





#### WINE, WINE WINE

#### THE ROYAL PLOUGHING CEREMONY

Everyone was out in their best the morning of Friday, May 23 for the annual Royal Ploughing Ceremony or Pithi Chrat Preah Neangkol. The event, which heralds the beginning of the official Rice-Planting Season, was presided over by His Majesty King Norodom Sihamoni.

Hundreds of school children jostled for a look at the majestic royal bulls. The procession went as planned despite a slight altercation when one of the lead bulls decided he'd had enough. For a moment things looked as though they might end in tears as he headed for the naval brass band. Quite the astute music critic.

After the ceremonial threetimes round the royal park the court Brahmins led the bulls to a podium of seven receptacles. As one-thousand years of Brahman tradition dictates, each was filled respectively with rice, corn, beans, sesame, fresh-cut grass, water and rice whisky. The two regal bulls sampled the rice, corn and beans. According to the palace foretellers, this marks a good year to come for Khmer farmers in each of these crops.

#### HOUSE MUSIC


A reception was held on May 8 at the German Ambassador's residence to mark the handing over of nine musical instruments to the Cambodian ART+ Foundation. The instruments, with a total value US\$12,000, were donated by the Goethe Institute of Jakarata.

A programme of traditional house music accompanied the handing over of the instruments. Uy Tach, Mao Samnag, El Leang, Anton Isselhardt and Friedrich Kleinknecht played pieces by Mozart and Marc-Antoine Charpentier. The ART+ Foundation "promotes the essential role of 'making music' in the education and development of young Cambodians in the continuous improvement of the Cambodian art education system," according to its director, Anton Isselhardt.

The semi-annual cyclo centre rally commenced last month on May 2. This event was an initiative to raise funds for the Cyclo Centre Phnom Penh and this year to generate awareness for 'World No Tobacco Day' -May 31. 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

## Phnom PenhLIFE: Dr. Sex

**Dr. Andrew Thomson** first came to Cambodia to help, and now over a decade later finds himself back in Phnom Penh. **Nora Lindstrom** talks to the humanitarian about then and now.



Andrew Thomson Humanitarian Hero

"I'D LIKE TO WINDSURF again" says Andrew Thomson, "you know in '91 I windsurfed across the Mekong to the Cambodiana for brunch and they served me despite the wet suit." Being the first to windsurf on the Mekong is only one of his many anecdotes, but it is by no means the only claim to fame for one of the authors of Emergency Sex (and Other Desperate Measures).

#### HUMANITARIAN WORK

Andrew first came to Cambodia in 1990 from his native New Zealand to work with the Red Cross. As the UNTAC mission rolled into town in 1992, he defected to the U.N. This was to be the start of almost a decade of work in various desperate war zones, from Haiti through Bosnia to Rwanda.

These experiences contributed to the international bestseller, coauthored with Heidi Postlewait and Kenneth Cain. The three met in Phnom Penh with Postlewait and Cain also going on to work for the U.N. in various war zones. A highly personal account of living on the edge, it is also a damning critique of their employer.

The controversy following the book's publication led to Andrew's eventual resignation from the U.N.

"I don't fit into bureaucratic systems, I'm good at burning bridges," he admits.

His criticism of the U.N. is scathing – Kofi Annan is a particular target. Andrew questions the award of the Nobel Peace Prize to a man he considers directly accountable for disastrous mistakes made in war zones Andrew himself worked in.

#### BACK IN PHNOM PENH

"After living in New York for eight years I never thought I'd come back to Cambodia, I was afraid Phnom Penh would be a backwater," he says. Yet three years after having moved back Andrew is a contented man.

"It's not the same town it was in '93, there is a distinct absence of fear and Kalashnikovs, and the living conditions have improved," he says. The Phnom Penh of today is

The Phnom Penh of today is much more interesting than it was when he first came. "Back then there was just the NGO crowd, now there is real business, creative stuff, and various media," he says. "The traffic is worse, of course."

The decision to settle in Phnom Penh wasn't Andrew's alone, he had his wife and a sixmonth-old daughter to consider. "The quality of life here with a child is better than in New York," he maintains.

But it is not quality of life alone that made him return to the country. "Cambodia is such an interesting place to live, I love the Cambodian crazy sense of humour and

how much life there is out on the street," he says. "Phnom Penh is making up for lost time."

Very much centred in the capital, Andrew has not been to Siem Reap since 1993.

"I don't want to go back and find a tourist hole, when I was there you could drive around in absolute solitude," he says. "There were landmines of course, so you couldn't explore all the temples, and you would have to get out by nightfall because the Khmer Rouge was still around."

#### EMERGENCY SEX – THE BOOK


Andrew found it difficult to write about his past. "During

those years I lived between the extremes of war, love, hate and loss," he says. "It was difficult to put my visual memories into words."

Emergency Sex has now sold over 60,000 copies, and has been translated into French and Spanish. It is also a required text in some university courses. Yet what Andrew is most proud of is that copies of the book are available at the Russian Market. "When you can get a bootleg copy of your book at Psar Toul Tom Poung, that's when you know you've made it."

## **Vietnam** *Hospital*

Hospitals in Thailand and Singapore dominate the medical tourism market. One hospital a few hours drive across the border in Vietnam aims to end all that. Words by **Thomas Maresca.** 

STEP THROUGH THE SLIDINGglass doors of the hospital and feel the welcoming blast of airconditioning. Check out the airy, open lobby with its polished floors and modern furniture, the sleek architectural design of the place. Ask for directions at the multilingual information desk. Examine the facilities, the medical services on offer, the credentials of the doctors and staff.

This could be a state-of-the-art medical facility in almost any developed nation, but you are not as far away as you might think. FV Hospital (FVH) is right across the border in Ho Chi Minh City, and it's vying to become Vietnam's first medical tourism destination.

#### TARGETING CAMBODIA

The 220-bed, French-owned hospital has made Cambodia a primary target for its marketing outreach. FVH opened a representative office in Phnom Penh last year. It supplies information and coordinates everything from accommodation to transport to visas for patients making the trip to Ho Chi Minh City. At the hospital, Khmer-speaking doctors, nurses and translators are on hand.

The result is that FVH is currently treating more than 500 middle-class and well-todo Khmer patients a month – a number which is growing "tremendously," according to Dr. Jean-Marcel Guillon, the hospital's general director.

It's not hard to see why they are coming. Located in Ho Chi Minh City's Saigon South area, FVH is one of only 15 hospitals in Southeast Asia (the only in Vietnam) to be accredited by an international agency – the French HAS (Haute Autorité de Santé).

The hospital offers a comprehensive range of medical services and treatments, up-tothe-minute technology, and a medical staff comprised of over 85 overseas-trained foreign and Vietnamese doctors. All set in a luxury-class environment.

More than just medical emergencies are bringing patients across the border. "I didn't

expect it," says Jean-Marcel. "I thought they were going to come here because they were very sick. But in reality we have many, many Khmers coming here for all different types of reasons, from a basic check-up to very difficult, complicated diseases."

#### HOSPITAL OF CHOICE

Undoubtedly the hospital of choice for expats living in Vietnam, now expats in Cambodia and other international visitors have begun visiting – although not in overwhelming numbers yet. The Asian international medical tourism market is still dominated by Singapore, India, and particularly Thailand. Bumrungrad Hospital in Bangkok alone treats 400,000 international patients a year. FVH treated a total of 150,000 patients in 2007.

So why should an expat make the trip from Phnom Penh to Ho Chi Minh City instead of Thailand?

The proximity and ease of travel between Phnom Penh and Ho Chi Minh City is a factor. But the biggest and most obvious differential is price, particularly for the uninsured, although FVH does have agreements with over 40 insurance providers.

A standard delivery, for example, costs US\$800 at FVH, but nearly US\$1,200 at Bangkok Hospital. Breast augmentation at FV Hospital is US\$2,600 – it costs around US\$2,800 at Bumrungrad, and as much as US\$3,700 at Bangkok Hospital. A supercomprehensive 'executive' health

check-up costs US\$260 at FVH. At both Bangkok and Bumrungrad, it will cost around US\$400. Savings on more complicated procedures with longer hospital stays can be significantly larger.

#### LOFTY AMBITIONS

Its medical services are topnotch, but FVH is not ready to claim to be on a par with the biggest and best hospitals in Asia. "We're not a competitor of Burumgrand, or Bangkok Hospital, or Singapore – yet," says Jean-Marcel. To this end, FVH is working towards accreditation from JCI (Joint Commission International), the US-based organisation considered the gold standard of accrediting bodies.

Jean-Marcel estimates it will take 18 months to get


JCI accreditation, which will significantly help its efforts to compete in medical tourism on a global scale. The hospital has already started a marketing plan to reach international customers, offering special package deals on some of the most common procedures sought after by medical tourists – cosmetic surgery, dental care, and elective procedures such as hip and joint replacements.

All of which, if it works out as planned, could be good news for Phnom Penh residents, who will have a world-class hospital closer to home than ever before.

## **Streetsmart:** *Street 92 and around Wat Phnom*

There is much more to the Wat Phnom area than the hill. This historical centre of Phnom Penh is not to be overlooked, particularly if you are looking for fine dining options. **Nora Lindstrom** explores.



Wat you looken' at?

#### WAT PHNOM

At a mere 27 metres high, the hill at Wat Phnom is the city's highest point and one of the few compulsory tourist sights in town. Dating back to 1372 the first pagoda on this site was built to house four statues of Buddha found by Lady Penh in a koki tree that she fished out of the river. Later an altar was erected for Lady Penh, which is said to be a particularly lucky for women and also considered a powerful protector of the city.

The hill makes for a pleasant shady spot to spend an afternoon feeding the admittedly fat monkeys. On the grounds you can also get a ride on Sambo, Phnom Penh's only elephant. (Entry US\$1)

#### STREET 92

Easily the most interesting street spreading out from the roundabout around the Wat is Street 92. This includes the city's most famous hotel – Raffles Hotel Le Royal. Built in 1929 and steeped in history, the hotel has been home to celebrities, politicians and artists alike over the years. The building itself is a stunning mix of colonial, Khmer and Art Deco styles.

The hotel's Elephant Bar is one of the city's most popular expat drinking dens. Soak in the elegant surroundings and try one of the bar's two signature drinks, La Femme Fatale created in honour of the hotel's most famous visitor – Jackie Onassis – or Airavata, served in a handmade

elephant goblet. The best time to spoil yourself is during the two-for-one daily happy hour (4pm to 8pm) when the bar's resident pianist Roel Manalo fills the room with an atmosphere of as time goes by.

Equally popular with expats is the hotel's beautiful swimming pool and the Friday night seafood buffet at Café Monivong.

Next to Le Royal, the National Library is housed in a beautiful colonial building dating back to 1924. Its atmosphere is quiet verging on eerie. Although few books are available for lending and the assortment of journals is rather arbitrary, it does offer a peaceful space to search through stacks of antique French books about Cambodia. There are also some rare palm leaf manuscripts. The library is open from 8am to 11am and 2pm to 5pm and the relatively fast internet costs 1,500 riel an hour. ERDIN

Le Royal is not the only hotel on the street. The Malaysian owned 138-room, Sunway Hotel is one of the few genuine four-star hotels in town. With well-equipped rooms ranging from US\$85 per night, it is also remarkably good value for money.

Opposite the Sunway is the new U.S. Embassy. Dominating the immediate vicinity, the embassy is open from 7.30am to 9am (Monday to Thursday) for visa applications, although a

prior appointment is required. In emergencies American citizens should call 023 728 000.

