EGYPTIAN MOVES AT META HOUSE

Meta House hosted an exciting, rare dance event on Feb. 21 when choreographer Yon Davy showcased four new dances in her first step as an independent choreographer. The fluid, dynamic pieces marked a departure from traditional Cambodian dance, interweaving various styles and movements, including Egyptian dance. Along with advisor Bob Ruijzendaal, Davy heralds an exciting new era of modern dance to Cambodia. Motivated by a desire to create something unique that expressed her emotions, Davy's work reveals an exciting freedom of movement and expression scarce seen in traditional dance. Afterwards a film on the history of Egyptian dance was shown at Meta House's upstairs cinema.

BISTRONOMIQUE SIEM REAP

Siem Reap hospitality training NGO Sala Baï staged two special fundraising dinners on Feb. 25 and Mar. 4. Bistronomique was the project of two eminent French chefs, Christophe Darney and his wife Carole, who were volunteering at the organisation's training school. The pair have either worked or trained at the French Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the renowned Ferrandi School of Culinary Arts and the Lycée Belliard in Paris. The first event took on a 'bistro' style approach. For the second event the chefs developed a special set menu including red and white cabbage with grilled sesame chicken and a liquorice dressing followed by

stuffed chicken supreme with prawns, wrapped with coconut, pumpkin cake and mango sauce. It was even more delicious than it sounds. One of the stars of the evening was the cheese, a Saint Nectaire from the Auvergne region of central France. This soft, punchy uncooked cheese was the perfect foil to the sweetness of the preceding dishes. The events were very well attended by Siem Reap expats. The school hopes to award loyal expats with similar events in the near future.

HAIR ART

@Java Café

Hair opened at Java Café & Gallery on Feb. 26. One of the most intriguing exhibitions so far this year it featured works made from human hair by Cambodian artist Khvay Samnang, Fascinated by Cambodian women's beauty rituals, the artist collected left over hair from roadside barbers, turning the hair into sculptures using wire, glue and wood. Several of the works take the form of masques of animals trapped underneath layers of hair. The centrepiece of the exhibition was a life-size sculpture of a woman plucking hairs from her armpit. Khvay Samnang is a founding member of the Stiev Selpak art collective and has been featured in many exhibitions around Phnom Penh. Hair ended Mar. 28.

RAISING THE PONTOON - PART TWO

Phnom Penh's one and only floating bar made its long-awaited comeback on Feb. 27 in a new location off Diamond Island. With few changes to the interior of the bar, the official opening







of Pontoon Lounge II saw Akil the MC from Jurassic 5 make an appearance, along with local hip hoppers Tiny Toones and the Klap Ya Handz collective. Though revellers were at times told to clear areas as the float seemed to be tilting, and the bar had difficulties keeping up with orders, the general consensus was that Pontoon had been missed during its months floating off shore on the Tonle Sap. Even the US\$5 cover charge did not deter the crowds, who kept the party pumping until the small hours.

DANCING IN THE STREET

Wat Botum Park was lit up by carnival lights and contemporary Cambodian dancing on Feb. 28 for the French Cultural Centre's 'La Rue Danse'. On eight stages placed around the park, 14 Cambodian and international dancers entertained the mixed crowd with a variety of performances. Star attractions included a belly dancing couple, a juggling dance act and a traditional monkey dance. As performers rushed from one stage to another, audiences could sit on mats laid out in front of the stages, or wander around enjoying glimpses of the performances. The night also included a rotating exhibition of photographs taken at the Dansez!Roam! dance series of which La Rue Danse was part.

ANTI-TRAFFICKING

The Chinese House hosted the first screening in Cambodia of 'Call + Response', an antitrafficking documentary on Mar. 2. The SISHA-organised event featured the film, a talk and music by the Cambodian Space Project. 'Call + Response' gave an overview of human trafficking and the larger global connections calling for a modern-day abolitionist movement. Testimony came from a diverse range of politicians, activists, victims, and provocative philosopher Cornel West. The evening's climax featured the Cambodian Space Project taking to the upstairs stage and unleashing its funky psychedelic grooves to the hot crowd.

FROLICKING FRISBEES

To celebrate International Women's Day, the Penh's ultimate frisbee enthusiasts organised a two-day tournament at Northbridge International School on Mar. 6 and 7. With 85 participants from all over the world, the "hat" tournament - all teams were drawn from a hat - saw an all-blue final with light blue team Sexy David beating navy blue team Ready for Caning 11 to 7. Perhaps the navy blue team was suffering from the after effects of the tournament's official fancy dress party at Talkin' to a Stranger the night before, which saw Phnom Penh's indie rockers The Fumes taking to the stage.

CARRYING CAMBODIA

AsiaLIFE's very own Conor Wall and Hans Kemp launched their new photographic book, Carrying Cambodia, at the FCC on Mar. 7. The book, and accompanying exhibition, features photos of the creative ways in which Cambodians tackle the basic dilemma of getting from point A to B, and how every kind of load imaginable, from stacks of rattan furniture to 400-pound pigs, can be hauled around. The photographers were on hand to sign copies of their book, and discuss the project with guests. MEET CNEMASPIS NEANGTHYI Scientists recently announced the discovery of a new species of the Southeast Asian gecko, Cnemaspis neangthyi, from the rocky foothills of Cambodia's Cardamom Mountains. In recognition of the origins of the discovery, which was made during a survey led by Dr Lee Grismer of La Sierra University, and Fauna & Flora International (FFI) in 2007, the new species has been named after the man who heads up the FFI Cardamom Mountains Research Group. "Cnemaspis neangthyi has been named in honour of Mr Neang in recognition of his important contributions to the herpetofauna of Cambodia and his untiring efforts and personal sacrifice to support conservation research in his country,' Dr Grismer said.

SOCIAL IMPACT OF WING

ANZ Royal Bank announced 100,000 Cambodians are now using its WING mobile payment service on Mar. 4 at a ceremony held at the Australian Embassy. Attended by ANZ Chief Executive Officer Mike Smith, as well as Australian Ambassador Margaret Adamson, the ceremony coincided with the release of a social impact report which shows how people who previously had little or no access to financial services can now use their mobile phones to make person-toperson payments, transfers and purchases. The milestone was achieved in just over one year, following WING's commercial launch in January 2009. The morning event at the embassy included a public discussion on the social impacts and benefits of WING's low cost, branchless, mobile payment model.

RETURN OF WAR CORRESPONDENTS

War correspondents from the 1970 to 1975 Cambodian war will be meeting for a re-union at Phnom Penh's Raffles Hotel Le Royal on Apr. 20-23. As the

once peaceful Cambodia became dragged deeper into the Vietnam War some 40 years ago, at least 54 local and international journalists gave their lives or simply disappeared. The upcoming event is organised by Chhang Song and Carl Robinson. Chhang Song was the last Information Minister in the Lon Nol government and now lives in Long Beach, California. Former Associated Press correspondent Robinson covered the war from his base in neighbouring Saigon, and now lives in Brisbane, Australia. While several reunions have been held for the ageing crowd over the past 15 years in Saigon, this is the first time Phnom Penh will host the event.

CYCLING FOR SAFETY

The 41 participants of the Mine Advisory Group's 'Cycle Vietnam to Cambodia 2010' event in March raised more than US\$216,000 to support the life-saving work of the non-governmental organisation. Starting at the famed Chu Chi tunnels outside Ho Chi Minh City on Feb. 28, the spirited riders covered 460km from the Vietnamese capital to Cambodia's Angkor Wat temples in Siem Reap, arriving on Mar. 6. Coming up again in 2011, the MAG team hopes the demanding ride will also help raise awareness of the continuing danger mines and other unexploded ordinance continue to pose in the region.

KHMER FILM AT SUNDANCE

Cambodian-British film Enemies of the People won the World Cinema Documentary Special Jury Prize at the 2010 Sundance Film Festival in January in Utah, U.S.A. Depicting investigative journalist Thet Sambath's life-long journey to gain the confidence of the men and women who perpetrated the massacres of the Khmer Rouge, the film records a shocking testimony. Through interviews with Khmer Rouge cadre from foot soldiers to Brother Number Two Nuon

Mekong River Swim 2010 CANCELLED



THE MEKONG RIVER SWIM is an annual event that has been held in Phnom Penh each April since 1995. In recent years, well over 100 swimmers joined the event, which has been held at the Prek Leap Agricultural College. However. despite widespread enthusiasm for participating in the event, the Swim Committee experienced difficulty generating interest among swimmers in volunteering to help organise it. This has been particularly true in the last two years that the Swim was held.

This past year has also seen the emergence of the Phnom Penh Boat Association, which charges much

Chea, Sambath's long mission not only brings light on what happened to his family during the Khmer Rouge, but also the entire nation. The film is yet to be released in Cambodia.

LAZY GECKO CLOTHES DRIVE

Lakeside bar and restaurant The Lazy Gecko started a clothes drive in response to the devastating fire on Mar. 8 that destroyed two communities a stone's throw from Boueng Kok Lake. Leaving hundreds homeless, the fire destroyed at least 180 homes, as well as two monks' dormitories in adjacent Wat Neak Von. The first call for donations filled an entire jeep, with an initial 350kg of clothes distributed to the affected families on Mar. 15. The second call was specifically for children's school uniforms, to enable them to resume their education despite the fire. It remains unclear what

higher hourly fees than independent boat operators previously charged. 



ICRC: Thirty Years On

One of the first organisations to assist Cambodia following the Khmer Rouge, the International Committee of the Red Cross recently celebrated 30 years of working in the Kingdom. Words by **Craig Gerard**.

IN TIMES OF CRISIS ALL around the world, the International Committee of the Red Cross steps in when most organisations are running away. The humanitarian institution provides basic medical supplies and food support while helping families connect with lost relatives. In September 1979, when very few organisations were even thinking about returning to warravaged Cambodia, the ICRC set up emergency operations with Unicef. It remains in Cambodia to this day.

"Thirty years is a landmark because there are not many countries in the world where the ICRC has been working for such a long period of time," says Björn Rahm, head of the ICRC delegation in Phnom Penh.

