnamon, but all I could taste was the soy.

#### MORE BURGERS

Currently, there are only six burgers on offer. Kayen says there are plans for more burger varieties, including lamb, pork and more vegetarian creations. The café tends to get busy in the evenings, so it's best to go for a late lunch.

With imagination and a dedication to deliver on what is advertised, Burgers without Borders could definitely stand out as much for its food as for its name.

#### FIRSTS

A holiday celebrated throughout most of the world, to mark **Labour Day, May 1** was also the day that Great Britain was formed with the union of England and Scotland in 1707. Wales had been part of England since the 1500s.

Almost three hundred years later (2004), **May 1** also marked the day that ten new member states – Poland, Hungary, the Czech Republic, Slovakia, Slovenia, Lithuania, Latvia, Estonia, Malta and Cyprus – joined the existing 15 countries of the E.U.

The Channel Tunnel, a 31.4-mile rail tunnel linking two countries of the E.U. – the U.K. and France – was officially opened on **May 7**, **1994** by Queen Elizabeth II and President François Mitterrand in a ceremony at Calais. Plans for a fixed link between the two nations dated back to 1802.

The month of May was a successful one for aviation pioneers. On May 20, 1927, Charles Lindbergh took off from Roosevelt Field, Long Island, in the Spirit of St. Louis. Thirty-three hours later he became the first man to make a solo non-stop flight between New York City and Paris. Exactly five years later, Amelia Earhart became the first woman to fly solo across the Atlantic. Her 2,026-mile flight from Newfoundland, Canada, to Londonderry, Northern Ireland took about 13 hours.

"What hath God wrought?" was the first official message sent by the telegraph's inventor Samuel Morse. The message was sent from the Capitol building in Washington to Baltimore on May 24, 1844.



#### BIRTHDAYS

Author of Il Principe (The Prince), Italian philosopher Niccolo Machiavelli was born in Florence on **May 3, 1469**. In Il Principe, Machiavelli prescribes the means by which a prince should maintain power. By advocating a pragmatic form of government, the philosopher is credited with bringing about the break between realism and idealism in political thought.

Philosopher and political thinker, Karl Marx, was born in Treves, Germany on **May 5, 1818.** Marx wrote Das Kapital (Capital) and The Communist Manifesto (1848), which formed the basis of Communist political doctrine.

Another Ĝerman who had a major impact on the twentieth century, Sigmund Freud was born in Freiberg on **May 6, 1856.** The founder of psychoanalysis, in many respects Freud is the father of modern psychology.

On a literary note, Italy's greatest renaissance poet, Dante Alighieri, was born in Florence on **May 14, 1265** (although the precise date is disputed). His Divine Comedy is widely regarded as the greatest work in Italian literature. Dante, himself, is referred to as the "father of the Italian language."

The third person born in Florence in this month on **May 12**, **1820**, Florence Nightingale is best known for her tireless work as a nurse in the Crimean War (1853 – 1856). Possibly the most lasting contribution of the "lady with the lamp" was the creation of the modern nursing profession.

May 29, 1917 was the day that 35th U.S. President John Fitzgerald Kennedy was born in Brookline, Massachusetts. The youngest man ever elected as President, he was also the first Roman Catholic. Kennedy was gunned down in Dallas, Texas on Nov. 22, 1963, making him the fourth U.S. President to be assassinated.

#### EVENTS

On **May 7, 1915**, the British passenger ship Lusitania was torpedoed by a German submarine off the coast of Ireland. 1,198 of its 1,924 passengers, including 114 Americans, were killed in the attack, which led to America's entry into World War I. Conversely **May 7, 1945** was the date that Field Marshall Alfred Jodl signed the unconditional surrender of all German fighting forces at Reims, France, bringing to an end World War II in Europe.

Nelson Mandela became the first black President of South Africa on **May 10, 1994** in the post-Apartheid country's first free elections.

Another ruler literally took it in his own hands to become Emperor of France on **May 18, 1804**. Napoleon Bonaparte seized the crown from the hands of Pope Pius VII during his coronation at Versailles and crowned himself.

Another Pope, John Paul II, was shot twice at close range while riding in an open automobile in St. Peter's Square in Rome on **May 13, 1981.** The Pope recovered and later held a private meeting with the would-be assassin, publicly forgiving him.

Finally, a disaster that effectively ended commercial airship traffic occurred on **May 6, 1937**. The German airship Hindenburg burst into flames at Lakehurst, New Jersey, following a trans-Atlantic voyage. Thirty-six of the 97 passengers and crew were killed.