#### DINING OPTIONS

Directly behind Le Royal (on Street 90) is an altogether different dining experience. The Alpine décor and smell of raclette makes you feel as if you have walked onto the set for The Sound of Music as soon as you step into Tell Restaurant. Now in its ninth year, this Swiss-run restaurant serves up excellent central European cuisine in the heart of Cambodia. The Oktoberfest delicatessen (US\$6.80) - essentially a full plate of meat - will satisfy any carnivore, and cheese lovers would consider it a crime to pass on the cheese fondue (US\$12). Wash this down with a few pints of Erdinger and you will be searching for your ski boots on exit.

A bastion of all things French, Le Deauville is another Phnom Penh institution. When owner André first opened this brasserie 14 years ago it was the only commercial establishment in the area. With separate Francophone and Anglophone seating areas around the bar, this is an idea place to become privy to an assortment of anecdotes and secrets of Phnom Penh. There is also an indoor airconditioned dining area.

Another French option is the newly renamed fine dining restaurant, 112, located on Street 102 close to its junction with Monivong Boulevard. Formerly called 102, the restaurant has gone through a couple of numerical options following the tragic death of its former owner. The original restaurant served the best French cuisine in the capital.

Further north, located inside Cara Hotel, Fusion Sushi (corner of streets 47 and 84) is stylish with a delicate attention to detail. The sushi and sashimi is some of the best in town, with the meltin-your-mouth salmon sashimi absolutely divine. The 10-piece plate for US\$9 is an excellent way of sampling a selection of the fare on offer. There are several private rooms for both large and small groups – treat yourself and four friends to a two-hour 'Special Sashimi Course' dining experience for a mere US\$150 to US\$200.

The Cara Hotel itself is another suitable alternative to hotels along the riverfront. Stylish rooms are available with or without a balcony. As rooms without balconies also lack windows, spending the extra US\$3 is recommended. Rooms start at US\$28 and include breakfast and wireless internet connection.

#### OTHER ATTRACTIONS

Wind up the night, with a blast of techno at the Casa Nightclub just north of Wat Phnom on Street 47. Don't bother showing up early as the party really only gets going after midnight.

A newcomer on the guesthouse scene, Me Mate's Place is located at 5 Street 90. With 11 rooms from US\$12 to US\$20 this place is not to be overlooked. All rooms are en-suite with terrific showers, and there's a breezy rooftop terrace. Owners Paul and Amanda hope to attract customers willing to "spend an extra buck for the difference." The imminent launch of their restaurant will ensure that this place is a force to be reckoned with.

Coming up Norodom Boulevard – on your right by the Wat Phnom roundabout – is a traditional building that houses the Cambodia Craft Cooperation (open 8.30am to 6.30pm daily). The shop sells silk products, wickerwork, silverware and pottery made by provincial artisans. The silk scarves (from US\$10) are particularly beautiful. The elephant goblets used at the Elephant Bar are made by the organisation's artisans and can be bought in the shop.

Situated at the corner of streets 47 and 90, are two shops where snooker and pool tables are made. Prices vary depending on the quality of wood used – from US\$250 for a small pool table to US\$1,500 for a proper snooker table. Ready in a day or two, this place can fulfil every bachelor's dream of having his own table to play on.

# A Clean Bill of

As Thomas Maresca's article reveals, hospitals across the border in Ho Chi Minh City are filled with Khmers seeking international standards of healthcare. Many expats choose to fly to Thailand for relatively routine surgery. Does this accurately reflect the state of healthcare provision in Phnom Penh? What facilities and treatments at an international standard are available in the capital? Mark Jackson talks to four health professionals about the state of care in Cambodia.

## Health?,

PHILIPS

"IN FIVE TO TEN YEARS THE quality of hospitals will be similar to Vietnam or Bangkok," claims Dr. Jean Claude Garen, the man behind Phnom Penh's Naga Clinic. Few people are more qualified than Jean Claude to talk about the state of healthcare provision in the capital.

Qualified as a general practitioner specialising in sports injuries in his native France, Jean Claude first came to Phnom Penh in 1994. At that time the only practising foreign GP was Dr. Gavin Scott. Jean Claude decided to stay. After unsuccessfully trying to establish his own clinic, he managed International SOS for two years, before opening Naga some eight years ago.

Why is Jean Claude's outlook so positive? Why is it not shared by the stream of Khmers and expats who seem to head for the nearest border as soon as any illness becomes complicated?

"It's not perfect," he admits. "But the young, specialist physicians trained in France, the U.K. and Australia are better than before." This gives him grounds for optimism. He believes there will be a good level of general and orthopaedic surgery available in the foreseeable future. Those requiring more specialist surgery will have to wait longer.

#### TAKES TWO GENERATIONS TO MAKE A GENTLEMAN

Jean Claude's optimistic appraisal of the state of healthcare provision in the capital is not shared by the one doctor who has been here longer than him.

"From my point of view, things haven't changed too much," says Dr. Gavin Scott.

Trained in St Andrews, Manchester and Liverpool universities as a general practitioner specialising in tropical and sexual diseases, Gavin first came to Cambodia in 1992 to establish the UN dispensary. He too decided to stay.

Like many others, part of the attraction of Phnom Penh came from his elevated status, both professionally and socially, in comparison with back home.

"It was rather pleasant being a big fish in a small pond," he admits.

This was not the only reason though. "The breadth of medical illnesses is very interesting, especially when compared with a GP's surgery in Manchester," he says.

Referring to the claim that it takes two generations – roughly equating to forty years – to make an English gentlemen, Gavin believes that building up an international standard of healthcare within the country will take time.

"It's a slow process," he says. "Cambodia needs about 40 years – from 1980 – to have a reasonable infrastructure of hospitals and schools. There's another 10 years to go."

#### CATCH 22

Apart from the well-documented destruction of the health service during the Khmer Rouge period, what are the route causes of the below par state of healthcare provision in the country?

No stranger to controversy, Gavin believes that part of the problem is caused by the exodus for healthcare overseas.

"If the Cambodian elite have any medical problems they go outside of Cambodia," he says. The quantity of middle-class Khmers currently sitting in waiting rooms in Ho Chi Minh City suggests that it is not just the elite that goes overseas for care.

It is the classic Catch 22 scenario. Without international standard healthcare both expats and wealthy Khmers go overseas for treatment, but so long as they do go overseas the standard of healthcare will not reach an international standard.

#### DEMANDING BETTER HEALTHCARE

Both Gavin and Jean Claude agree that the situation is changing for the better, despite their disagreement on timescales. Part of the reason for this is supply and demand.

"The influx of foreigners is going to demand better healthcare," claims Dr. Reid Sheftall, general and plastic surgeon at Phnom Penh's American Medical Centre.

Recently awarded a contract to provide medical care for U.S. Embassy staff, the centre is one of three international quality <sup>66</sup> The breadth of medical illnesses is very interesting, especially when compared with a GP's surgery in Manchester <sup>35</sup>

health clinics in the capital. The other two are International SOS and Naga Clinic.

Reid believes that as more and more global companies establish offices in Cambodia, the demand for international quality healthcare as part of the expat package will increase.

Nor is it just relocating expats who are requiring better care. Phnom Penh is experiencing enormous demographic changes which are placing new demands on the existing services.

Brian Ritchie has been branch manager at International SOS clinic for the last five years. In that time he has seen a shift in his patient profile.

"Cambodians have brought back experiences from overseas and fresh expectations," he says. These returnees expect more than a backstreet quack.

Like at Naga and the American Medical Centre, Khmers represent the majority of SOS's clients – many sponsored by companies and international organisations. Sue

Kemp, business development manager at International SOS, says that the number of locals on occupational health packages sponsored by their employers is increasing. SOS is responding to this growing demand.

#### SHOPPING AROUND

Things might be changing, but what can people looking for international quality healthcare expect to get at the moment?

Naga, SOS and American Medical Centre are general practice clinics. All have a range of doctors, both expat and Khmers trained overseas. As well as general practice, these provide specialist knowledge in areas such as gynaecology, paediatrics and plastic surgery. All three have outpatient beds. In addition they all evacuate patients in emergencies.

To the lay observer, the differences between the three seem minor.

Part of the attraction of International SOS is that it is international. Part of a global group with 24 clinics and offices in 50 countries, members can use any clinic overseas. They can speak to a doctor, possibly based in Singapore, any time of the day or night. The clinic also has an in-house laboratory.

Naga has a small operating theatre, though this is for minor operations such as the removal of cysts – none of the clinics perform orthopaedic surgery. It also seems to have cornered the Francophone market.

Reid emphasises the extensive experience of the doctors at the American Medical Centre. He also says that either he or one of the other doctors will accompany patients being evacuated rather than a nurse.

Dr. Gavin Scott's Tropical and Travellers Medical Services is a nine-to-five general practice. This means that you have to go

somewhere else for emergency treatment, but you do know precisely which doctor will be seeing you. All the others are open 24/7.

#### THE PERSONAL TOUCH

Possibly the key difference lies not so much in the services available, as in you – the client.

Choose the right doctor and practice for you and your needs. If you have a pre-existing complaint, it is best to find out which clinic has a specialist appropriate to your specific needs. "Establish a rapport with your doctor and a clinic," Brian suggests. "Get to know your doctor."

One of the advantages of living in such a small international community as exists in Phnom Penh is that you can get to know your doctor. General practices in the West, especially in large urban areas, are invariably impersonal.

Another of Brian's tips is to "see your doctor early." He points out that as some services, such as ambulances, are inconsistent. It is best to plan ahead. "Time is certainly a factor," he says. "Don't leave it late as you might do back home."

#### EMERGENCY EVACUATION

However well you get to know your doctor or plan in advance, there are certain situations where you will still need to be evacuated. SOS's policy is to send the patient to the nearest centre of international medical excellence. Often this is overseas.

While Reid states there are many routine operations that can safely be carried out in Cambodia, there are times when the operation really should be shipped overseas. This is especially the case when the surgeon is operating on one organ and other major organs are at risk.

"When you do a major piece of surgery and you have any kind of complications you want specialists on hand immediately," he says. Quite simply there are far more specialists in Bangkok or Singapore than in Phnom Penh.

Although the decision to evacuate is determined by a number of factors including the risk of increased morbidity or even mortality likely to be caused by evacuation, ultimately it is patient who decides.

"If he feels strongly about going to Bangkok, then we'll send him to Bangkok, if that's what he really wants to do," says Reid.

Sadly, another determining factor is insurance provision. Check that your clinic of choice has an agreement with your insurance company. It's much less stressful to hand over your medical insurance card to pay for essential medical treatment than your Visa card. If the clinic does not recognise the insurance policy you have, then you'll end up using your flexible friend to pay for the treatment.

#### A HEALTHY FUTURE?

The recent opening of the Royal Rattanak Hospital in Tuol Kork provides further grounds for optimism. Run by the Bangkok Hospital group that operates 17 private hospitals in Thailand, the hospital has 15 physicians and 25 nurses. The two operating rooms and one delivery room are available 24 hours

a day for emergencies. It also has four Intensive Care Unit beds and support facilities such as a laboratory and an x-ray and CAT scan unit with state-of-the-art equipment.

All interviewed welcomed the arrival of the hospital. Both the Reid and Brian look forward to working with the hospital in the future. With all agreed that the standard of medical care is on the rise, perhaps Jean Claude's timeframe of five to ten years is not overly optimistic. The French doctor has plans to open a diagnostic centre and even a new hospital in a year's time.

In the not-to-distant future we might even find expats from Vietnam and Thailand popping across the border to receive competitively priced medical services to an international standard. Currently at least general practice is to an international standard.