Though their mandate has changed, the ICRC continues to support the basic framework it started with over three decades ago.

It works in three core areas. In orthopaedics, through its work with the Ministry of Social Affairs, the ICRC supports nearly all of the hospitals and medical centres in the country that provide prostheses to disabled Cambodians. While the project's initial scope was to help landmine victims, the organisation saw that its work could have a wider impact by helping every Cambodian in need of prostheses. Much of the work now focuses on helping victims of traffic accidents. Second, it works in improving conditions and treatment of prisoners in the Cambodian penal system. Third, it assists the Cambodian Red Cross in the spread of international humanitarian law, mine risk education, and tracing refugees. Rahm highlights the tracing of refugees as an area where the ICRC and the Cambodian Red Cross have scored a major success.

During times of conflict, the displaced and refugees struggle to keep track of their families. Not knowing what has happened to loved ones can be one of the most traumatic experiences of war. The ICRC has been assisting Cambodia in this area since the fall of the Khmer Rouge. While the main tracing files have been centred in Bangkok since 1975, the ICRC was able to hand over the responsibility for family tracing to the Cambodian Red Cross in 2000. A digitilisation of all the files stored in Bangkok began in 2005. That project was concluded in 2009.

Coinciding with the thirtieth anniversary of the ICRC being in Cambodia, the Cambodian Red Cross took complete control over the tracing responsibility and file storage in December of 2009. "It allows the Cambodian Red Cross the means to independently conduct the search of missing persons," says Rahm. To this day, people are still seeking the truth about what happened to their missing relatives during the conflict.

Working in the country for thirty years is not all cause for celebration. In an ideal Cambodia, there would be no need for the organisation's work. As the country develops, what are the ICRC's long-term objectives?

In its three focus areas, the ICRC concentrates on capacity building work with its government counterparts. In the long run, it will hand over all of its projects to either the Cambodian Government or the Cambodian Red Cross, like it did with the tracing records in December.

"We build the capacity of the authorities in these areas," says Rahm. "We are committed to engage with them to support them in their reform process over the next years until they are able to engage in the issues themselves."

At this point, it is impossible to tell just how long the ICRC office will remain in Cambodia. Over the next two years, Rahm plans to hand over responsibility for the project helping disabled Cambodians to the Ministry of Social Affairs. That will be another milestone for the ICRC. Additional handovers will happen in the coming years. The lack of a specific timeline gives both the government and the International Red Cross time to work through the minutiae without urgency.

In the mean time, the ICRC will continue the important work it has done for the last 30 years in Cambodia – representing those without a voice, assisting those who might not otherwise be assisted, and giving a hand up to a country still feeling the effects of decades of conflict.

Phnom Penh Life: Bob Passion

Rarely does one meet a man with a more fitting last name than artist **Bob Passion**. AsiaLIFE's **Lou Hayward** sits down with the enigmatic artist, sailor and social activist.



Bob: passionate about community arts

SINCE HIS CHARACTERistically unconventional arrival in Cambodia on the back of a motorbike in 2004, Bob has used his unique blend of skills to both address a number of pressing social issues and "wake people's minds" to the importance of art for art's sake. "I don't have any diplomas," Bob asserts, "And I've never had to send out a CV in my life". If, however, the charismatic Frenchman could be persuaded to sit down and catalogue his exceptional career, it would read like an adventure novel.

Bob's particular brand of artistic wanderlust emerged at an early age and at 18 he left his native Marseille for England. Returning to France four years later, whilst working as a photographer in Paris, Bob fell in with a group of like-minded people who shared his enthusiasm for creativity. Together, they established the groundbreaking Generik Vapeur street theatre group, with whom Bob travelled the world. Testament to its appeal, 25 years later, this pioneering outfit is still taking art to the streets. Later, Bob's exploratory nature saw him spend six years sailing a boat around the Caribbean and South America, docking occasionally to organise a number of large-scale special

events. In 2004 he utilised such experiences working as part of Lille's Capital of Culture tenure.

It was at the suggestion of a friend that Bob came to Cambodia, having been put in touch with the Phare Ponleu Selpak multi-arts centre, home of the Battambang Circus. Here, he spent a year helping vulnerable Cambodian children to develop their artistic skills through shows which toured across Cambodia. Bob then relocated to Sihanoukville where he set up his own art centre, BHOR. Working in close partnership with several NGOs, Bob focused his attention on HIV/AIDS awareness projects, and especially removing the taboo associated with the use of condoms.

An especially strong link was forged with NGO M'Lop Tapang, with which Bob's BHOR centre merged in 2008. "We were very close even before we joined," Bob says "but we realised we could achieve much more if our organisations married". M'Lop operates nine different centres in Sihanoukville, which provide education and vocational training, medical services and shelter to some of Cambodia's most vulnerable children. Bob played a large part in the recent renovation of M'Lop's community arts centre,

where a wide range of creative arts activities are offered including circus and theatre skills, music, hip-hop and traditional Apsara dance classes, video production and editing.

"I see such a change in the kids who come to the art playground," Bob reports "these activities have really boosted their confidence". A different performance is put on every month and costumes and props are produced on site. Instructors from around the world come to share their knowledge and experience with not only the children but also the centre's staff, something Bob sees as key to the future development of art in Cambodia. All are encouraged to take advantage of the M'Lop op-portunities. "I'll open the door", Bob says, "but it's up to them to walk through it".

One event in particular draws participation on a mass scale- the annual Kompong Som Khmarnaval. Now in its fifth year, with Bob's help and the advent of corporate sponsorship, this three-day celebration of music, dance and theatre has grown exponentially. The February 2010 edition featured music and dance performances and three separate parades which saw cars, motorbikes and 25 trucks decorated by local children weave a vibrant procession through the streets of Sihanoukville. This year again featured weird and wonderful Papier-mâché floats, including a huge blue spider and a planet - complete with satellites, in addition to a large smiling condom, again helping to spread Bob's safe sex message. Hundreds of kids participated, adorned with colourful masks and props constructed on a shoestring budget using easily attainable materials. "Khmarnaval reminds us that HIV and AIDS concerns us all, but it's also a celebration of being together," Bob explains.

Never one to shy from a challenge, despite having only just pulled off a large-scale event like Khmarnaval, Bob is already looking for partners to help him implement a safe driving campaign. Of course, he remains committed to the development of Cambodia's art scene. "I know I'm crazy, but in a good way. I want to inspire people- Ultimately, it's all about finding your own passion in life".

Getting to Grips with GPS

The endless search for an address sounds overly familiar to most. GPS Navigation devices are aiming to offer solutions for those spending too much time and petrol on finding their way through the maze. Words by **Dorine Schreiner.**

EVERYONE RESIDING IN THE Kingdom of Wonder knows the frustrating feeling of looking for an address without immediate success. Although the streets are numbered and the city is small, one can spend valuable time driving around in circles, searching for their destination.

The good news is – things have changed. Accurate and detailed digital mapping systems of Cambodia have become available. Even though Google Maps covers Siem Reap, Phnom Penh, Sihanoukville and Battambang, house numbers, landmarks, businesses and the position of some sights and landmarks have remained a challenge to locate.

In 2006, the first version of a Navigable map of Cambodia was released by Aruna Technology, and the government, the private and development sector have been using this navigation technology for years.

"Maps are updated annually by field checking and access to the latest satellite imagery" says Paul Gager, Technical Director at Aruna Technology Ltd. As Cambodian cities continue to expand, the navigation systems will continue updating information and maps. Continual improvement is necessary and ongoing to keep the information accurate.

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A Concert for Peace

Renowned classical music pianist and conductor Vladimir Ashkenazy visited Phnom Penh in early March, as part of the "Bridges" event series. Johan Smits sat down with the musical legend on the eve of his performance at Chaktomuk Theatre.

AL: YOU WERE BORN AND spent your youth under a repressive Soviet regime. Has this background anything to do with your decision to take part in the Bridges initiative of promoting peace and tolerance?

VA: No, it is beyond how I spent my youth. [Promoting peace] is an idea that is of global importance - of course - for mankind. Whatever we can do to help people understand what they're doing on our tiny planet, to help each other and go forward in every respect - cultural, economical and so on - is worth doing. And this organisation [Bridges] contributes so much that it would be impossible to overestimate it.

AL: It is often said that music is a universal language, yet different cultures have different styles of musical expression. Western classical music has not yet found its place in Cambodian society, but do you have an impression of what the possible role of classical music in Cambodia might be?

VA: Music can do a lot of positive, a lot of good in principle. Because, the message - once people understand it and begin to respond to it and appreciate it this message can make anybody's life richer, more satisfying. There's no question about that. It also expands people's intellectual, emotional and spiritual horizons. These are not empty words. There are numerous examples to support what I say, into which I cannot go now, but there's no question about it. So this can help. Any humanistic exercise moves us forward and I lament very much when I see governments cutting funds for cultural education here and there, be it music, be it anything else, because I think it puts mankind two steps back.

AL: Have you had the opportunity of listening to any traditional music here?

VA: No, I'm afraid not, it just never happened. It would be very interesting. I'm interested in all sorts of music. In a way it is very often a complete picture of a nation. I know there must be some indigenous traditional music or ideas or whatever but I'm not familiar with it.

AL: You will be performing alongside your sons Vovka and Dmitri. Is this a rare occasion or does this happen more often?

VA: Well, I've played with them separately many times, but together in one concert, never, I don't think so. But this is a special case. Because, as you know, about this society [Bridges], their aims and so on, we're doing charity, therefore I suggested this. Our concert life, in our normal

circuit, I never put forward my sons. Unless if we're invited together, I accept it or don't, whatever I see fit. But for a charity concert I suggested "how about having my two sons?" And they are at liberty to say no but they said "yes, why not, we like the idea". I didn't press the issue, I just asked if they were interested. And they were, so we're delighted to be together like this.

AL: What piano will you be playing on tomorrow?

VA: In this country unfortunately there are no good instruments at the moment, and I hope that one day either some very wealthy people or the government will help and get proper instruments. We had to borrow from the embassies

a couple of instruments. They don't match each other and they're not of the highest quality. They're even small, they're not concert grands here, so it's not good enough, but what can you do? We'll do what we can!