With the general growth in the economy and the influx of both expats and returning Khmers, the standard of medical provision should improve. "In the future, it's only going to get better," says Reid. "People should feel very secure."



#### True Cost of Medical Care

Can't afford to pay a visit to the doctor? Think again. The truth is that the price of a consultation in Phnom Penh is very competitive, especially when compared with what it would cost back home – or the potential long-term costs of not visiting one. All four practices take drop-in patients.

## The Eastern Touch

Phnom Penh offers a number of alternative medicine options with an eastern tradition. Treatments using herbs, cups, acupuncture and massage can be an alternative to pharmaceuticals or a visit to a western doctor. Words by **Naga** and **Naomi T. Robinson.**

FROM ONE OF THE OLDEST CIVILISAtions come some of the most unusual health remedies. From dried lizards, through hooves of endangered deer, to virile parts of tigers, your local Chinese herbalist has the cure for what ails you – even if you didn't know you were sick.

The theory behind Chinese medicine is that a body's chi or life energy must be unblocked and balanced. This energy moves through the body and its state can be determined by assessing the twelve meridian pulses. This is the basis for the science and art of acupuncture as well as the prescription of herbal medicine.

Acupuncture is often used to treat illnesses that have come on quickly and are not deep rooted. Moxibustion, or the burning of a small amount of mugwort or wormwood at the point of needle insertion, is used to treat more long-term illnesses. Herbs are used when an illness is deep within the body and of a more serious nature.


#### TRADITIONAL CHINESE MEDICINE

One of the most respected practitioners of traditional Chinese herbal medicine in Phnom Penh is Dr. Gu. Trained in Shanghai, he worked at Tong Sing Hospital on Sihanouk Boulevard before opening his own clinic near O'Russei Market.

A visit to his practice is filled with mystery, partially due to his limited English – take a Chinese-speaking friend if you can.

Pulling a small fabric cushion from his desk drawer, he tells patients to place the back of their wrists on it. He then closes his eyes and feels the wrist. This is how he diagnoses patient's problems – through heat and pulse.

Treatment might involve massage, acupuncture or even a course of herbal

pills. Nowadays Chinese medicine has evolved from the time when roots and herbs had to be boiled on the stove for hours before the pungent juices were decanted and then drunk.

Dr. Gu offers traditional Chinese diagnostic services, acupuncture and massage (US\$6 each or US\$10 for both), as well as the pills.

#### KOREAN HERBAL MEDICINE

If herbal pills are too far from the raw herbal experience you had in mind, Dr. Kim may have what you're looking for.

The Korean-born doctor has studied acupuncture and herbal medicine for more than 30 years, graduating from Sogang University in Seoul. His acupuncture teacher is a healthy 93 years old and still practicing medicine. Since opening his clinic in 2005 on Street 430, he has experienced a steady growth in his client base. A one-hour

treatment, consists of a consultation followed by acupuncture or moxibustion (US\$15). After the first session, the needles are cleaned and put into a sealed plastic

vial labelled with the client's name for use in subsequent sessions (US\$10).

Dr. Kim has imported state-ofthe-art stainless steel electronic equipment that distils the herbs. He then measures and seals the refined liquid into vacuum

packed pouches. Each batch has a shelf life of three months. All the herbs, imported from South Korea and China, are of the highest quality.

#### The Khmer Connection

#### MEDICINAL HERBS

The medicinal herb stall in any open-air market in Cambodia is recognisable by the variety of dried products stacked in plastic bags and on bamboo trays. These include flowers, long sticks with thorns, various roots, chalks, berries, fruits, leaves, bark, sap, and on occasion sea creatures, amphibians and snakes.

Usually run by an older woman, she will ask about symptoms, before weighing out portions and folding the ingredients into a paper packet. She then provides instructions for the herbs to be brewed in a special clay pot and taken as a tea.

The spiritual elements of indigenous medicinal roots and herbs are believed to be enhanced by the location where and time when the materials were gathered.

Roots are gathered during the night and on dark moons. Leaves are taken during the midday sun, when they receive most energy from the solar waves. Bark and sap are gathered in the mornings when the tree's energy is rising. Prayers and offerings are often necessary. Adherence to these strict rules is said to ensure the spiritual quality of the products.


#### CUPPING AND COINING

You may have wondered about the many Khmers sporting perfectly, circular purple marks on their bodies. These polka dots are a result of an ancient procedure termed cupping.

Used to treat many illnesses from fever through diarrhoea to high blood pressure, the most frequent ailment addressed by this ancient healing art is a hangover. The entire procedure takes about 30 minutes and will set you back 5,000 riel.

To begin with, an alcoholbased gel is rubbed over the patient's back. This acts as a disinfectant and prepares the surface to make it easier for the cups to stick to the skin.

Once the skin is prepared, kerosene-dipped cotton is lit









and held inside a medicinal glass cup. This first heated cup is then repeatedly run up and down the patient's back. The suction caused by the heated air in the cup draws blood to the surface preparing the body for what is to come. Once the patient's back is warmedup the true cupping experience commences. Moving at incredible

speed the skilled technician heats each cup with the burning torch and places it on the patients back. Approximately 50 cups are placed in less than five minutes. The cups are left on the patient for 10 to 15 minutes.

Being cupped is not a painful experience. Patients report their skin feeling tight as the skin under each cup wells up under the suction. The theory is that this process draws toxins from the blood. It certainly leaves a residual red circle.

Once the cups are removed the toxins that have been drawn from the blood are wiped off the patient's back, often with a krama that looks as though it's seen its fair share of toxins. The patient's back and legs are then massaged for about 10 minutes. Patients report feeling clear-headed, calm and having renewed energy.

A painful alternative to cupping, coining is often administered with a copper disk. It results in red welts along the body. Used for the same purpose as cupping, it does not require a skilled technician or specialised tools. Women tend to prefer this method fearing that cupping will adversely affect their skin.

Locating an establishment offering cupping or coining can be difficult to find for non-Khmers. The easiest way to access this service is to ask your Khmer friends for a recommendation. Many of the places you see on the street advertising massage for 5,000 riel also offer cupping. [1]

## Physiotherapy in Phnom Penh

Physiotherapy can promote healing, minimise pain and prevent re-injury. Whether you suffer from back pain, arthritis or any other muscle or joint problem, it can help alleviate your pain and get you out and about again. **Anita Surewicz** talks with two Phnom Penh physiotherapists.



#### Jean-Claude Dhuez

THE OPTIONS FOR WESTERN PHYSItherapy in Phnom Penh are limited. Anyone requiring the services of an experienced, qualified western physiotherapist can visit either the Naga Clinic or the International Physiotherapy Clinic – whichever you opt for, ask for Jean.

#### NAGA CLINIC

As well as providing general and tropical medicine, Naga Clinic provides a broad range of medical services including physiotherapy.

Jean-Marc Nicolai, a French certified physiotherapist and massage therapist, is one of the two physiotherapists, practicing at the clinic.

Since he began at Naga in September 2007, Jean-Marc has treated a wide variety of aliments and injuries.

"I treat everything from back problems and lumbago to hemiplegia [a paralysis affecting one side of the body usually caused by a brain lesion," he says. "I also frequently treat chest conditions, such as bronchitis, in babies."

Having worked for the French national soccer team from 1993 to 2000, Jean-Marc has had ample experience in treating sport injuries. He is also a licensed osteopath. He says that the combination of physiotherapy and osteopathy has opened up new possibilities in his treatment of patients.

"I find osteopathy complementary to physiotherapy," he says. "While physiotherapy involves working on movement, osteopathy is more about spine alignment. In my mind I always think both like a physiotherapist and an osteopath," he adds. "If a patient comes in with a sore ankle but also has back problems, I will look at both to see if there are any possible connections between the two."

He is open to new technology. "I occasionally use small electrotherapy treatment to reduce pain before I begin working on the patient with my hands."

#### INTERNATIONAL PHYSIOTHERAPY CLINIC

Jean-Claude Dhuez first came in contact with physiotherapy while competing as a high-level rower in France and needed some treatment. This encounter provided him with the impetus to pursue a career in physiotherapy rather than teaching, as he had previously intended.

Following his passion for the profession, as well as appetite for adventure, Jean-Claude arrived in Cambodia in 1991 as a volunteer for Handicap International to help set up the National Rehabilitation Centre.

In 1997 Jean-Claude he opened the first international physiotherapy clinic in Phnom Penh.

"The most common problems that I treat are back and joint problems such as arthritis, inflammation and sports injuries," says Jean-Claude. "Most of my treatment relies on massage therapy to relax the muscles and prepare

the body for further treatment and the manipulation of joints in order to rebalance the body." He is keen to stress that his treatments are always gentle and never forced.

#### **OSTEOPATHY AND ACUPUNCTURE**

Incorporating elements of osteopathy in his treatment, Jean-Claude uses a combination of treatment techniques that are predicated on the specific needs of a particular patient.

"I often incorporate foot and ear reflexology in my treatment to stimulate the reflex zones located on the foot and ear by massage," he says.

He has recently started using acupuncture as a method of pain relief as well as essential oils in massage therapy. "I make special aromatherapy blends for my patients to help with conditions such as inflammation, respiratory problems, muscle spasms and arthritis," he says.

Since his arrival in 1991 Jean-Claude has helped to develop the curriculum for the Cambodian National Physiotherapy School.

"The training in Cambodia is different to how physiotherapists are trained in European countries," he explains. "Rather than giving an overall picture, the training in Cambodia focuses on the main types of pathology found in this country. Cambodian physiotherapists usually only specialise in a small number of areas."

It is also an area of medicine that is yet to really catch on in Cambodia. Most of his Cambodian clients are either referred by an international doctor or come through word of mouth. "While I have more and more Cambodian patients, they still only represent a small percentage of the people I treat," he says. "The field of physiotherapy is still very new in Cambodia."

#### Physiotherapy: What is it about

THE AIM OF PHYSIOTHERAPY IS TO treat and manage movement disorders arising from various health conditions, injuries and diseases. Physiotherapists are trained to diagnose the causes of joint, muscle and nerve conditions and to provide treatment using an array of drug-free treatments to relieve pain, restore mobility and prevent further problems.

#### **OSTEOPATHIC AND CHIROPRACTIC TREATMENTS**

Both Chiropractors and Osteopaths use manipulation of the muscular-skeletal system as the primary means of treatment. While Chiropractors focus on the relative position of the vertebrae, Osteopaths focus on the motion of the spinal segments.

Osteopathy places a strong emphasis on the inter-relationship of the body's nerves, muscles, bones and organs. 

## Sensational Sabah

Perched on the northern tip of Borneo, the Malaysian state of Sabah offers something for everyone. With premier diving, stunning flora and fauna, lush rainforests, beautiful beaches, adventurous mountain climbing and some cuddly orange friends, a trip to this island paradise will be truly unforgettable. Words by **Lis Meyers.** 



#### Sabah Harbour Resort

SABAH'S CLAIM TO FAME and the highest mountain in South East Asia, Mount Kinabalu lies just two hours from the provincial capital of Kota Kinabalu. Its majestic peaks often lost in the clouds, the summit is an impressive 4,095m. The surrounding Kinabalu Park became Malaysia's first World Heritage Site in December 2000, receiving this recognition for its rich flora and fauna. Larger than Singapore, the park covers a staggering 754 sq. km.

Most visitors choose to hike around the park's numerous trails or view rare flowers and plants in the picturesque botanical garden. Look out for the highly coveted Rothschild's slipper orchid or the elusive rafflesia, the world's largest flower. Park fees are RM15 and admission to the botanical garden is a further RM5.

**CLIMBING MOUNT KINABALU** Those with determination and willpower can attempt the long and arduous climb to Mount Kinabalu's peak. The ascent and subsequent descent can be completed in two to three days. Park rules require all climbers use a registered guide – both guides and porters can be booked at the park.

Two trails, the Summit Trail and Mesilau Route, lead to the mountain's summit, the former is the more popular choice with climbers. Depending on your fitness level the first part of the climb should take four to five hours. There are numerous shelters along the way and several lodges where climbers can spend the night. Most opt to resume climbing at 3am so as to complete the final three-hour trek to Low's Peak - Kinabalu's highest point - in time for the sensational sunrise over Sabah. Climbers are only permitted to stay at the summit for 20 to 30 minutes due to the risk of altitude sickness. The descent takes three to four hours.

Adventure addicts can also tackle the world's highest via ferrata (iron road) on Kinabalu. This is a mountain path with fixed cables, stemples, ladders, and bridges embedded in the rock face to make the climb accessible to climbers of all levels of experience.

#### GOING WILD

Borneo is one of two islands in the world – the other is Sarawak – where orang utans can be found in their natural habitat. Literally meaning "forest people" in Malay, the apes roam freely over 4,300 hectares of land at the Sepilok Rehabilitation Centre, located just 30 minutes from Sandakan.

The best time to visit is during the 10am feeding time – most tour operators will schedule your visit for this time. Watch as the agile human-like apes swing on ropes, play, wrestle, and eat their morning meal of bananas and milk. When the orang utans have had their fill, Makak monkeys swoop in to gobble up the leftovers. Entry costs RM30 with a RM10 fee for a photo permit. All proceeds go to supporting the orang utans. It costs RM5,000 a year for each ape.

Nature lovers should not miss taking an expedition down the lower Kinabatangan River. 560 kilometres long, the Kinabatangan has the largest concentration of wildlife in all of Borneo. Venture down the river in a motorised boat, with your eyes scanning the thick rainforest and mangroves for animal sightings. Spot playful proboscis monkeys with their long noses and big bellies or the rare hornbill play in the trees above. Crocodiles, monitor lizards, wild pigs, tropical birds, and Makak monkeys are also commonly spotted. You may even catch a glimpse of some wild elephants. Numerous tour companies offer river cruise packages, usually including a night in riverside lodges in Sukau.

At the conclusion of your river safari, travel the seas to Turtle Island Park, a safe heaven for endangered Green and Hawksbill Turtles. The park is located three hours north of Sandakan. It is here the turtles come to lay their eggs. Selingan Island is open to the public with facilities for overnight stays. Enjoy an afternoon of snorkelling and swimming at the beach, then gather at night as turtles come ashore to bury their eggs in the sand. Be sure to reserve your place well in advance.

#### DIVER'S DELIGHT

Considered one of the ten best dive sites in the world, the tiny island of Sipidan has over 3,000 species of fish and hundreds of species of coral. Divers will delight in swimming alongside barracuda, moray eels, manta rays, sea turtles, and frogfish.

Located 35km south of Semporna – the mainland gateway to Celebes Sea diving – Sipidan was formed as living corals grew atop an extinct undersea volcano. Exquisite shallow reefs circle the island with a 2,000-metre drop off point leading straight to the sea floor. Divers in Sipidan commonly see twenty or more sea turtles on a single dive and are guaranteed shark sightings, including white tip reef sharks, grey reef sharks, and hammerhead sharks.

Famous for its muck diving and macro marine life, Mabul Island is located just twenty minutes from Sipidan. The Mabul sea floor consists of sand and broken rubble, offering the chance to see rare and exotic small creatures of the deep.

Permits are required to dive in Sipidan (RM40). As these are limited, it's best to book your

Sipidan dive in advance. It is no longer possible to stay on Sipidan, so visitors must now stay in Semporna. Divers can also arrange for longhouse stays on Mabul Island.

#### CITIES, SPAS AND SUNSETS

Kota Kinabalu is strategically located near both Kinabalu National Park and Tunku Abdul Rahman Park. Set against the South China Sea and tropical hills, the city has a unique natural beauty. Largely destroyed during World War II, Kota Kinabalu has since been rebuilt and still retains much of the charms of a smaller city. Spend a few hours walking around this pedestrian friendly town. If you are in Kota Kinabalu on a Sunday, be sure to check out the Gaya Street Fair, where traders set up shop on the main street. Just before sunset, hike, bike, or hitch a ride up to the Signal Hill Viewpoint for a panoramic view of the city and the surrounding sea.

No holiday is complete without a trip to the spa, and Kota Kinabalu hosts a myriad of places that emphasise the traditional treatments of Borneo. Just twenty minutes out of the city on Jalan Penampang, Ka'andaman is a traditional healing garden with fabulous foot and body massages that will melt away your troubles. Alternately, try Jari Jari, for an out of this world experience where Dusun Lotud therapists practice age-old massage therapy passed on by their mothers and grandmothers.

Those looking to escape the city will be pleased to know that sweet relief is just minutes away. The Tunku Abdul Rahman Marine Park hosts picture postcard beaches and crystal clear blue waters. The park spans a cluster of five islands – Pulau Gaya, Pulau Sapi, Pulau Manukan, Pulau Mamutik, and Pulau Sulug. Shores are pristine and secluded with hassling hawkers nowhere to be seen. While a trip to the park makes for a perfect daytrip, it is also possible to stay on Pulau Gaya and Pulau Manukan. Licensed boats departing from the Kota Kinabalu Jetty Terminal will ferry you to these nearby paradises for RM40. Entrance to the national park is RM10.

#### LOCAL CUISINE

Sabah is home to a variety of mouth-watering cuisine, with great Malay, Indian, Chinese, and seafood restaurants throughout the region. Delicious local dishes include: beef rendang, laksa (coconut-based curry soup), gado-gado (boiled egg with vegetables and peanuts), kerabu mangga, (mango salad with chili), and hinava (raw fish with lime juice and ginger). Delicious platefuls of Malay noodles can be found just about anywhere.

#### getaways

For something out of the ordinary, visit @mosphere, Kota Kinabalu's famous revolving restaurant. Located in a 30-story suspension building, @mosphere boasts a funky retro feel and stunning 360-degree views. While the idea may seem gimmicky, the food speaks for itself. Crumbed brie cheese croquettes (RM25), cracked black pepper and black bean lamb shanks (RM60), and @mosphere's famous bread and butter pudding (RM25) are standout dishes.

Alternative Kota Kinabalu dining options include Chinese and seafood at the popular Grand Portview Seafood Restaurant, traditional Indian at Devi's Café, the local favourite Salim, or the much-adored Little Italy.

The English Tea House is a little gem you don't want to miss in Sandakan. Perched atop a hill overlooking the small city and harbour, the garden atmosphere is absolutely divine. Be sure to order the fabulous Malay tasting plate for RM14! The set tea is RM18 per person. Learn how to play croquet over afternoon tea for RM18.

In Semporna, try Pearl Village Restaurant located inside the

floating complex of the Dragon Inn. Live catch are brought out in a basket before being cooked on demand. Crab costs RM3.90 and red snapper RM9 – both per 100g.

#### NIGHTLIFE

It can be hard to find decent nightlife in Sabah – smaller towns virtually shut down by 10pm. In Semporna, Scuba Junkie Backpackers is the only place with a crowd past sunset. While central Sandakan is an after-hours ghost town, venture out to the Bandah Indah area (Mile 4) for a decent dose of nightlife.

Kota Kinabalu, does have a buzzing bar scene with holein-the-wall joints, live music, and pumping discos. Dance the night away with Kota Kinabalu's bright young things at Jugs - the club at Sutera Harbour or stop by Shenanigans, an Irish theme pub located at the Hyatt. Those looking for something with a bit more sophistication can try the nearby Cocoon, which also features late night, live music. Other watering holes can be found along the Waterfront Esplanade Complex and the more centrally located Beach Street.

#### TOUR OPERATORS

Scuba Junkie (*www.scuba-junkie*. *com*) consistently receives rave reviews from divers as the top PADI dive operator in Semporna. Fun Dives cost RM200 for two dives and RM250 for three, with a RM50 equipment rental fee. For those looking to be certified, Scuba Junkie offers a range of courses – a three-day open water course will cost you RM750 (ask for Matt as your instructor).

**SI Tours** (*www.sitoursborneo.com*) is the place to go for wildlife adventures. Eagle-eyed guides can spot all sorts of incredible fauna and are knowledgeable and friendly. The tour company has two lodges, the Kinabatangan Riverside Lodge and Abai Jungle Lodge, both with their own restaurant. While quite basic in amenities, both provide rustic accommodation in beautiful, lush settings. The standard two-day Sandakan safari is US\$258. SI can also arrange for stays on Selingan Island.

**Borneo Escapade Tours** (*www. borneoescapade.com.my*) also provides reliable guides and a long list of small group tours throughout Sabah. All packages and excursions are explicitly designed to have a positive impact on local culture and environment. Be sure to ask for the affable Jimmie as your guide. Customised tours are available.

#### History

#### Mt. Nemrut

AFTER FIVE HOURS AT THE Turkish side we were finally welcomed through and headed to Dogubayazit, visiting a meteorite site along the way. Entering Dogubayazit reminded us of war-torn Bosnia on TV back in the early 90s. Kids by the roadside greeted us

with their middle fingers – we returned their compliments.

Having visited some local sights we continued towards Tatvan through snowy mountains, to avoid the city of Van where Turkish tanks were rumbling towards Iraq. Filling up our tanks cost US\$70 instead of the three bucks it did in Iran.

After giving chase to yet another bunch of foulmouthed kids we continued in solid rain. Thoroughly drenched we arrived in Diyarbakir, where again we were greeted with the customary middle finger.

Once our boots had dried out we wanted to head towards Mt. Nemrut, but the batteries on our bikes were beginning to act up due to the cold weather and we required some assistance. A kindly taxi driver provided us with jump cables and after a few faulty starts, the bikes roared into action. We thanked the driver for his generosity, only to face a demand of money for his 'kindness'!

Taking back roads to Mt. Nemrut, we eventually arrived at the base of the mountain. Riding the bikes to the highest point permitted we continued on foot, sinking knee-deep in the snow. Surrounded by the magnificent view on top we were greeted by ancient stone-heads that guard the 2,000-year-old burial mound of King Antiochos I of Kommagene.

Heading towards Cappadocia we finally encountered some hospitality as a local shopkeeper invited us for breakfast and proceeded to lay out a table filled with local delicacies, accompanied by copious amounts of tea. We had a long drive over the mountains ahead and ended up driving in the dark, still far from our destination. The temperature was mind-numbingly low, and despite wearing all our clothes our fingers and toes felt as if someone had taken a sledge hammer to them.

We witnessed a hideous accident, two cars had collided, and other by-passers were seeing to the victims. Carefully squeezing by on the icy road we pulled in at an army barracks to report the accident but they had already been notified. Shivering and tired, we enquired if they might be able to offer us a bed for the night.

## **Carnivore's Delight**

With a recent review on vegetarian cuisine and this June issue dedicated to health, **AsiaLIFE** thought it was about time for an ode to meat. **Lis Meyers** explores the best in BBQs, roasts, Sunday dinners and steaks. Meet lovers – get ready to start drooling!

#### HUXLEYS

Corner of streets 136 & 5 This British pub and restaurant offers a Sunday roast for those who like their meat and two veg with a touch of sophistication. The excellent three-course roast (US\$15.50) features a starter, roast, dessert and glass of house wine. A two-course option is also available for US\$13. Roasts vary from week to week but either the traditional roast beef or roast pork with crackling is sure to make an appearance. Another constant is the calorific Eton Mess – chantilly cream, meringue, mixed berries and toasted almonds. When tasted the roast lamb has a contemporary continental take with Parmesan crust. Cooked to perfection in a superior gravy, it was the best lamb sampled.