AL: Apart from music, what are your other passions in life?

VA: Oh, I don't know. Life... I'm thinking about what we're doing on this planet, what it's all about. How interesting our existence - philosophically. Anyway, I'm not a philosopher - of course not - but I'm interested in trying to understand what it's all about. Very wide...! [laughs]

AL: Have you got anywhere with that?

VA: No! I can't get anywhere. But the process is fascinating, that's what it is! [laughs]

AL: What are your plans for the next few years in terms of your music?

VA: Well, I'm busy non-stop all the time. I conduct around the clock. Piano playing is basically recording. Concerts I've almost done with, although this is an exception. Because, you see, I know that either you're playing all the time and then you reach a certain level at public appearances, I mean professionally. Or you don't play. It's either/or. When I play with my sons, I'm not exposed so much, it's not the same thing as playing solo – this I can do. So that's why I decided now I just conduct all the time, non-stop, and I have enough work!

Be A Khmer New Year Know-It-All

Phnom Penh's streets empty out as people head to their families in the provinces or go on a vacation to Siem Riep or Sihanoukville to celebrate the three-day Khmer New Year holiday. Words by **Dorine Schreiner**.



DID YOU KNOW... This new year is 2554 BE (Bhuddist Era).

The Buddhist Era is based on the death of Gautama Buddha, which is dated back to 543 BC.

This holiday is called 'Chol Chnam Thmey', which means "Enter The New Year."

The New Year usually falls on the first, second and third day of waning moon (dark night), this year it's Apr. 13 – 15.

Thailand, Myanmar, Sri Lanka and Laos all celebrate the New Year at this time as well.

In the two days before the celebrations, children give presents to older family members, like clothes, fruit, cake or money.

People clean their houses to get rid of the evil spirits and to start afresh in the New Year.

During the Khmer Rouge regime, the Khmer New Year was not celebrated, as Pol Pot declared 1975 to be 'Year Zero."

After the Khmer Rouge was defeated, the Khmer New

Year celebrations were immediately resumed.

The main difference in celebrations over the years is karaoke (thanks to media and electricity), all other traditions have remained the same.

Employers are expected to pay their Khmer staff a bonus of between 33% -100% of their monthly salary.

Long Beach, California is organizing their 6th annual Khmer New Year Parade this year.

Games played during the Khmer New Year are believed to help maintain the mental and physical state of the body. It is said that the body's blood pressure, brain and muscles are strengthened and challenged.

Gambling, with a mat and dice – although strictly forbidden – is popular throughout the country. Street corners are crowded with family and friends taking part.

Phnom Penh organizes games and performances at Wat Phnom, which are broadcasted on national television (CTV).




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Laughter, a new car, sex, a glass of red wine, children, winning the lottery, and friends – these are some of the things that people say make them happy. Some argue feelings of joy and contentment arise from the release of endorphins, others come with equations to measure happiness, while still others point to inner peace of mind. But what really makes us happy? **Nora Lindstrom** speaks to a variety of Penhites to find out how they pursue that most blissful of states.



The mum and the psychologist

THE MOTHER

For Mia Jordanwood, happiness only really arrived when she realised life had to be lived by love. "It's about the only thing that is reliable through time and space," says the mother of two. "Relationships in life are the only true way to get happiness. Friends are important, work is important, and living as fully as you can is important. But unless you are in the right place in your relationship those things are all hollow."

Things that bring Mia happiness include hearing her husband's bike coming up the driveway, and listening to her son expounding ideas about the extinction of dinosaurs. Having children had a big impact on Mia. "It gave me a better sense of wellbeing in the world," she says. "I now have a deeper sense of the fragility of what it is to be alive."

Though Mia is no housewife. "Work makes me happy at a very deep level," she says. "It's really important for me to be working, and to be working on something that I think of as meaningful." As a consultant on child rights issues, she notes how becoming a parent made her more sensitive to the issues and situations she is faced with at work. "My work is much harder to do," she says, but admits that she is now probably better at it.

Despite describing herself as an old hippie, Mia says technology also makes her

happy, through the things it enables her to do. "We live all the way out in Cambodia, yet have access to the rest of the world."

THE PSYCHOLOGIST

"The word happiness is a bit misleading, because it's not consistent," says Ambreen Mirza, a psychologist. "Happiness, like sadness, comes and goes, so what really makes you happy is peace of mind, rather than being happy."

Many of those who seek psychologists are of course neither at peace nor happy. Some are outright depressed. Ambreen explains that there are essentially two types of depressed people, those who are genetically predisposed to depression, and those who find themselves unable to cope with a particular situation in life.

However, for those suffering from the condition, happiness does not lie in a pill. "Medication can help, but it won't make the problems go away," says Ambreen. She explains that the role of anti-depressants is not to function as a happy pill, but to help someone depressed get out of bed and solve or deal with any problems they are facing.

As a psychologist, Ambreen does not prescribe medicine, yet she recognises there comes a point when a patient is so severely depressed medication is needed. "They can't sleep, they can't get out of bed, they're totally burnt out, nothing is actually working. Exercise isn't helping, they have suicidal thoughts, they can't function in their jobs properly, they can't function in their relationships, they don't enjoy what they do anymore. These are common symptoms of depression," says Ambreen. For some, medication may last only for a short time, and particularly for those genetically predisposed to depression, living without medication can be hard.

Ambreen also notes the release of endorphins by the body, such as from a "runner's high" or an orgasm, can lead to feelings of happiness. "But it doesn't mean we're happy only because of the endorphins, we're happy because we place value on things," she says, stressing how the body and the mind are interconnected. Her own prescription for happiness is fairly straightforward. "Good food, good friends, and the beach."

THE GURU

Humans start off happy, but during their lives are challenged in ways that may make them unhappy, says Singaporean Kumar. Based at the Raja Yoga Meditation Centre

in Phnom Penh, he describes his role at the centre as being "a friend". He says health issues, relationships, too much thinking, and natural calamities often bring people down from the original state of happiness.

Consequently, the most important thing in achieving happiness is knowing how to cope with bad issues that arise in life. "You need to deal with the situation, and then let it go," Kumar says. He adds that it is important to recognise whether a situation is one that can be changed, or one that simply has to be accepted. "It's a question of attitude."

"If you want to be happy, you need to be passionate about life," he advises, noting that laziness often goes hand in hand with unhappiness. Meditation can help for positive thinking and appreciation of life, while constant happiness comes from the art of giving happiness. "Any form of charitable act brings happiness," he says.

Kumar is particularly happy when giving knowledge to others, as well as finding new knowledge himself. "It is intoxicating," he says. "Seeing someone who has transformed themselves, and a change in myself also makes me happy."

Though clearly in tune with the more spiritual side of life, Kumar has his feet firmly on the ground. He lists basic things such as buying something new, having enough time for oneself, as well as getting enough sleep and exercise as important in achieving happiness. "We need material

Any form of charitable act brings happiness

things, and spirituality to understand how to use those material things," he says. "Happiness is a balance between spirituality and materialism."

THE ART THERAPIST

Carrie Herbert likes the idea of free hugs. "Giving hugs not to gain anything, just to give," she explains, noting how difficult that can be to do.

An art therapist by training, Carrie thinks of happiness as operating on different levels. "You could be happy when you walk into a shop and find the food you've been looking for, or see something you want to buy," she says. "It can give you a sense of happiness. It's a positive emotion or feeling, but it's also a very short-lived thing. It comes in a moment and then goes away."

For Carrie, happiness lies at a deeper level. "It's about just being, not struggling, just to be happy to be who you are," she says. "You kind of get glimpses of it, moments of it. Nature inspires me a lot. I feel a sense of joy when connecting with nature."

The combination of good food, good wine, and the company of loved ones, also bring happiness, through being more than the sum of its parts. "There is something about intimacy and connection with people that you can't buy," she says.

Through her work, Carrie says she has learnt that happiness does not come from avoiding negative, challenging, or difficult circumstances. Instead, you need to embrace difficulty in life. "It's like a spiritual quest."

She describes how people with addictions often have an unmet need or have experienced trauma. Instead of facing the issue, they try to fill the void caused by the trauma with something else, be it sex, alcohol, or drugs. But that is only a temporary fix. "Addicts need to realise their addiction is in place of something, and then look at what it is they really need," Carrie says. "But it takes a lot of courage to look at that deeper level."

THE CONSULTANT

"There are a couple of different areas of my life that make me really happy," says Gordon Patrick Peters, of Emerging Markets Consulting. "The number one thing that makes me happy is relationships with other people, like friendships, and family".

Having an enjoyable job is also important for Gordon, who describes himself as lucky for having such a positive outlook on life. "Overall, it's important to think about what makes you happy," he says, adding that he thinks it's a useful exercise for each and every one to spend some time jotting down what brings them joy.

Mindful of what makes him happy, Gordon says he spends most of his time doing exactly those things. "When I'm down, I do the same things," he says, explaining how playing football in the sun and hanging out with friends even in a foul mood is likely to make him feel better.

Not a newbie to expat life, Gordon acknowledges moving to a new place can sometimes be difficult. "I've been quite social since I arrived here, perhaps more social than I typically am," he says. "When you move to a new place, you want to make new friends and so on."

Having lived in Phnom Penh previously in 2003, Gordon already had some friends when he moved back to the Penh some six months ago. Nevertheless, it was important for him to expand his social network. "I get a lot of energy from people," he says, but notes that he now spends more time by himself. "I do have another side, I like reading a lot and spending time on my own," he says. "But there's so much to do in Phnom Penh!" Ever the optimist it seems.

THE PARTY ANIMAL

Goy Chutima Ongisanthia is a party promoter. She lists her mother, food, music, and work as things that make her happy. As part of her job, Goy needs to keep a happy face at work. "Before I start work, if I'm in a bad mood I will release that first, in any way," she says. "Screaming, shouting, a phone call to parents, or being with myself for a moment. And after that it's fine."

Previously an events organiser at Bed Supper Club in Bangkok, she says this experience has taught her that in order to do a good job, she can't pretend to be happy. "I remember going to work before in Bangkok when I was unhappy, and it was written all over my face – people could tell."