#### THE LAZY GECKO CAFÉ

23 Street 93

Weekly Sunday roasts at The Lazy Gecko bring a taste of home to weary travellers, hungry backpackers and some regular expats. This lakeside favourite features a relaxed setting and ever-friendly staff. Diners can choose between roast lamb (US\$5.50) or beef (US\$5), accompanied by potatoes, Yorkshire pud, cauliflower, carrots, beans, gravy and a horseradish or mint sauce. It tastes better than it looks, though the meat is a bit bland, it goes well with the rich gravy. Served from 5pm, plates go fast so be sure to arrive early. The banofi pie (US\$3.50) is a must – just tell yourself the bananas make it healthy!

#### TALKIN TO A STRANGER

21b Street 294 In keeping with the capital's most innovative bar's style, Talkin takes a different slant on the Sunday roast theme, serving its roast lamb dinner on a Thursday evening. Smothered in thick gravy, the tender lamb comes

with all the trimmings and a great mint jelly (US\$9). The gravy was perhaps a bit overpowering, but the lamb was well prepared. This hearty meal is easily enjoyed in the open-air garden setting. Roast dinner starts at 7pm, with reservations recommended.

#### RISING SUN

20 Street 178 Tel: 012 970 719 This cosy pub adjacent to the river offers Sunday roasts for US\$6. Choose between the beef, pork with apple sauce or half of a chicken – all are accompanied by carrots, green beans, broccoli, and crispy potatoes. While the roast chicken was tender, it was on the bland side. The roast beef faired better, going down well in a hearty pool of brown gravy. The gargantuan portions ensure that you will not be leaving with an empty stomach.

#### CAFÉ MONIVONG: PRIME TUESDAY

Raffles Hotel Le Royal Café Monivong's Tuesday roast buffet (US\$24) features two roasts each week. Enormous herb-crusted slabs of meat are hand-carved on demand and served with a large array of sauces. The prime rib was pink and juicy - a smash hit especially when paired with either the red wine or sour orange saffron sauce. The lamb was well seasoned and complemented the rosemary sauce. As overwhelming as the promise of all-you-can-eat meat is, be sure to save some room for dessert. A chocolate fountain to-die-for awaits!

#### PACHARAN

389 Sisowath Quay Spanish cuisine has a reputation for producing high-quality pork. Pacharan, Phnom Penh's tapas bar and bodega, is no exception. The succulent cochinillo asada, or roast suckling pig will take you to a whole

new orbit. The ultimate meat indulgence, it does truly melt in your mouth. Savour the perfectly prepared skin. These are crisp strips of heaven. Swine lovers will also love the flavourpacked chorizo a la plancha (US\$5.50) and paper-thin slices of smoky jamon iberico, from acorn-fed black-footed pigs (US\$14.85 for 50 grams).

#### RESTAURANT TELL

13 Street 90

Located behind Le Royal, this Swiss restaurant jet sets you to a picture postcard alpine chalet. Its signature dish is the Eisbein pork knuckle (US\$12.80) – a gigantic hunk of meat slow roasted on a spit in the restaurant's garden. The tender meat is surrounded by a crackling crispy-skin shell. Succumb to the fatty goodness of it all! But be warned, it needs two to work on this larger-than-life dish, and even then there may still be leftovers. Complete the Swiss experience with the Thueringer Bratwurst (US\$6.80) – a peppery sausage with deep layers of flavour. Most meat dishes come with roasted potatoes and sauerkraut.

#### GREEN VESPA

95 Sisowath Quay

For the ultimate meat feast, head to Green Vespa and order the mega mixed grill (US\$12.50). The massive dish features 100 grams of prime beef fillet, a New Zealand lamb chop, pork chop, sausage, back bacon, grilled tomatoes, Heinz baked beans, fries, and black pudding – all topped with a fried egg and served with a variety of condiments. A proper ode to beef, the fillet is thick and juicy, and absolutely delectable in HP brown sauce. For my American tastes, the black pudding was surprisingly tasty. The Vespa also does weekend roasts (US\$7.75 to US\$9.50) every Saturday and Sunday from noon.

#### ALLEY CAT CAFÉ

*Corner of streets 19, 178* This hole-in-the-wall café hosts a rib night every Tuesday from 7pm to 10pm. Pork ribs covered in a homemade BBQ sauce are served with an assortment of sides (US\$5 to US\$8). Using your hands is a must while eating these super-sized ribs. The meat is cooked well and the tangy BBQ sauce is great – if only the ribs had been dripping in it. They taste perfect when washed down with an Alley Cat Margarita (US\$3).

#### THE KITCHEN

17 Street 148 This new restaura

This new restaurant near the riverside specialises in both Khmer and western barbecue. Another with a hole-in-a-wall charm to it, the Kitchen serves fingerlicking-good spare ribs (US\$5 for half, US\$8 for a whole rib) with a slightly sweet tangy barbecue sauce. Those feeling particularly adventurous should try the exotic meat barbeque of crocodile (US\$3.50), ostrich (US\$4), and kangaroo (US\$4). The kangaroo was fantastic. Ribs and skewers

Providing Australian beef and lamb to top restaurants such as K West, Metro, and Topaz, all AusKhmer's meat is sent to Cambodia in vacuum-sealed bags to maintain top quality. While different cuts, including high-end Angus beef, are always to hand the staff suggest strip loin (US\$14.40 per kilo) and rack of lamb (US\$23 per kilo) for barbecues and a beef cube roll (US\$17 per kilo) or bone in leg of lamb (US\$9 per kilo) for roasts. Located at Open Wine, this French butcher sells 100 percent Cambodian beef and pork to European standards. German owner, Lanzi, takes great pride in his meat and sausages, which are sold to restaurants, bars, and individual customers throughout the country. All the Cambodian meat is thoroughly inspected to ensure quality. Famous for his sausages (US\$9 per kilo), Lanzi sells bratwurst, Toulouse and British sausages. He suggests beef tenderloin (US\$9 per kilo) for both grilling and roasting. Pork lovers will certainly enjoy his pork ribs (US\$7.50 per kilo) and butcher's ham (US\$9.50 per kilo). All the meat is hung, aged and cut on the premises. Open Monday to Friday from 8am to 5.30pm, delivery is free.

In an effort to promote local producers, all meat is from Cambodia. As they do not keep large amounts of stock to hand, it is best to order three to five days in advance for beef and seven to ten days for bacon. Orders, by telephone only, are free if 5 kilograms or over.

Far from your average steakhouse, K West offers sensational steaks in a sophisticated setting. When ordering from the grill, diners can design their own dishes with a choice of side and sauce. The sirloin (US\$12 for 200g) is everything a good steak should be, especially when drizzled with a green peppercorn sauce. The rib eye (US\$17.10) is topped with a port sauce and cheese. All of the food is beautifully presented. K West plans on launching a Sunday roast in the near future.

#### METRO CAFÉ

#### Corner of Sisowath Quay

& Street 148 Meat constitutes over half of Metro's food sales, according to owner American Paul Tripp. This will come as no surprise to anyone who's tried the largerthan-life Australian sirloin steak served in an amazing Kampot peppercorn sauce (US\$14 for 350g). If this is too much for you, try the beef tenderloin roll served in a béarnaise sauce (US\$18). A hundred grams lighter, it is served with French fries. Both steaks are Australian. The third meet is home produced. The spicy spare ribs (US\$7.50 for 500g) come in a great tangy sauce, including a mystery ingredient coming from Paul's native U.S. You're guaranteed to be licking your fingers at the end of the meal.

#### BOUGAINVILLIER

277G Sisowath Quay Just south of Metro, this French restaurant has one of the widest ranges of steaks in town – both imported and local. Choose from the local filet de boeuf (US\$9.50) and the Argentinean version (US\$15.50) – both 200g. Those with undiminished appetites and a friend or too, should try the 900g Australian rib of beef (US\$45). Bougainvillier is also one of the few places in town to serve Kobe beef – either the 250g rib eye (US\$32) or the 200g filet de boeuf (US\$49). All steaks come with a choice of five sauces, including foie gras and truffle, for those who want a truly extravagant French night out.

### STEVE'S STEAKHOUSE

20 Street 51 Offering an impressive selection of large slabs of meat from America, New Zealand, Australia, Argentina, and from Steve's own farm in Cambodia, the steaks range from US\$7 to US\$22 depending on size, cut, and country of origin. # Food Talk: You Scream, We All Scream... for Gelato

Searching for good ice cream in Cambodia, **Tarek Abbou** and **Hat Nary** took matters into their hands. **Lis Meyers** gets the scoop on **Bong Karem Italian Gelato.** 

"I WAS FED UP WITH BEING served sub-standard ice cream," says Tarek, founder and manager of Bong Karem. Teaming up with owner Hat Nary, he began making his own ice cream two-and-a-half years ago. What resulted was fresh, homemade gelato, a true taste of Italy produced in Phnom Penh. This creamy treat has since attracted many loyal followers. Popular among Khmers, expats, and tourists, everyone screams for Bong Karem ice cream.

#### A SWEET START

Tarek learned the art of gelato making while working at a large ice cream parlour in Berlin. Having travelled the globe, he settled in Phnom Penh and returned to the sweet profession of his youth, where he passed on his secrets to Battambang-born Nary.

The pair churns out a lot of ice cream from their tiny operation. Bong Karem currently supplies its gelato to restaurants and cafés across the city, including Friends, Romdeng, Living Room, Café Yeij and Sarika. The business also offers a mobile display for large functions and parties.

With a franchise at the Veranda Guesthouse in Kep, the ice cream is also available outside of the capital. Bong Karem will soon be sold in ice cream carts



Despite tasting exactly as advertised, there was not a trace of actual poultry inside them. The Chinese short noodles (2,500 riel) come with thick, stout noodles in a rather bland broth with vegetables, soft, juicy tofu and three forms of faux meat. Boiled dumplings (3,000 riel) are quite different from the standard variety found in the city. Stuffed with carrots and cabbage, they have a heartier and more savoury quality. Note though that not all the food at Miao





## **Recipe Corner: Veal Tenderloin Topped with** Fresh Langoustines

A sumptuous dish where the delicate, but rich flavour, of the tenderloin is complimented by the rich cream sauce and the fresh langoustine.

INGREDIENTS (SERVES 1)

800g veal tenderloin 8 langoustines 0.05cl cognac 0.05kg carrots 0.05kg onions 0.3l whipped cream 0.025kg butter 0.12l veal stock (powder) olive oil

Preparation time: 5 minutes

Cooking time: 20 to 25 minutes

#### PREPARATION

Cut the tenderloin into eight 100g slices. Open the langoustines, keeping the heads and the skin.

Pan-fry the tenderloin with clarified butter. Remove from the heat and cover the pan with aluminium foil to preserve the heat.

Repeat with the langoustines, this time cooking in olive oil.

To create the sauce, panfry the skin of the langoustines with the carrots and onions. Add the cream and cook gently.

Flambé the veal with cognac, add the veal stock and cook gently. Add the langoustine cream sauce.

Serve two slices of veal per person on the sauce. Top each slice with a langoustine (head optional). Serve with pan-fried pota-



toes, sautéd mushrooms, fried garlic and parsley.

#### ABOUT THE CHEF

Frank Sampéré studied cooking, service, wine waiting and management in catering schools in Perigord and Toulouse. Then he worked in The Sporting Club in Monte Carlo, before moving to Hanoi in 2002 where he co-owned La Salsa Restaurant. In 2005, he came to Phnom Penh to open a wine wholesale company with Phillip Veeckmans. The Wine Restaurant opened in 2007. Frank is its executive chef and co-owner.

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# **Getting wired in** *Phnom Penh*

Although still a luxury to have at home, with a range of bars and restaurants offering wireless connections throughout Phnom Penh, good internet access is very possible to find. You just have to know where to go. Words by **Andrew Turco** and **Mark Jackson**.

PHNOM PENH IS STILL NOT A city truly wired for the internet - it's expensive, slow and unreliable. Despite this, at least you don't have to sit in a crowded and charmless internet café. Pull up a chair on a café's veranda and enjoy a drink or snack while surfing the web. No one place is perfect, but depending on whether you are most concerned with speed, price, or ambience, there will always be somewhere that is right for your internet needs. You can even go online while standing in the pool.

#### **BODDHI TREE DEL GUSTO** 43 Street 95

With its wicker furniture and wooden plank floors, the Boddhi Villa's Del Gusto restaurant provides the perfect escape from the rest of the city. Located south of the busier parts of town on a quiet, gravel street, there's no better place to watch the driving rain in the late afternoon. The internet signal is strong, whether on the second-floor balcony or in ground-floor garden, and the connection is one of the fastest and most reliably around. There's no minimum order either. Simply ask a staff member for the password to get online. The chairs and tables are low and outlets are a little sporadic, but beyond that, there's little to prevent you whiling away the whole afternoon overlooking the villa's garden.

In mid-afternoon the café is dominated by people typing away at their laptops. Extension cords are laid out throughout the building, so there's no need to worry about battery life. Accessed

through a weekly password given by the waiters, customers are requested to refrain from making large downloads or accessing media-intense files. There is also a minimum food requirement.

The interior space is large, so while no one will bring you a glass of water, you will have free reign of the three floors to access the web. Plus, the internet is fast.



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# European Championships

AsiaLIFE previews this month's biggest sporting event, providing a full list of the fixtures. Be warned though, if you want to cheer your nation all the way to the final, you'll need some good cocoa to keep you up through to the early hours of the morning. Words by Mark Jackson.



#### Greek Delight Winners of the competition in 2004

EVERY FOUR YEARS THE TOP 16 nations in Europe pit their skills together in the second biggest football competition, the European Championships. This year's competition kicks off on Jun. 7 when co-hosts Switzerland play the Czech Republic. It concludes in Vienna, Austria some three weeks later, in the early hours of Jun. 30 (Cambodia time).

#### HISTORICAL UPSETS

If history is anything to go by, the winners are unlikely to be the pre-tournament favourites, Germany. The World Cup

may have been dominated by football's elite nations, with Italy, Germany, Brazil and Argentina dominating proceedings – only England (1966) and France (1998) have broken their stranglehold on the Jules Rimet Trophy since the war. This is not the case with the European version, which has served up its fair number of thrills and surprises over the years.

Possibly the biggest surprise of all occurred four years ago when the unheralded Greek team lifted the trophy, knocking out favourites France en route, before beating the host nation

Portugal 1 - 0 in the final. This is by no means an isolated incident. In 1992, eventual winners. Denmark, did not even qualify for the finals. The Danes finished second in their qualifiers behind Yugolslavia, who subsequently withdrew from the tournament due to the conflict in the Balkans.

The Danes put out France and England in their group, before defeating holders Holland in the semis, and Germany 2 - 0 in the final.

All these events pale into insignificance when compared with 1964. At that time called the European Nations' Cup, the mighty Luxembourg managed to knock the Dutch out in the round-of-sixteen stage by 3 – 2, in what is surely the greatest football upset of all time. That event was eventually won by the Spanish – that nation's only major tournament success.

#### THIS YEAR'S FINALS

Croatia's 3 – 2 victory at Wemblev last November denied this year's tournament the presence of the one nation guaranteed to fill the Gym Bar in the early hours of the morning – most games kick-off at 8.45pm in Europe (1.45am Cambodian time). However the truly cosmopolitan nature of the Premiership means that many of the players will be familiar to devotees of Star Sport and ESPN. What price on Ronaldo slipping the winning penalty under the legs of his Manchester United colleague Edwin van Der Saar, playing in the Dutch goal?

Chelsea fans can chose between following Petr Cech in goal for the Czech Republic, German captain Michael Ballack or the French trio

of Makelele, Malouda and Anelka. Liverpool fans might be split between the Spanish quartet of Torres, Reina, Alonso and Arbeola, and the Dutch pair of Babel and Kuyt. Similarly Arsenal allegiance might alternate between France (Gallas), Spain (Fabregas) and Holland (Van Persie). But there is no doubting which nation Manchester United fans will be cheering on Portugal with currently the world's best player, Christiano Ronaldo.

#### GROUP OF DEATH

A kindly draw has assisted Ronaldo's chances of becoming the player of the tournament. It's also aided the chances of any nation that has avoided the group of death.

Group C contains world champions Italy, the team they defeated in the final two year's ago, France, and the team that might otherwise have been many pundits dark horses, Holland. Romania look as if they are very much making up the numbers.

The idiosyncrasies of the draw mean that France and Italy could also meet again in the semi-finals. They were also drawn in the same qualifying group. If they come first and second in their group and then knock out the two qualifiers from Group 4 – probably Spain and holders Greece, they will meet yet again in Vienna in the early hours of Jun. 27.

## A GERMAN

The top half of the draw looks decidedly easier. Ronaldo shouldn't need to even warm up for the Portuguese to win their group, while Germany and Croatia should qualify from Group B at a canter. If all goes to plan the semifinals should pair Portugal with Germany and a repeat, repeat, repeat, Franco-Italian show down. Although on paper Spain has as good a team as anyone, the nation vies England for the claim of the sport's greatest perpetual under-achievers, with the exception of 1964. However if Torres repeats his Liverpool form and Fabregas fires in the middle of the park, the Spanish will be hard to beat.

Considering their impressive performance in the World Cup finals two years ago and nearhome advantage, Germany must go into the tournament as favourites. With age on their side, it's likely their squad will outlast either Italy or France in the final.

Those looking for an upset should avoid Greece, after all

lightning does not strike twice, unless you are golfer Lee Trevino. They will do well to progress beyond the quarter-finals. A better bet is Croatia, buoyed by their double over England. While the Dutch team has enormous promise and could go all the way if they get off to a flier – their opening games are against France and Italy.

Proponents of this procedure claim that ear candling can alleviate headaches, sinus conditions, ear infections, allergies, vertigo and hearing loss caused by the buildingup of excessive earwax.

THE TREATMENT

cedures provided by western medical doctors, such as blood, faecal and urine analysis; fungal identification; skin cancer spot freezing; injections and pap smears are invaluable tools that help in understanding our body chemistry, X-rays, ultrasound, and other noninvasive scans allow visual displays of the structures within the body. In a medical emergency, surgery and drugs are usually the only good response to a critical situation.

Visiting an alternative medicine practice requires more time initially. Naturopathy, homeopathy, tissue salts, Bach flower remedies, massage,



## Laura Watson: Sunburn and skin cancer

WE HAVE ALL SEEN THEM, lobster-red tourists on the beach at midday stretched out under a scorching tropical sun while bemused locals look on. Desperate to get a tan, they ignore the long-term effects of what they are doing.

The skin's natural protection from the sun comes from the pigment melanin. Your ability to withstand the sun depends on the amount of melanin you have in your skin. If you are very pale you might burn with less than 15 minutes exposure to midday sun. Very dark skins can still burn, but it might take hours of intense exposure.

Damage from the sun cannot be seen immediately. Over-exposure to sunlight will cause redness and pain a couple of hours after the damage has been done. Burnt skin will then peel about three days later due to a drying of the outer laver. If the burn is severe it can cause blistering, which indicates a deeper layer of affected skin. If blistering is extensive you can feel dizzy and nauseous and you may have a mild fever. Severe extensive sunburn can cause significant body fluid loss and even shock.

#### SKIN CANCER

Skin cancers can be divided into melanomas and nonmelanomas. A melanoma is a cancer that grows from the melanin-producing cells in the skin – the melanocytes. These are found in the bottom layer of the epidermis. Melanoma is the most dan-



gerous form of skin cancer, but non-melanomas such as basal cell and squamous cell carcinomas are the most common. These cancers form from cells in the middle and top layers of the epidermis.

Your risk of developing these cancers is directly related to two factors – your lifetime exposure to sun and your inherited ability to make melanin. Over 75 percent of caucasians over 65 years of age in Queensland have nonmelanoma skin cancer.

Ultra-violet (UV) radiation in sunlight causes skin damage. Ultra-violet can be divided into UVA and UVB. Generally UVB causes the sore redness of sunburn associated with overexposure and the commoner skin cancers that arise in the top layers of skin, while UVA penetrates deeper into the skin and creates the less visible damage that causes wrinkling, skin aging and melanoma.

Childhood sun damage/ sunburn is far more damaging than adult sunburn. Some research has suggested than a single episode of blistering sunburn in childhood may be enough to double your lifetime risk of melanoma. This is thought to be because children have a higher proportion of immature melanin-producing cells. These immature cells are more vulnerable to damage. By protecting your children from sunburn you can significantly reduce their risk of malignant melanoma later on in life.

Sun exposure over time results in prematurely aged and wrinkled skin. You do not have to burn for sun to cause this kind of damage and sunscreens. Even UVA screens, offer insufficient protection.

Look out for suspicious lesions and get them checked by a health professional – preferably a skin specialist – especially if you have high-risk freckly or pale skin. If your mole or lesion is asymmetrical, itchy, has irregular borders, is varied in colour, is more than 6mm in diameter, bleeds or is slow to heal, seek medical advice. Rough scaly areas, particularly on a bald head, face or ears can indicate an early form of skin cancer.

#### SUN PROTECTION


The best protection from the sun is to stav in the shade. Avoid the sun between 11am and 3pm, when it is at its fiercest. This reduces your dose of UV. Of course it isn't always possible to avoid the sun. When exposed, use a good quality sunscreen one that screens both UVA and UVB - with a protection factor of 30 or above. Reapply it after swimming. Good modern sunscreens are easily absorbed and non-sticky.

Wear a shirt and a hat during the hottest hours of the day. The latter will help protect your head from roasting and also help protect your nose and cheeks – the areas where non-melanoma skin cancers are most common. Sunglasses that screen out UVA and UVB will help reduce your risk of cataracts.

Finally, when out in the sun, why not follow the excellent Aussie advice – slip on a shirt, slop on some sunscreen and slap on a hat!

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# The Art of *Happiness*

**AsiaLIFE** delves into the life behind the smiles of Stéphane "Stef" Delaprée's Happy Painting Gallery through an interview with his partner, Anne-Sylvie Charest – the woman who discovered him.



Stef The happiest painter in Phnom Penh

WHEN ANNE-SYLVIE FIRST met Stef in Quebec, he was working as a publisher, promoting his own cartoon magazine Bambou, as well as creating cartoons commissioned by the prestigious Tintin magazine.

Gradually Stef began to experiment with his own work, creating stylised cartoon-like scenes of daily Quebequois life. It was in the state capital that Stef's first Happy Painting was created. The style was further developed over a six-month period he spent in Costa Rica, where he produced a series of paintings of women, in his newly conceived style.

#### NOMADIC ARTIST

Travel was very much in the artist's blood. He spent much of his childhood in Senegal, growing up in a family who had a love for all things artistic. With inspiration abounding, his experimentation in drawing and comics flourished.