Though Goy certainly likes a good party, spending the bulk of her time in a loud, packed nightclub does take its toll. "I hate crowded places like shopping malls because I spend half my day in a club surrounded by people," she says.

Consequently, in her spare time, she seeks peace and quiet. "I love to read books, stay in my little garden with a book, and enjoy the moment," she says. "In Bangkok on a day off, I would go to stay in the jungle. Go to a national park, turn off my mobile, with no laptop, nothing, just searching for birds."

THE NGO WORKER

"There is a Khmer proverb – 'When we smile, people will smile back, but when we cry, we cry alone," says Meas Kim Seng, founder of a local organisation working with urban poor communities. "So why make myself unhappy?"

Rarely found without a grin on his face, Seng nevertheless thinks there is more to happiness than just a smile. "It's when you are true from the heart towards people," he says. "Then people will be happy together with you."

A survivor of the Khmer Rouge era, Seng's work with urban poor communities in Phnom Penh also leads him to witness traumatic events, such as evictions and demolitions of people's homes, as well as communities living in squalor. Though he feels for those affected, Seng does not let his work get him down. If anything, quite the opposite. "If you concentrate on the unhappy, you can't do anything," he says. "When you are happy you can do things."

Somewhat romantically, Seng describes his early childhood during the Lon Nol era as a happy time, with his whole family living together in a clean environment following traditional Khmer culture. After years of war, he says happiness for many Khmers now means a country at peace, but also being able to have a decent job, and pursue hobbies in their spare time.

However, Seng says some of his compatriots' current pursuit of happiness may not be for the general good. Instead, overconsumption and environmental destruction are destroying the foundations for future happiness. "Khmers should think about sustainable happiness," he says. "Nowadays, people are not thinking about happiness for future generations."

THE NUN

Beth Goldring is a Buddhist nun in the Japanese Zen tradition. She says most people, at least initially, think happiness is about getting what we want. "But we don't get what we want a lot of the time," she says. "And so the question about happiness really is about how to be at peace with what is."

A nun for 15 years, Beth describes how the Buddha never promised that bad things such as death, old age, and disease, were not going to happen. "What he promised us, is that it's possible to have a peaceful, compassionate heart, right in the middle of that," she says. "It's about being able to be happy even when we don't get what we want."

Beth explains how Buddhism starts from the premise that suffering exists – the first noble truth. This is sometimes misinterpreted to mean that happiness cannot exist, particularly as according to the second noble truth, suffering comes from craving. "Many good things contain seeds of suffering, because they go away," she explains, but notes that this does not mean there is anything wrong with pleasure. Significantly, however, "happiness is something else."

"Happiness is the stability in the middle of both pleasure and pain," she says. "It depends on us, not our circumstances." In Buddhist belief living within the boundless realms of the four cardinal virtues – loving kindness, compassion, joyousness, and equanimity – is living in happiness. But how do you do it? "You work at it, imperfectly," Beth says.

THE CONCLUSION

It seems Penhites are on the whole pretty happy. Though the source of happiness may vary, few seem to think an "off the rails" lifestyle, so often associated with Phnom Penh, brings much joy. Instead, focus is on spirituality, peace, relationships, and a general positive attitude. But does knowing what makes someone else happy help bring joy into your life too? Perhaps the best recipe for happiness ultimately comes from early twentieth century American novelist Edith Wharton; "If only we'd stop trying to be happy we could have a pretty good time."

So, yes - you can change the way you see and interact with the world, it just takes practise.

Strange Fruit and Special Flavours Part 2

We all love Khmer green curry, fish amok and cha kadow but where do those unforgettable flavours come from? **AsiaLIFE** sheds some light on ingredients you can pick up at your local market.

BANANA FLOWER (Trayong Jayk) The large purple-crimson flower of the banana tree is used as a vegetable in Cambodian cooking. Discard the outer purple leaves and only use the paler inner part. Cut in half and slice thinly with a stainless steel knife. Soak in cold water with a little lime juice added to stop it turning brown before you use it. SLACK KNANG (Slack Tnang) A green, very sour tasting leaf which is used in Cambodian soups. It needs to be chopped and pounded with a mortar and pestle before using. GALANGAL (Romdeng) This rhizome is part of the ginger family. It has a peppery taste

and a sweet, perfume-like scent vaguely reminiscent of camphor.



RED STICKY RICE (Unkar Dom Naup) This rice has a pleasant texture and flavour and is used only in sweets in Cambodia.



GREEN MANGO

(Svay kjey) Unripe mango is used as a vegetable in Cambodian cooking. It's sour with a slight sweet edge.



MORNING GLORY OR WATER SPINACH (*Tra guon*)

This long-stemmed green vegetable has narrow, dark green leaves and paler green, hollow stems. Discard the bottom 5 to 10cm of the stems as they are tough. It can be eaten raw, fried or in soups.

PRAHOK

This Cambodian staple of fermented fish has an even stronger flavour than shrimp paste. It is used in most Khmer dishes and can be eaten alone with veggies... if you're tough enough.

Food Talk: Wok With Me

AsiaLIFE's Lou Hayward spends an afternoon talking with Julie Thai about the thing she loves best – Food!



Julie: perfect combination of Chinese Cambodia and the French

"IF EVERYONE ATE AS MUCH as me, the world would run out of food!" confesses the enviably svelte proprietress of Le Wok, Julie Thai. The daughter of a Chinese-Cambodian father and a French mother, Julie was born and raised in the gourmand's paradise of Paris. Exposed to a broad variety of dishes from an early age, Julie credits her family, particularly her father, as the driving force behind her passion for food. "I lived in the country of the croissant," she reflects, "but I was just as likely to have rice soup for breakfast".

Given her upbringing, it's surprising to learn that Julie's first foray into hospitality was as a waitress in a fast food restaurant. Nevertheless, what began as a way to earn cash in her spare time whilst studying marked the start of a diverse career. Following a stint in PR for the Paris Barrio Latino – an offshoot of the renowned Buddha Bar group - Julie went on to open a shop dedicated to speciality Chinese teas. Then, already drawn to Asia and desiring a change of scene, eight years ago she came to Phnom Penh. "My father was always telling us stories about

Cambodia", Julie recalls, "I was raised with a sense of nostalgia".

Despite the reservations of some family members who fled the Khmer Rouge in the seventies Julie decided to stay, and what began as an extended holiday became a permanent relocation. Quickly immersing herself, Julie helped to set up the Amanjaya Hotel's K West bar, which to this day occupies an expansive corner of the riverside. Her first independent enterprise was Silk and Pepper, a shop on Street 178 specialising in the sale of Cambodian handicrafts.

It was the acquisition of the bright and airy space next door in 2007, however, that heralded Julie's return to the restaurant industry. Here, she established Le Wok, an elegantly understated East-meets-West eatery that provides a welcome escape from the nearby Sisowath Quay tourist trail.

While soaking up the view of the National Museum from the restaurant's terrace, patrons can choose from a varied assortment of European and Asian dishes. Within the reasonably priced menu, Cambodian staples like fresh spring rolls (US\$4.50) and fish amok (US\$7.50) sit comfortably next to traditional French dishes including blue cheese egg cocotte (UŠ\$4.50) and beef tartare, served with salad and sautéed potatoes (US\$9.50). For those with a sweet tooth, a tantalising array of desserts awaits, such as crème brulée and frozen honev ice-cream with red fruit coulis (both \$4). Grape aficionados will appreciate Le Wok's respectable wine list, which includes helpful recommendations as to which food will be complemented by each wine. Bottles start at US\$18 and the house white and red are served by both the glass (US\$3.50) and carafe (US\$8.50). As if the collection of cocktails on offer (US\$4) weren't already temptation enough, come during happy hour (every day, 5pm -7pm) and most drinks on the menu are buy-one-get-one free.

For Julie Thai, key to good cooking is the use of fresh, high quality ingredients – a lesson learned from shopping excursions to Parisian markets during her formative years. "Anyone can cook," she explains, "but what a great chef understands is how to take a good product and enhance its flavour". This philosophy is exemplified by her latest project, the newly opened T-Bone Steak House, where meatlovers can take their pick of prime cuts from Australia, Argentina and the US. Prices start at US\$8 for a steak, which customers may then tailor to their own tastes with a choice of sauces and side dishes.

So, can Phnom Penh ever compare to Paris? Julie is upbeat about the rapidly developing restaurant industry in a city she describes as "a capital of food in its own right". Mindful of the fantastic range of options for tourists and expats alike, Julie finds herself consistently impressed by the new ideas and concepts she sees. "Japanese, French, Chinese, you can get whatever you want- and it's getting better and better".

And what do her family think now? "We don't have the same Cambodia," she says. "Initially, they didn't even want to hear about my life here- actually it was painful for them- but now they can see how happy I am, and they all want to come and visit!"

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



Review: Malis

Well-known as a top-end Cambodian restaurant. Malis does not disappoint. Words by Nora Lindstrom.



A SERENE STATUE OF THE Buddha in a beautiful al fresco setting welcomes you as you step into Malis restaurant off busy Norodom Boulevard. With trees and plants amidst water features set against earthen red walls. this Khmer cuisine restaurant run by well-known chef Luu Meng makes for a classy, yet not over-the-top chic, dining experience.

Comfortably seated, the meal starts off with a complimentary shot of mango juice and some pickles. Having perused the extensive menu, we try the clams with hot basil leaves (US\$5.50) for an appetiser. A generous portion, the clams are unfortunately covered in a rather gravy-like, peppery sauce, which overpowers the delicate taste of the clams. Thankfully the side salad, complete with jasmine flowers, gives the dish a flowery freshness which complements to the clams perfectly.

For our main course, we opt for the spicy scallops with mint leaves (US\$8.50). Pan-fried with lemon and spices, and served on a bed of cucumber and mint leaves, this dish is a winner. Though it could be spicier, the scallops are fresh and the salad makes for an intriguing combination of flavours.