With wanderlust firmly implanted in his character, he con-

tinued his travels to El Salvador, India, Afghanistan, Spain and France. He was "searching for an ideal, with empty pockets," according to Anne-Sylvie.

This led him to Cambodia in 1993. He first came to visit his brother, Pascal, who was working with a human-rights NGO. Stef found work making illustrations for this and other organisations. His trademark bright colours and murals of happy Cambodians even led to a commission to design the layout and illustrations for the new Constitution of the Kingdom of Cambodia.

#### MAKING ART HIS BUSINESS

His first solo exhibition in Cambodia was in 1995 at the New Art Gallery in Phnom Penh. Within the first two hours of the opening night all 20 of his paintings were sold.

Now Happy Painting is very much a part of the Cambodian cultural landscape. Stef has five galleries throughout Cambodia. He has also established a studio where he creates his art.

His artistic process is drawnout. First he extracts specific elements from photographs, which he recomposes first by drawing and then by painting the final work. He also trains and manages staff to help create the galleries' line of handmade silkscreen products. This range includes original paintings, serigraphs, sculptures, post cards and t-shirts.

The commercial success of his art means that Stef is one of the country's few truly independent artists. He does not rely on any other gallery, group of artists or government support to continue his work. A commercial artist, he often has worked commissioned by companies within Cambodia. Last year, both Camshin and Singha Beer approached him for their image campaigns, as did the SCA, (Societe Concessionaire des Aeroports) who commissioned some large-scale paintings.

His biggest work to-date is a monumental mural for the airport lobby at the new international airport in Sihanoukville. "He has started to enjoy working on very large canvases and luckily it seems that his customers like that too," says Anne-Sylvie.

#### STILL AN ARTIST AT HEART

But his desire to create is not solely commercially driven. "Stef loves Cambodia and over the years we've met people like us who share a sensibility to life and want pleasure out of it," explains Anne-Sylvie.

A collection of his Bambou cartoons has been exhibited at the Museum of Quebec and his work has been included in other international cartoon events in both Europe and Canada. Bought by collectors from all over the world, 30 of his pieces are due to be shown in a Museum in Calcutta.

Ultimately it is the feel-good factor that his paintings give to the people that walk into his galleries that keeps on driving the artist forwards, according to Anne-Sylvie. "His paintings are not just souvenirs but pieces of art that have a great simplicity and share the idea of the pleasure for life," she says. "Finding happiness in his art is such a revitalising and positive experience."

THE STEEP APPROACH TO Garbadale is the latest offering from the author of *The Crow Road* and *The Wasp Factory*. A rich story of complex family emotions and unfinished business, the novel revolves around the return of Alban Wopuld to his family estate, Garbadale, to discuss the selling of the family business to the Americans. Bank's fans should just head off to the bookshop now.

Comprised of emails from around the world telling tales of bad dates, Bad Dates consists of 163 true stories that range from rude to disgusting to horribly embarrassing. All are hilarious. Littered between the humorous tales of dates gone wrong are amusing bits of sexual or romantic related trivia. For example 38 percent of men surveyed in Hong Kong have interrupted sex to answer their mobile phones. Two appendices list a countdown of the 50 worst one-liners and a helpful



and amusing list of dating don'ts. Meant in the nicest way possible, this is a great book to read in the toilet.

Comprised of photographs of streets and restaurants in Mexico as well as stunning images of mouth-watering Asian and Latin American fused cuisine, Small Bites Big Taste features recipes created by the Executive Chef at the Ritz-Carlton in Cancun, Mexico. The amazing photographs are by awardwinning Malay photographer, SC Shekar. The shockingly small print used for the recipes makes this more of a coffee-table book than a functional cookbook. A beautiful book, it's possibly not worth the strain on your eyes.

Osborne's long-time love affair with Cambodia began in 1959 when he arrived in the country as a young Australian Foreign Service Officer. *Phnom Penh – A Cultural and Literal History* is an intimate portrayal of his observations of Cambodia's changes and difficulties over the last 50 years, accompanied by a comprehensive account of the country's history dating back to the ancient Angkorean era. Surprisingly, save from the front cover, the book holds not a single photograph and is filled instead with ink illustrations. Lovingly written, for those who share the author's great fondness for this scarred yet beautiful country, this book is worth a read.

Fugitive Denim delves into garment production, detailing both the struggles and the successes of creating a sweatshop-free industry.

Snyder's new book follows the life of a pair of jeans – from cotton seed to department store – and all of the lives the creation of this pair of jeans touch. From the cotton grower in Azerbaijan, Snyder's commentary moves to the designers in Italy, the women in the garment factories of Phnom Penh, lab technicians in North Carolinian and the American consumer shopping in Washington D.C.

In crisp, witty prose Snyder delivers a captivating account of the true cost of fashion in a global economy. Recently named one of the best business books of the year by the Library Journal in the U.S., the book was released in the U.K. last month.

On Jun. 4 at 7pm, the author will be holding a reading and book signing at Monument Books / Java Tea Room. A limited number of books will be available for purchase.



# **Billboard:** Album reviews by LOVE FM's Julian Grant

JOHN LENNON Double Fantasy



Rather than the comeback

John Lennon had hoped for, this album was his farewell. Of the 13 songs, seven are written by Lennon himself. the rest by his wife Yoko Ono. The lead single (Just Like) Starting Over - called the Elvis/Orbison track by Lennon - demonstrates his love of rock 'n' roll. Written for his son Sean, Beautiful Boy is a touching confirmation of Lennon's attempt to be the father he wasn't to his first son, Julian. Woman is a moving ballad about the love of his life - Yoko Ono. Despite the heavy echo on the vocals, common throughout all his recordings, there is no mistaking Lennon's songwriting talents. Impossible to listen to without recalling Lennon's assassination just 21 days later, there may be better Lennon albums out there, but Double Fantasy is worth a slot in anyone's music collection.

## THE KOOKS



Released last month *Konk* is the second album from this Brighton-based indie band. Already a U.K. No. 1,

the title refers to the studio, owned by former Kinks' front man Ray Davis, where it was recorded. The opening track. See The Sun creates plenty of interest with its catchy chorus. I loved the acoustic start to the album's hit single Always Where I Need To Be, although I quickly tired of it. For me the album's highlight is Mr. Maker, although Shine On with its contagious melody will be the next release. Indie fans will enjoy the interesting guitar hooks and funky rhythm of this promising album.

MADONNA Hard Candy



Madonna's eleventh studio album is her tenth U.K. No. 1 – only Elvis and The Beatles have done better. A cut above her previous album, Confessions On A Dance Floor, in many respects this represents yet another bounce back for this natural survivor. Featuring industry heavies Justin Timberlake. Timbaland and Kanye West, Hard Candy has a hip hop feel throughout, while remaining essentially a pop/ dance record. "It's kinda' like Holiday with an R&B groove," explains producer Timbaland. Even though the lyrics have little depth, it is full of foot-tapping songs and as sexually suggestive as always. The bouncy Give It To Me, the best track on the album, is sure to be a club hit. Another highlight, Candy Shop is pure pop. Madonna fans will enjoy this album, although Like A Prayer and Cherish it is not. 🚺

## DVDs in the 'hood

AsiaLIFE takes a look at some of the DVDs available in a shop, or stall, near to you.

#### THE DARJEELING LIMITED Wes Anderson (2007)



Another stylish film from the director of The Royal Tenenbaums (2001) and Rushmore (1998), the film is a comedic tale of three brothers travelling across India, having not spoken to each other since the death of their father. Their journey begins on a train only Wes Anderson could have designed. The brothers get kicked off board due to events involving painkillers, Indian cough syrup and pepper spray. At this point the true journey begins. Anderson's usual suspects - Owen Wilson, Jason Schwartzman, Anjelica Huston and Bill Murray - give performances only this talented young director could inspire. Anderson fans will not be disappointed.

LA VIA EN ROSE Olivier Dahan (2007)



There is really only one person in this film – Marion Cotillard playing Edith Piaf. The film tells the dramatic and often tragic life story of "the

little sparrow" tracing her rise from the brothels of Paris to fame and fortune. Spotted as a street singer with a remarkable voice, she is groomed for stardom. Despite being a difficult person to be with on occasions, Piaf inspired immense loyalty from those who surrounded her. Her tragedy was that she never found a permanent loving relationship contributing to her descent into alcohol and drug addiction. The film skilfully demonstrates the power of her music. Cotillard won this year's Oscar for best actress with her stunning performance.

REAR WINDOW Hitchcock (1954)



Hitchcock was the master of suspense and there is no film more suspenseful than this 1954 classic. From the sweeping opening sequence to its dramatic conclusion the English director proves a master of his craft. Photographer Jeff Jeffries (James Stewart) is cooped up in his flat with a broken leg, the only relief from his tedium and the oppressive heat is from eavesdropping on his neighbours' activities. Then he sees his neighbour kill his wife, or does he? Avoiding the melodrama that crept into some of his Hollywood work, Hitchcock weaves the most taut suspense. Irremediably claustrophobic, the Rear Window is possible the great director's finest work. You'll never view your neighbours in the same light again.

# Shopping & Fashion Flea Market Shopping Guide

The new Friends flea market offers goods both old and new in an alternative market setting. **Nora Lindstrom** goes off in search of a bargain.

FRIENDS MAY BE A HOUSEhold name among expats in Phnom Penh, yet how many of us venture beyond the restaurant and the Friends 'n' Stuff shop. A new initiative by the street children NGO might just change that.

On the last Saturday of each month, the organisation is holding a flea market, located in the courtyard of the Mith Samlanh Centre, next to Friends The Restaurant. The intention is to raise money for its Land Campaign – an initiative to pay off debts acquired when the centre was bought in 2006.

#### VARIETY OF PRODUCTS

Offering an alternative shopping experience from the city's regular markets, the organisers hope that departing expats will sell or donate unwanted clothing or household items. The market also affords the opportunity for small-scale producers and artists, who could not otherwise afford a permanent retail space in town, to display their goods in the heart of the city.

To-date the market stalls have attracted both NGOs and commercial producers – albeit with Friends products very visibly present. During the first two markets, organic produce, second-hand books, bric-a-brac, clothes and jewellery featured strongly. There

are also many arts and crafts produced by disadvantaged groups in Cambodia.

Prices range from absolute bargains under a dollar, to decidedly more expensive handmade artefacts. Seeing Hands also offers 15-minute back and shoulder massages for US\$2.

#### FRIENDLY SERVICES

The daily Mith Samlanh's workshops remain open, offering hair cuts for a dollar and a close shave for a mere 1,000 riel. Face painting (2,000 riel) for children is also available, and a manicurepedicure will set you back US\$2.50. A children's entertainment programme will keep the little ones occupied.

Food by trainees at Friends is also on hand. Get yourself a traditional Khmer lunch, or grab a tarte tatin from the stall run by Le Café du Centre. Alternatively pop into the adjoining Friends The Restaurant for some tapas.

If you wish to support the Land Campaign further, you can buy your own brick – painted by one of the kids, or yourself if your prefer – for US\$50. The brick is subsequently laid in a supporters' wall.

#### WORTH A VISIT

Much more than plain shopping, the Friends' flea market is a family-friendly event where you can find a needle in a haystack, while supporting good causes. And don't forget to get your raffle ticket to win a weekend for two at Hotel de la Paix in Siem Reap!





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# The Designer: Anya Weil

Ukrainian-born, with American citizenship, clothes designer **Anya Weil** moved to Cambodia 18 months ago. She talks about her **Spicy Green Mango** range and her plans to open a pre-school.