Continuing on the seafood theme, the Goby fish (US\$11.80) is simply delicious. Marinated with lemongrass and garlic, and baked in a crust of salt, the fish is served whole. It comes with a tangy mango dip that complements the fresh, unadulterated flesh surprisingly well. Large enough to share, this is a dish not to be missed.

While dinner is comfortably enjoyed in the enclosed garden space, lunch is best enjoyed in the restaurant's air-conditioned indoor spaces. Complete with no less than four courses, the set menu (US\$12.50+) provides a delicious insight to both traditional and contemporary Khmer cuisine, and is large enough for two to share.

Overall, Malis comes out on top. The combination of a beautiful setting, attentive and knowledgeable service, deliciously presented food, and a creative showcasing of the richness of Khmer cuisine make the restaurant a winner.

Bargain Bucket: Anjali



THE RIVERSIDE IS FULL OF identical, rattan furnished, small shop-front restaurants. Catering mainly to tourists, most serve a mix of Asian dishes and pub grub with generous happy hours to boot. Anjali, located a stone's throw north of the crossing of death, is at first look not much different.

The grub at this joint is however above par. With the slogan "Sleep 'til you're hungry, eat 'til you're sleepy", Anjali has an extensive menu. The all day BIG breakfast at US\$4.25 is a definite winner, complete with bacon, sausage, baked beans, smoked ham, eggs, hash browns, grilled tomatoes, toast and coffee or tea. Another favourite among meat-eaters is the roast beef with sausage and chips (US\$6). Though somewhat dearer than what is usually considered a "bargain bucket" dish, the tender meat, very decent sausage (not Sainsbury's finest, but very good for Cambodia), as well as lovingly thick gravy, make sure the dish represents very good value for money.

Lighter meal options include a range of salads, including the Nicoise salad (US\$3). Large in size, the salad fills your tummy with fresh ingredients and nicely complementing dressing, served on the side as requested. For those with a serious bout of Anglo-Saxon home sickness, the creamy mashed potato (US\$1.50) is not to be missed. Though not exactly like your mum would make it, the thick mash is not bad considering you are miles from home.

If you're looking for a more liquid-based meal, pop by the establishment during the daily happy hours between 5pm and 8pm, or again between 11pm and midnight. During these, you can enjoy Angkor draft at US\$1 a glass, or US\$4 a jug. More sophisticated drinkers might wish to opt for a glass of house wine (US\$2.25), while those in search of a hangover will undoubtedly be content with the Mekong whisky and mixer for a dollar.

Though service could be faster and more attentive, Anjali is a comfortable little spot to while the day away, just like the establishment's slogan suggests.



Whisky, Whiskey - So Good They Named it Twice

AsiaLIFE whets its whistle on the complex and wonderful world of 'The Water of Life.'



The finest and the famous - it pays to know what's a fine dram and what's not

NEVER HAS THERE BEEN a more complex beverage than 'Uisge beatha' (Gaelic for the water of life) for with it comes a history fraught with copious law, taxation and brewing issues. Whisky or whiskey, depending on which side of the Irish Sea the potion was distilled, continues to leave its compelling mark on the palate of the liquor-swilling world.

From Babylonia to Dundee, from the second millennium to the twenty-first century production of whisky has undergone countless modifications. The art of distillation began in Mesopotamia (modern Iraq) where it is believed Irish missionaries brought it over to the Emerald Isle around the sixth or seventh century. Its use circulated through the monasteries predominantly for medicinal purposes, and became a treatment for ailments such as palsy and small pox.

Some five centuries of inebriation and healing later the antidote spread to the shores of Scotland. At this point the whisky business began to thrive, even though the distillation process was rather primitive. Whisky was imbibed at a young age giving it a raw and harsh taste. It could be extremely dangerous. Only by chance did someone dare drink a bottle that had been disregarded for several years and realise how smooth a drink it could be.

Tax issues occupied the next couple of centuries forcing Scotland's distillation underground. In an attempt to avoid the excise man Scottish distillers took to brewing their whisky at night to hide the smoke rising from the stills, a process which became known as moonshine.

Over fifty percent of Scottish output was illegal. Since these times whisky has developed into a worldwide regulated spirit with many competing denominations of origin, classes and types. U.S., Finland, Germany, India and Japan are amongst many nations that have joined the market. But it is 'Scotch' that dominates.

The laws on the production of whisky are stringent and plenti-

ful. Anything bearing the scotch label must be distilled in Scotland and matured for a minimum of three years and one day – quite what happens in that one day remains a mystery. Irish whiskeys, in comparison, must be produced in Ireland and aged in wooden casks for a period of no less than three years. The most highly prized whiskies are the single malts – distilled by a single distillery in a pot still, using malted barley as the only grain.

WHISKIES OF THE PENH The Cavern Bar, Street 104.

This diminutive hideaway, sandwiched inconspicuously between the dazzling neon bustle of Street 104 is the single malt aficionados wet dream. No less than sixteen first class whiskies are on offer from the Penh's consummate whisky provider. The Macallan 1881 is one of the smoothest single malts you will taste. Carrying that unique Macallan character this vintage gold drop has a wonderful mix of fruits and a floral and sweet malted barley aroma balanced with light ginger spice (not to be confused with Geri Halliwell). The taste is smooth and carries a comfortable aftertaste. At US\$7 a glass, it's reasonably priced.

Green Vespa, Sisowath Quay

The Penh's favourite Irish bar has come up trumps again with a generous selection of 'Scotch'. Not without good reason is the Talisker 10 years the Isle of Skye's finest export. It's an alluring, sweet, full-bodied whisky with a warming afterglow that comes highly recommended. Alternatively, opt for the 12-year-old Glen Elgin which is an incomparable malt of completely contrasting taste. Clinical and minty on the palate it carries an intriguing, delicate kick. The Vespa offers the perfect atmosphere in which to imbibe and special Malt Mondays.

Chow, Sisowath Quay

Forget the blanched downstairs restaurant, and head for the rooftop bar. Simply stunning, it has



views to match. It also boasts an extensive single malt menu with 'Oban' the elite of the collection. This 14-year-old single malt goes down extremely smoothly giving you a wonderful warm sensation from tongue to oesophagus. This drop is top notch and if your wallet sanctions it (US\$10 a glass) treat yourself to a wee dram, sit by the pool and enjoy the view.

Sonoma, 32 Street 108

This newly opened oyster bar is a small, convivial affair. Adjacent to the Old Market, barely a stone's throw from Sisowath Quay, it offers the perfect opportunity for an alternative culinary experience. The Kilpatrick oyster dish (Worcester sauce, black pepper and dry Heseltine bacon) with a tumbler of 10-year-old Laphroaig is an exquisite affiliation. This is a full-bodied smoky, single malt with a residual sweetness and a warming finish. As civilised a place as you will find to enjoy this classic dram.

Armands Bistro, Street 108

Discreet and enigmatic, this petite cloak and dagger French bistro oozes warmth from every pore. This is the Latin quarter, Paris 1943. At any moment you expect the door to open and in walk two German soldiers, who place their hats on the bar and get passed a bottle from a rotund, mustachioed barman. Order a rib eye steak with sautéed potatoes, green beans and roasted tomatoes. Wash it down with a Macallan 12. With a complex fruity taste and hint of spice this is not a light tipple. Despite the citrusy aroma this is an over powering malt. A scotch drinkers whisky, the dilettante palate would most likely not enjoy the immediate and powerful flavour. Although for US\$15 all in this represents real value for money.

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

Bar Talk: Blue Chilli

Kate Liana sits down with Oak Chan to explore his inner diva and find out what makes this popular, unique club tick.

WHO DOESN'T HARBOUR secret rock-star fantasies? Dolled up, strutting on a stage before an adoring crowd... "If I didn't own a bar, I'd do this in my living room!" says Oak Chan, the friendly, fervent owner of Blue Chilli, regarding the popular drag shows. Weekend nights see a lively crowd spilling out onto the street, watching the festivities. And the airls put on a show: dancing, lip synching, and preening in ultra-glamorous fashion.

Beyond the sequined glamour, however, is a welcoming, warm environment that is refuge to many in town. Originally from Thailand, Oak wanted to open a local gay bar like the ones he knew from home. "I wanted to make a place where evervone feels comfortable, but especially gay people. They had no place they could be themselves." He explains that the community becomes your family here, especially for gay men who may not feel accepted at home.


The bar has a funky charm, with all the traditional accoutrements of a gay club: sequin curtain, disco ball, photos of nearly naked men on the walls and menu. But the long, wooden bar, comfortable seats, and outdoor space also make it a welcoming neighbourhood spot, where friends pop in for a drink after work, or one more before heading home.

Oak has seen many changes in the gay community since his arrival three years ago. "Gay life was much more closed and secretive. Now, that's not the case." One major change is that while the club used to attract mostly foreigners, Oak is seeing more local customers. "Gay life is becoming more accepted here. and the scene is growing. People aren't afraid to be who they are." And they are not the only ones attracted to Blue Chilli. Many straight customers also show up for the lively shows.

Along with his business partners, Oak's personal dedication to the club makes a big difference. It's not just a business, it is their home. "We celebrate the holidays like any other family. We'll decorate for Christmas and Chinese New Year. We crown a Mrs. Water Festival, and during Gay Pride Month [May] this year we'll have a Mr. Blue Chilli contest." Let the fantasy continue.







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Darren Gall: The Heart in Your Glass

"WINE IS CONSTANT PROOF that God loves us and wants to see us happy." The insightful words of Benjamin Franklin.

An understanding of the French term 'terroir' is difficult to convey in other languages – it is almost impossible to arrest the truespirit of its meaning with any composition in English.

It is said to be the unique characters imparted into any specific wine by its own individual soils, its climate and even the personalities involved in the wine's creation.

In over twenty years of getting to know wine regions, vineyards, winemakers and their wines, it is as plain to me as saying that a wine is made from a specific grape variety, to say that in every wine there is evidence of the personality and character of the winemaker that produced it. This is of course particularly true for smaller. family owned wineries and it is not a testament to a belief or faith, it has merely been my observation, indisputable to me, an inviolable truth.

Winemakers are wont to either create wines that bear the winemaker's impression on the terroir or, create wines that are purely an expression of their terroir: a subtle distinction that relates to the visibility (or invisibility) of the winemaker's hand (and personality) in their wines.

Pierre Andre winemaker, Ludivine Griveau was born and raised in the heart of Burgundy, her passion, her intimacy with this most intricate and complex of wine regions – seamlessly infused into her wines – renders them into something much more than mere impression or expression, it elevates them to the realm of revelation.

As a member of a local family fascinated by Burgundian wine and gastronomy, she recalls fondly her grandfather introducing the first sip of Pinot Noir to her lips



After gaining her Oenology degree at the Jules Guyot Institute in Dijon Ludivine began her career as a winemaker at Domaine Jacques Prieur, natural curiosity and a thirst for knowledge led her to Australia, and a stint as winemaker for Rosemount Estates.

After returning to Burgundy, Ludivine was appointed winemaker at the prestigious estate of Pierre Andre in 2003. The Chateau's access to vineyards spanning the length and breadth of the region has given full expression to Ludivine's intuitive understanding and affinity with the various subregions and micro-climates of her homeland. Ludivine's initial vintage at Pierre Andre yielded gold and silver medals at the prestigious London International Wine Challenge, an outstanding achievement for the then twenty six year old - the winery has been collecting medals, awards and coveted reviews ever since.

Today, Ludivine Griveau is acknowledged as one of the finest young talents in all Burgundy, her wines are must haves for many collectors and connoisseurs and it is to the pleasure and appreciation of us all that she wears her heart in her glass.

The Most Secret Place on Earth

AsiaLIFE's Kate Liana sits down with filmmaker Marc Eberle to discuss his touching documentary on The CIA's Covert War in Laos.



Marc filming in the open

CELLULOID IMAGES OF the open war in Vietnam have fixated Hollywood producers for decades, but little has been filmed about the 'secret' war in Laos that actually started five years previously. Researching ideas for a new project, filmmaker Marc Eberle travelled to Laos in 2002. He was struck by how much evidence there still was of the war.

"I saw the remnants of war everywhere, giant craters and scraps of metal from bombs," he says.

Despite being the biggest airborne bombing campaign in military history, the existence of the war in Laos was little known to anyone. Marc wanted to know how you go creating and maintaining a secret war, and what this meant for warfare in the future. It is this question that he pursues in his documentary The Most Secret Place on Earth (The CIA Covert War in Laos).

He was disappointed by the way other books and films on the subject had glorified the war, with little thought given to the Laotian people who had been the victims. The Hmong, an ethnic group close to the borders with Vietnam, were backed by the CIA to fight against the communist Lao and North Vietnamese forces. Abandoned by the Americans after the war and shunned by their own government, many are refugees. Some allegedly still live in remote jungle areas unaware that the war is over.

The war in Afghanistan started while Marc was shooting his documentary. He immedi-

ately saw the parallels between the two wars.

"I couldn't believe it, the tactics, the weapons, the political theory were the same," he says. "Laos was the progenitor of war in the 21st century – outsourcing war to private companies, no accountability to congress or the public, to the press. I saw it all happening again and thought this was the time to tell this story."

His research brought him to Long Cheng, the secret military base that served as the CIA's headquarters. It had been closed to the world since the CIA fled in 1975. Marc and his film crew were the first foreigners to gain access to it. This would serve as the emotional and symbolic core of the story, and the documentary is built around this base and its history.

A sobering and thorough account of the history and methodology that led to the atrocities, The Most Secret Place on Earth includes archive footage of bombing raids and decimated villages. It ends with a heartbreaking look at the refugees and the scarred landscape left behind by the Americans' actions. Perhaps of most interest though are the interviews with the many servicemen involved in the war, and their moral ambivalence towards the events.

Recently aired on German / French art channel ARTE, the documentary has been nominated for many awards on the international film festival circuit. It won an award for the best use of archival footage at the History Makers' Conference in New York City.

His latest project is a documentary on the post-Khmer Rouge generation growing up without any experience of the past that previous generations dealt with. He aims to show how this new generation will live their own lives. Heartened by the growing art scene, he celebrates the number of young artists who are starting to challenge the old models, and are questioning society. "Foreigners come here and tell all the negative stories," he says. "I wanted to do a positive one."

He is also working on a separate film about the Khmer Rouge tribunal that will focus on how modern Cambodian society is reconciling with the past and concepts of justice. "Every stone you turn over here, there's a story." The screening of The Most Secret Place will at least ensure that one stone is no longer left unturned.

The Most Secret Place on Earth (The CIA Covert War in Laos) will have two screenings presented by the Overseas Press Club at the new Meta House at the end of April and May.

44 INCH CHEST

(2010, Malcolm Venville) Fans of modern British classic Sexv Beast will be glad to learn that 44 Inch Chest is in a similar vein, the dialogue bearing the unmistakable style of the writers of both films Louis Mellis and David Scinto, though Sir Ben Kingsley unfortunately doesn't resurrect the memorable Don. Still, Ray Winstone is back as a morose jilted husband looking to wreak vengeance on his cuckold, and is joined by the august John Hurt, Tom Wilkinson and Ian 'Lovejoy' McShane. The pared-down film has few locations and little story development, though the admirable casting and peerless writing makes for some unforgettable scenes between the acting heavyweights, though this is in many ways more of a play than a movie.

AVATAR

(2009, James Cameron) Set in the year 2154 on Pandora, a lush, Earth-like moon, the sprawling new 3D showcase Avatar unimaginatively pits the faceless big business of the future against the ethereal tribal nobility of the native Na'vi. Unoriginality is the name of the game: the RDA corporation mining "unobtanium" (yes, the script is that bad) is spookily similar to the evil "Company" from Ridley Scott's Alien franchise, and the tree hugging blue aliens spouting embarrassingly simplistic new age truisms are an insulting approximation of forest tribes. Surprisingly, Sigourney Weaver is the biggest star, soullessly reprising her Gorillas in the Mist role without any of its original breadth. This interminably long exercise in onanism milks every possible disorientating special effect from the frankly exhausting shenanigans of the genetically engineered Na'vi bodies used by human characters. And 'avatar' is also the title of the film—how clever!

THE STING

(1973, George Roy Hill) Starring Paul Newman and Robert Redford, The Sting recreates the caper atmosphere of the better-known Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid (same director), though in the grim depths of the 1930s depression rather than the Wild West. The elaborate scams that the two 'grifters' dream up would make any modern day blagger proud, ranging from cheating at cards, to staged street robberies and fake bookies. Pleasingly, the scams in the film were inspired by real-life cons perpetrated by the brothers Fred and Charley Gondorff (the same surname as Newman's character in the film). With a tinkling piano score and suitably dreary sets, The Sting feels authentic enough to excuse the rather one-dimensional plot, and the pairing of Redford and Newman makes for an eminently watchable classic. 🖪

Wearing riding chaps and surrounded by enthusiastic young riders, French Trainer Guillaume Larivain explains what a typical lesson at the CCC encompasses.

'For the first half-an hour you learn how to choose and take care of your horse." Choosing a horse depends on the rider's level, but the main priority for an unfit rider is finding a horse that is friendly. The second part of the lesson you learn the art of precision and control while riding. Both individual and group lessons bear in mind the individual skill level of the rider. Typically, the rider will practice in the larger arena. To change things up, an instructor can lead you out on a trail with small

hills or on the street just outside of the equestrian centre to learn how to control the horse in various settings.

For advanced riders, learning and performing the elements of dressage and show jumping makes riding here all the more exciting. Dressage is the French term for the set path of competitive horse training in which the standard training methods enable a horse's natural ability to perform as a riding horse. As Guillaume explains, "The idea is to maximize the harmony between the rider and the horse, while focusing on precision and control." Overall, the goal is to prepare riders for the international arena, so they are able to utilize what they've learned with Guillaume or Cambodian trainer Soparith Hoy and ride abroad.

Horse riding offers multiple health benefits. Young riders learn how to be safe and independent, while having fun as they grow confident and learn to let go of any fear. The groom will take riders out to practice in the smaller arena, before letting them venture out to the larger 70sqm arena.

Guillaume explains that the interaction between the rider and the horse helps to develop a person's ability to relate to others not of the same background or language. "A horse doesn't speak English or French. It thinks differently." Riders learn to work as a team with their horse, staying in tune with the horse's movements and communicating via hand or foot gestures. Guillaume believes riding teaches youngsters responsibility and maturity as well as coordination and core balance.

Run by General Manager Ms. Soraya Ourrais, the Equestrian Centre has 31 horses purchased from Thailand with Vietnamese, Australian and European breeding. Formal individual and group lessons with experienced horse trainers and instructors offer a professional and safe way to ride in Cambodia. Typically group sizes range from three to four persons. A one-hour group lesson for riders aged 12 and under is set at US\$13 and for those over 12 years of age, costs US\$16. Regardless of age, individual lessons currently run at US\$30 per hour. A 15-minute trail lead is a US\$5. The Club also offers specials, including a free lesson with the purchase of a 10 hour lesson pass and a Special Horse Riders Membership of US\$250 per year. Should you happen to own your horse in Cambodia and have no place to put it, the Club's stables offer room and board for ponies at US\$289 per month and US\$350 for horses, which include a box, bedding, food, water, electricity, and grooming.

WE CUT IT, COLOUR IT, curl it, gel it, spray it and straighten it, we have good hair days and bad hair days. The way our hair looks can have an impact on the way we feel, as the saying goes, "if you look good, then you feel good."

Communication with a stylist can be difficult along with the dilemma of limited quality hair products available.

Here are a few tips to help you along the way to having more good hair days than bad in the Penh.

Hair cut/colour. Visuals work well. Take a picture with you to the salon to assist with communication. Research products used in the salon first and stick to professional brands.

Hair colour care. Different water conditions affect artificial colour staying power and may cause natural hair to appear dull. Prolong colour life and give natural colour a boost by using a shampoo that contains colour.

Drv hair. Long hair needs a rest from straighteners and dryers. To improve the effectiveness of your conditioner, towel-dry your hair before applying to remove excess water and comb the product through with a wide toothcomb.