#### Cut from a different cloth

**AL** – What is your background? **AW** – I've been a yoga instructor for 10 years. I used to be a radio DJ when I was in university and my degree is in Finance. After graduation I worked in a bank for about six months and decided never to do that again. I needed to do something creative, so I began as a yoga teacher, then I started designing yoga studios.

**AL** – Tell me about your business **AW** – My business is what I want to do. It's about creativity. I believe in creative energy. Look at the clothing in my shop – it's opposite. It's about who I am. I just express and create what I have inside.

AL – What other businesses are you involved in?
AW – I'm working on a pre-school called The Giving Tree. It will open in August. Many schools have the same concept – learning through play. We have the same concept but we approach it in a

different way. The idea is of a tree that gives. It is so strong and powerful it has so much energy it can give and let things grow. Our logo is many different animals on a big tree. It can be a home for anybody.

AL – Why did you decide to open a clothing shop?

**AW** – Being a mother I created a lot for my daughter. I would design her clothes and have them made. All the parents would ask, "where did you get it?" Basically I was supplying my friends with this cool stuff I was designing for my daughter and myself. So my husband eventually said – you should just open a shop. I plan to eventually design some shirts for men – t-shirts as well as dress shirts.

AL – Where do you get your design ideas from?
AW – I just do what feels good to me. I like patchwork, I like combining things which don't seem to work together at first. But when you combine them in your way, they work. Much like the name of the shop – Spicy Green

Mango. When I first heard of

this dish I didn't want to try it. I thought the flavours wouldn't work together. But then I ate it. It's good. It's great!

**AL** – What are the differences between being a businesswoman here and in the west? **AW** – It's much easier here. The

reality is that building a business is much cheaper. It's less stressful. You can just do it. Cambodia is a place I would recommend for people to start your first business. If it doesn't work out it's not that dramatic to stop, you don't loose as much. If your business fails elsewhere, it can crush you forever. But here, you just close.

**AL** – Have you noticed any changes in the Cambodian business environment in the last 18 months?

**AW** – I think the whole reality of Cambodia is changing. It is becoming more business oriented. A different crowd of expats is coming, people from business. I don't think it's going to be another Bangkok, but it's moving in that direction. I don't think it's a bad thing – this is life – it's reality, but it is changing. *x*

# **Trevor Keidan: Interesting Times?**



WITH RECORD-BREAKING RETURNS from the developing world, European and U.S. stock markets doing well and everyone buying more property than would have previously been thought possible; it all seemed to good to be true. And, of course, it was.

The easiest and most effective way to generate strong, long-term growth is by investing on a regular basis. Invest smaller amounts every month regardless of any short-term volatility. Take a longterm view, be consistent and disciplined.

Choose funds that have an excellent long-term strategy regardless of shortterm volatility. Most of all – be brave. Do not follow everyone else into a freefall dive without so much as a parachute.

History tells us that if you focus on the longer-term, stay disciplined and work with a competent and trusted financial advisor, you can achieve your goals without too much stress and heartache.

#### FIVE EASY STEPS

Here are five simple steps to achieving your longer-term objectives:

 Find an independent financial advisor you can work with and trust – ask your friends who they work with.

 Really put some thought into your medium- and long-term objectives. Discuss these with your financial advisor.

3) Decide on an amount of money you can save on a regular basis over a long period of time. Don't ever overstretch. Do what is affordable. If there is a shortfall between what you need to save and what you can save, address this over time with small increments.

# Angkor by Air

Tired of traipsing all over the temples? Looking for a different perspective to view one of the true wonders of the world? Why not see Angkor by air? Words by **Mark Jackson**.

UNDERSTANDABLY A VISIT to the temples of Angkor is a must-do for nearly all visitors to Cambodia. As the magnificent complex becomes more and more established as an international tourist destination, the temples become increasingly overrun with tourists. Time your trip badly and you are as likely to see a busload of Korean tourists, as the enigmatic face of Bayon. At such times it pays to think of alternative ways to take in the temples.

While a ride on an elephant can offer you a lofty view of Angkor Thom and the hot air balloon affords fantastic views of Angkor Wat, to really soak up the full panorama of the complex by air, there really is only one option – hire a helicopter.

#### THE PACKAGE

Two companies – Helicopters Cambodia and Sokha Helicopters – fly helicopters over the complex. The former runs flights out of the domestic terminal at Siem Reap airport. Both companies offer a range of flights ranging from six minutes to half an hour.

Helicopters Cambodia's basic eight-minute flight is just long enough to whiz round the southern tip of Angkor Wat. Sokha

offers a similar trip lasting six minutes. Of better value – unless you just want to savour the thrill of flying in a helicopter – is Helicopters Cambodia's 14-minute flight (US\$130 per person). Continuing past Angkor Wat towards the Eastern Baray, this flight gives you an impression of the scale of the complex as a whole. It also provides a bird's eye view of some of the less trekked temples. Once again Sokha's trip is two minutes shorter.

Both companies also run extended 20-minute and 30-minute flights over the Tonle Sap and the temple complex.

We opted for Helicopters Cambodia. In existence for nine years now, this is a professional operation. All passengers have to specify their weight (in kilograms) before take-off, the helicopter is new and looks wellmaintained and the pilot, Kiwi David Taylor, is reassuringly experienced. David also doubles-

up as tour guide, providing a running commentary throughout the flight.

#### THE FLIGHT

Part of the fun of the trip is actually flying in a helicopter – especially if it is your first time. Do not expect a manic whirring of blades and deafening noise. Modern helicopters have come a long way from celluloid-inspired images of war choppers.

Our take-off was extremely smooth – the craft literally hovered above the ground before setting off towards the temples. Visibility is excellent, as the helicopter points slightly nose-first towards terra firma. Try to get a window seat or best of all one next to the captain.

Once in the air, the flatness of the terrain around Angkor becomes apparent. The verdant nature of the forest still around Angkor Thom is equally striking. Although the view of Angkor Wat is excellent, it's possibly of greater interest to identify features you would miss while on the ground. These include paddy fields that used to be the former reservoirs for the ancient civilisation and a straight path that used to be an ancient highway. Ultimately though one of the greatest pleasures is watching the procession of ant-like creatures ploughing their way around the temples. That is unless it's your turn to be an ant the following day.





AS THE WEATHER WARMS and the days lengthen, millions of Americans delve into the massive amount of stuff they have accumulated over the winter – or their entire lives – and attempt a spring cleaning.

Rooms cluttered with assorted junk are sorted and emptied. Sexy but useless gadgets, like laserguided nail clippers and USBpowered toasters, are removed from desks and packed away with a hint of buyer's remorse. Clothes that are too big, or more often too small after months of holidays and even less activity than the already paltry American norm, are tossed from the nation's closets.

#### GARAGE SALES

But not all the remnants of the great American pastime of consumption are destined for attics, landfills or recycling yards. Instead – in a fine example of Americans eternal search for both wealth and more items

to display that wealth – the unwanted items are proudly displayed on lawns and driveways next to bright red signs announcing "Garage Sale."

Even as Internet commerce and sites like eBay flourish, a plethora of garage sales sprout every weekend of spring and summer. Although beloved American icons such as cheeseburgers and shopping malls are finding a place in Cambodians' hearts, the garage sale remains an alien idea. Cambodian families rarely move from one house to another, and when they do they usually give away their possessions to family, friends and neighbours instead of selling them all off at once.

It's the rare American who will give away a battered armoire to a neighbour when they can sell it for enough money to buy an inflatable pool table. It's true that most garage sellers simply want to clear out the goods as fast as possible. They are willing to sell baby outfits for a dime, or their entire collection of pots and pans for US\$10. Some show more chutzpah, demanding US\$50 for a pair of designer jeans that looks no different from a pair on the rack at the local discount retailer. Usually, if you know what you want and have survived a few Cambodian markets with your wallet intact, you can make out with some decent acquisitions.

#### LOST IN TRANSLATION

When we arrived in the United States from Cambodia, I expected my wife to be eager to explore the unwanted treasures for sale. After all, she was no stranger to selectively picking over merchandise for sale in markets big and small and haggling for a fair price. Except for weekly farmers' markets, a garage sale is the closest experience to buying something in Cambodia. There are no final prices, no managers and no cash registers.

However, when I asked her to go with me to a garage sale, she refused. When I asked her why, she said, "Why should we buy a garage? We don't even own a house!"

She was correct on that point, so I promised to keep any purchases small in both size and cost.

#### A STAR IS BORN JUN.1, 1926

One of the most iconic figures in the twentieth century was born Norma Jean Mortensen on Jun. 1, 1926 in Los Angeles. Marilyn Monroe was as famous for her off-screen romances, marrying Joe DiMaggio and Arthur Miller as well as having an alleged affair with President JF Kennedy, as for her on-screen success. A tragic character, who spent most of her childhood in foster homes and orphanages, Monroe eventually died from an overdose of sleeping pills on Aug. 5, 1962. Despite being typecast as a dumb blonde, Monroe had the honed timing of a comic genius, as she demonstrated in the classic Billy Wilder comedy - Some Like It Hot (1959).

#### TIANANMEN SQUARE MASSACRE JUN. 4, 1989

One of the blackest day's in Chinese history, and one that is sure to be recalled around the globe

in the build-up to the Olympics took place in Beijing's Tiananmen Square in 1989. In the early hours of the morning of Jun. 4 the Chinese Government ordered the People's Army to open fire on a group of protesting students that had gathered in the square since April. Government estimates were that 300 people died in the attack, whereas other estimates place the figure at ten times that amount.

# BOBBY KENNEDY ASSASSINATION JUN. 5, 1968

An event that shook the world occurred on Jun. 5, 1968. Senator Robert Kennedy, brother of President JF Kennedy, was assassinated outside the Hotel Ambassador in Los Angeles. Kennedy, shot while leaving from a celebration of his victory in the California presidential primary, was the front-runner for the Democratic Party's presidential nominee. An outspoken critic of the Vietnam War, racial





discrimination and poverty, Kennedy served as U.S. Attorney General from 1961 to 1964.

# MAGNA CARTA JUN. 15, 1215

Seen by many as the building block for modern day democracies and human rights around the globe, the Magna Carta was signed by the English King John at Runnymede on Jun. 15, 1215. The charter established basic rights for English citizens, including habeas corpus, and stipulated that the king's will was bound by law.

# WATERGATE JUN. 17, 1972

A seemingly routine burglary at the National Democratic Headquarters in the Watergate complex, Washington DC on Jun. 17, 1972 eventually led to the downfall of President Richard Nixon. The five arrested men were hired by Nixon's re-election committee. Subsequent investigations revealed an extensive cover-up and other illegal activities authorised by the White House. Nixon eventually resigned on Aug. 9, 1974.

# NAPOLEON MEETS HIS WATERLOO JUN. 18, 1815

Napoleon Bonaparte's imperial domination of mainland Europe came to its inevitable end on the fields of Flanders on Jun. 18, 1815 at the hands of combined British, Dutch, Belgian and Prussian troops under Wellington. This ended 23 years of warfare between France and the other European powers. Bonaparte, who had previously served one period of exile on the Italian island of Elba was sent into exile on the Atlantic island of St Helena. He died there on May 5, 1821.

#### ORIGINS OF WORLD WAR II JUN. 28, 1914

An event that sparked off the First World War occurred on Jun. 28, 1914, when Hapsburg crown prince Archduke Franz Ferdinand and his wife were assassinated by a Serbian nationalist in Sarajevo. The subsequent declaration of war by the Austro-Hungarian government triggered a chain of events that plunged the rest of Europe into a bloody conflict that lasted until 1918. **[**]