Frizzy Hair. Tame it down with a few drops of hair serum. Rub together in

your hands; apply sparingly and evenly through the hair to de frizz. Also when in a moto or a tuk-tuk wrap a scarf or krama over your hair Audrey Hepburn style - you'll be amazed how tidv vour hair still looks by the end of the day.

Lice. Easier to prevent than treat; Mix together in a sprav bottle. 2 cups of water, 2 tbsp conditioner and 3 drops of either, eucalyptus or lavender essential oil. This treatment can also be used everyday to keep children's hair smelling fresh in this hot climate. Tie hair up for school.

Jane Lopacka: Traumatic Stress

Everyone has suffered stress at some time of their lives. But how we deal with it varies from individual to individual.

WE ALL PROCESS TRAUMATIC events differently. Whilst one person may have an adverse reaction to something bad happening to them, another might seem unaffected by it. There are various reasons for these differing responses. What is important is that we recognise individual responses as different not wrong.

We take information into our active memories using one or two of our senses. When an event of a traumatic nature occurs, you take in information using all five senses. This overwhelms the active memory so it takes time for the brain to process all the information. When something mildly disturbing happens to us it might take two or three days before we process the information and stop reacting to it. More disturbing events take longer to process. A healthy response to a traumatic event can take up to 28 days to process with symptoms that build up and become acute after which you return to your normal state of being.

A Critical Incident Stress Debriefing conducted by trained debriefers, preferably between 48 and 72 hours after the event, helps the mind to organise information relating to a traumatic event.

It can mitigate the longerterm effects of psychological trauma. Even years later, it can be helpful.

Symptoms that persist after four weeks might move you into post-traumatic stress disorder, when it is more difficult to return to your normal way of being. Acute stress response and posttraumatic stress disorder can be the result of a single traumatic event or a series of traumas over a long period of time. Vicarious trauma is the result of being exposed to other people's trauma material, such as listening to or reading about other people's traumatic stories.

Disturbed sleep, hypervigilance, depersonalisation, irritability and avoidance of situations that might remind you of the trauma are typical symptoms. If you have suffered a trauma, it is best to get help in processing your experience sooner rather than later. When choosing a counsellor, always check out their professional credentials and ensure they are receiving clinical supervision.

Best Kept Secret: Tailor-made Condoms



GOING TO THE TAILOR'S for a fitting is a common event in many expats' lives in the Penh. However, the fittings are usually for clothes, not prophylactics. Thanks to new technology now available in Cambodia, those engaging in more or less amorous bedroom exploits can now also get their very own, personalised condoms.

Produced by a company called ConFit, the tailormade condoms naturally come in all sizes and variety of thickness. They can further be individualised by extra details, such as flavours and images.

To make the condoms, ConFit uses a special machine that takes a unique 3D computer image of the penis. In order to ensure perfect fit, two images are required – one of the penis in erect state, the other in flassid state.

Representatives of the company note that tailormade condoms are not only about aesthetics and comfort. They are about safety as well. "Uncomfortable condoms can easily break or slip, adding to the risk of infection or pregnancy," April Hoodwink, the company's Cambodia representative said. She added that ConFit has secured an ISO for the product, making sure it is up to international condom standards, as set by the Condom Standards Convention held in Korea in 2007.

Given the production cost, ConFit only retails the condoms in batches of 100. Prices start at US\$150 for plain 3-inch condoms, increasing by US\$10 per inch. An added flavour will set you back US\$20, while ribbings cost US\$25, and images scanned on to the prophylactic are yours for US\$15.

"Most of our customers like to be playful, adding images and slogans on their condoms," April noted, adding that the average size of condoms sold in Cambodia so far is 4.2 inches long and 1.9 inches in diameter.

Kidz Cool

Baby it's hot outside. Load up the kids and head to **Kidz Cool** for good, clean, cool fun. Words by **Kate Liana**.

PARENTS FREQUENTLY bemoan the lack of children's activities in the capital. When Eric and wife Ourinh moved here with their two young children, they decided to change that. "We had the idea just to make a small playground," explains Eric, gesturing around at the 3,500sqm recreational behemoth that's bloomed on the site, looking a little dazed. "I'm not sure what happened."

What happened is Kidz Cool, a "mini-club med for kids", as Eric describes it, that's packed with fun, games, and friendly staff so parents can relax. Originally in town to work for the tennis federation, Eric and his wife were looking for a house on Chroy Changvar. "The space was so big, we decided to use it for the playground." What started as a simple idea grew into a mega-complex that continues to expand.

Starting with the wee ones, 18 months and up, there is a "soft play" area in the main house with age-appropriate, safe toys. The Princess Room, on the same floor, is where aspiring stylists can play with makeup, hair styling, or have their faces painted. Next door kids can paint and draw in the Creation Room. Outside is a play area for older toddlers featuring a jungle gym, trampoline, miniclimbing wall, and what looks like a giant hamster obstacle course.

Now that we're smack dab in the middle of hot season, the most attractive features are the

ones that involve water. Out back behind the main house is the football pitch and the inflatables: three giant bouncy structures in the shape of a giant Spider Man, a princess castle, and a giant rubber water slide. There's also a regulation, properly equipped climbing wall, which is manned by trained staff. The grand star is the massive 150m pool, which has all manner of toys floating in it.

All the materials are brand new, durable and clean. Every play area and outdoor space is shaded to keep kids out of the sun, and will be a boon in the rainy season. Safety is foremost on parents' minds, and Eric has made it a priority. There are 17 full-time staff, four of whom are certified emergency responders. An infirmary with basic supplies is staffed by a nurse on weekends. The complex is fully insured and there are three full-time security guards who ensure adults without children are not granted admission. All this translates to fun for kids and peace of mind for parents, a priceless goal.

On a recent visit, one couple raved about the staff, who were romping in the pool with their kids. "This is the best place for kids in the city," they said. "We've been here three years, and haven't seen anything like it."

Eric and Ourinh's future plans are even bigger: they just purchased a speedboat and can pick you up from anywhere along the river on weekends, free of charge. They also want to offer water skiing and tours around the peninsula. In order to keep parents as gleefully entertained as their kids, the air-conditioned parent's lounge will soon have a bar, pool table, television, newspapers and magazines, and will offer massages, manicures and pedicures. Other plans include mini-golf, a pool for parents, and a water park. After working at Club Med all over the world for the past eight years, the couple knows how to take care of people. "We wanted to offer something to families here, a space where everyone can have fun.'

Despite all of the activity, the place still feels warm and homey, not surprising since Eric, Ourinh and the kids live on the site in the main house, and can boast one of the coolest backyards in town. Costs are US\$5 on weekdays for each child, US\$10 on weekends – parents and caregivers are free. Open 9am to 6pm everyday. Grab your bathing suit and go.



As Fabrizio says, "We believe in what we do. We have the right quality and something special in Cambodia that nobody else is doing."

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

Getting out of Dodge

We all love the Penh, but even the most die-hards need to get out of town every now and again. **Craig Gerard** examines the most practical ways to scoot on out.

FLY, FLY AWAY

Budget airlines abound in Asia, and with a little advanced planning, cheap tickets are easy to come by to certain destinations. Air Asia, based on the model of Southwest Airlines, a popular US budget carrier, offers direct flights to Bangkok and Kuala Lumpur. Check their website for regular sales. If you time it well, you can fly to either destination for as little as US\$30 round trip. You do have to pay extra for baggage, assigned seating, and in-flight snacks and drinks.

If your final destination is not Bangkok or KL, you must book a separate roundtrip ticket from that airport, and transfer your own bags when you transit. These annovances are what you put up with to get such cheap tickets. Another budget option currently available is Jet Star service to Singapore. Sale tickets are available for as little as US\$100 as long as you promise not to check any baggage. While there is no current service direct from Phnom Penh to Manila, rumour has it that the Cambodian government is in discussion with budget airline Cebu Pacific, which should drastically reduce the cost of flights to the Philippines when that route comes on line.

If budget airlines and quick fix destinations aren't your think – it's best to trust your travel plans to a quality travel agent. East-West Travel, located near the BKK market has been booking affordable flights and providing reliable service to expats in Phnom Penh for nearly a decade.

MAGIC BUS

Bus service in Cambodia has drastically improved over the past five years, and now it is possible



to get a reasonably priced ticket on a comfortable, air-conditioned coach to most popular destinations in the country. Mekong Express, with offices at the River Front and O'Rrussey Market, offers service to Siem Reap, Sihanoukville, and Ho Chi Minh City, all for about US\$12 per trip.

The bus has a bathroom on the coach, which may or may not be cleaner than the toilet at the rest stop. You will get a snack and a bottle of water when you arrive on board. Other than the pesky mosquitoes, this is as comfortable as you could expect a bus to be. And if you are a fan of Khmer karaoke, then you're really in for a treat.

If you are headed to Vietnam, taking a Vietnamese bus company like Sapaco, may reduce your time sitting at the border. The bus station is near Olympic Stadium and leaves seven times a day. The reverse is true as well, travel with a Cambodian company when making the return trip.

A fairly new bus company just came online called Sok Sokha Express, running between Phnom Penh and both Siem Reap and Sihanoukville. One other word of advice: take the daytime bus. Travelling in the provinces at night can be risky business. The obstacles aren't just erratic drivers with questionable sobriety, but animals also make their way onto the pavement to soak up the heat.

CARS

While car rental places have not made it to Cambodia, there are options if you want your own car for the weekend. Most (if not all) come with drivers, so sit back and enjoy the ride. A one-way sedan taxi service to Sihanoukville will cost you US\$35-45, and to Siem Reap would be US\$45-55. Taxis to most destinations can be hired near Central Market. Roundtrip service is also an option, and usually costs around \$120 for the weekend, which includes gas, the driver's accommodation and the driver to chauffer you around during the weekend. Prices will

be higher for further destinations and more nights.

If you have a large group, consider renting a Van which seats 10 passengers and costs a mere US\$150 for the weekend.

Additionally you can rent a car, SUV, Minibus, or Van with out a driver. Prices range depending on size of vehicle. It's best, but not essential, to have a Cambodian Driver's Licence.

The other option for travel to Siem Reap is the "fast" boat. One-way tickets can be purchased at the passenger dock (Sisowath Quay and Street 102), and cost US\$35. While the cabin of the boat is rather plain, most passengers opt to climb on the roof of the boat and catch some rays. Bring a cooler and some sunscreen so you can pass the six-hour ride sunbathing and watching the riverside villages of the Tonle Sap drift on by. Bear in mind this boat is not available at the end of the dry season.

The Geek: Windows 7



In this month's article, the Geek discusses a very hot topic - Windows 7 in Cambodia

AS APPLE CONTINUES TO increase its market share and convert users to its stable and user-friendly operating system, many observers felt it was time for Microsoft to unleash a new system of its own - especially to fix the bad reputation brought about by Vista. But is the Cambodian market ready for Windows 7?

From the beginning of this year, most computers sold in Cambodia come with Windows 7 already installed. This doesn't include netbooks, which run better on XP. Windows 7 is meant to be more stable. secure and graphic friendly. But should you upgrade to 7? The answer is yes, if your laptop is compatible this is a hardware capacity question. Most - but not all - laptops that run Windows Vista should be able to run Windows 7. There might be some driver issues during upgrade so you'll need to check the support websites for your computer components. Functions like Bluetooth or Finger print might not work on your older model laptop. If you can live without these options, then

upgrading to Windows 7 will be good for you.

Compared to previous Microsoft operating systems, security has been improved to fight against well-known viruses and hacking vulnerabilities. Most devices plugged into your computer will be detected and installed straight from the Microsoft Windows update server, so long as your computer is connected to the Internet. The Aero Peak Taskbar makes it easy for you to flick through opened programmes and files. So far, the 7 OS has been stable enough for me to have my laptop running for weeks without needing to restart it like I used to with XP - I'm sure many of you have experienced this frustration.

I also recommend those who are going to use Windows 7 at work, to upgrade to the professional edition. This is because the home edition limits some functions that you'll need at work.

Trevor Keidan: Turning Money into More Money



"I WANT TO DO THAT THING rich people do where they turn money into more money," says Liz Lemon (played by Tina Fey) to her boss Jack Donaghy (played by Alec Baldwin) in the popular US sit-com 30 Rock.

And although the line - like Tina Fey's character - is fictional, it could very well apply to at least some people reading this column. After all there are those that share Liz's belief that using money to make money is not for everybody.

However, I beg to differ - turning 'money into more money' is not the domain of the rich. Instead - with a little forethought and financial planning it can be for everybody.

Simply put there are two ways to pay for our financial responsibilities and wants. One is by saving and the other is by investing.

While saving is putting money aside to pay for something at a later date, investing is the act of using your money to make more money. And while saving is normally used to achieve short-term financial goals in-

vesting usually means taking a longer term view.

So why should we invest instead of save? The most common reason is to beat inflation because the interest rates offered by banks are often not adequate to stave off the persistent perils of inflation. In addition investing will often allow us to achieve more growth faster. However, one must also realise that investing is not without its risk - as well as its reward.

The most common ways to do this are by investing in stocks, mutual funds and bonds.

Perhaps the most common form of investment nowadays is in stocks and the stock market. When you buy a stock you are actually buying a share in a company. The value of that stock (or share) is determined by the success of that company. Normally if the company does well the share price increases.

While stocks are expected to give you a higher return than the interest available on most savings accounts there are risks associated with

this type of investment. The share price could go down as well as up and the company itself could even go bankrupt rendering the stock worthless. However, in most cases if you invest using a long-term view and use proper strategies the risk is minimized.

Another increasingly common type of investment involves bonds. A bond is effectively an agreement which involves a loan between the purchaser of the bond and the issuer.

When you buy a bond you are effectively lending the issuer money. In return for the loan you will receive interest payments on your outlay. The length of the term and the interest rate is determined when the bond is issued.

Bonds can be issued for as little as one year or as much as 30 years. During this term the issuer pays the bondholder interest. Upon maturity the issuer has to pay the bondholder the face value of the bond. Bonds are normally issued by governments, government agencies and corporations.

Another type of investment that has gained in popularity over the years is that of the mutual fund. The essence of mutual funds is that investors are able to pool their own investments with others. This can allow for increased buying power and bigger profits. In addition the fund is often managed - which takes away the need to persistently monitor the investment as one would with individual stocks. Funds are a great way for a beginner to enter the world of investing.

So, if you want "to do that thing rich people do" and make the most of your money to achieve your financial goals then rest assured it is possible. However, my recommendation to vou (and Liz Lemon) is to obtain professional financial advice.



Khmer Ingenuity

Foreign dominance in the Siem Reap restaurant trade is a fact that is hard to ignore. **Nicky Hosford** sheds some light on two restaurant owners that have beaten the odds.



Only the freshest is good enough at Boulangerie

LA BOULANGERIE OWNER, 27-year-old Leak Sokun, was looking bleary eyed in the back of his café at midday. He's up half the night baking the delicious croissants, breads and pastries that fly out of his kitchen at first light to awaiting temple goers, hotels and restaurants. At 6am the popular café is open and ready for the steady flow of expats who have made this their breakfast-home away from home.

Sokun's family couldn't afford to send him to university, but fate had another plan for him as he was selected for training as a Boulanger in France. The only foreign student in the class in Aurillac, Central France, he overcame his fears of being an outsider in a foreign land and went on to succeed –graduating from the programme with top marks and winning a competition for artistic decorations. Since his return to Siem Reap in 2002, he's worked at Sofitel and Paul Du Brule, but all along he dreamed of owning his own place.

Over the years he waited and saved until finally, together with two friends and partners, he



was able to scrape together the money for the expensive equipment, and Voila! La Boulangerie was born! Better news yet the café survived the critical first year and celebrated its first anniversary last month.

Perk Sophal of Khmer Kitchen served no apprenticeship. As a young 18-year-old, she went to work for the UN as a cook during the 1993 elections. Her family and neighbours were totally opposed to her working for foreigners, but she persisted and eventually landed a job working as a cook for Médecins Sans Frontières.

At 26, Sophal grew tired of hearing foreigners talking always of Thai, Vietnamese and Chinese food, but never about Khmer food. Her mind was set to do something about it.

She shifted her entire family to the upper quarters of their central Siem Reap home and began a bare bones restaurant on the ground floor.

She had to move all of her family upstairs and borrow gas from her neighbours to cook with, but with four tables in the ground floor of her house and some very cheap crockery she managed to start up a bare bones restaurant in central Siem Reap.

This meant continuing her work at MSF during the day, then coming back to run her restaurant every night. It was exhausting, but little-by-little she was able to build and grow and now has arguably one of the most popular restaurants in Siem Reap, on three different sites.

The training available to Sokun is a reflection of increased foreign assistance to Cambodia since the 1993 elections during which Sophal first started her working career. Times are changing still and Sophal worries about the young Khmer generation who seem to miss the beauty in other people, and often value only money. Both Sophal and Sokun brought their own patience and persistence to their enterprises, undaunted by the challenges and obstacles ahead of them. "I knew nothing, not even how to write a menu!" says an amazed Sophal. You'd never know it now.



getaways

It is possible to have a family holiday that combines sightseeing, shopping and eating in a spectacular way. Words by **Danielle Craiche.** Photos courtesy of the **Malaysia Tourism Promotion Board**.

I'VE NEVER HAD A BURNING desire to getaway to Malaysia. It has just never grabbed me as a holiday destination.

Thailand has the best beaches, Vietnam and Cambodia and Laos are more of an adventure, and Indonesia is more fascinating – or so I thought. But I've just come back from a two-week family holiday in Malaysia and I think it's my new favourite place.

THE WHY It's Clean

For Asia – always a proviso – it's clean. Rubbish gets collected. It's not stinky, it's not slimy, it's not grotty. Coming from Cambodia, it's a good break from some of the day to day frustrations of living in this charming but slightly dysfunctional place.

It's Organised

Flights leave on time, taxis have seatbelts, hire cars have baby seats, restaurants have hi-chairs. Traffic is ordered (for Asia). There are even pedestrian crossings in KL.

The Food is Safe

This is a biggie. We ate at street stalls and hawker centres for our entire 2-week holiday. None of us had even a touch of tummy trouble. And the food is wonderful!

It's Diverse

We spent a week in Penang, a few days in Langkawi and a couple of days in KL. It was a wonderful mix of eating, sightseeing, eating, going to the beach, eating and then shopping.

KL

Big cities with small kids can be a mission. However, websites that offer cheap rooms expand the accommodation options to make it easier. We ended up in a two bedroom, self contained, serviced apartment in a good hotel, with a kids' pool and three restaurants. It was a five minute walk to the upmarket Pavilion shopping centre, 10 minutes to the main drag of Bukit Bintang which is crammed with

restaurants and about 15 minutes walk to the wonderful hawker food along Jalan Alor. We found the skytrain fun and easy even with a pram (although we had to carry it up the stairs). We took the train to Chinatown and to the wonderful Indian night market at Kampung Baru. Two days in KL were easily filled with shopping, eating, wandering Chinatown and an afternoon at the amazing, indoor amusement park at Times Square.

Malaysia is a great family destination. It's simple, easy, and that is a holiday. Oh and did I mention – the food is divine!

PENANG

Penang is a striking mix of old and new. It's an island connected by bridge to the Western side of mainland Malaysia and is less than an hour's flight from Kuala Lumpur. The Penang airport is about 45 minutes to an hour from the main city of Georgetown and the main tourist beach area of Batu Ferringhi beyond.

Penang was the first of the British settlements in Malaysia. It's capital, Georgetown, is a mix of old Chinese shop houses, colonial buildings and massive apartment blocks. While there are some high-rise eyesores, its strength is in its contrasts. The old town is a World Heritage Area crammed with historic buildings, old temples and charm. The tiny streets are wonderful to walk around or you can take a trishaw and be cycled along the evocative little alleyways. There are some wonderful old buildings, many of which were the homes of merchants from days gone by. A number of the larger, more glamorous homes have been done up, notably Cheong Fatt Tze Mansion which is an 1880s Chinese merchant house, now a hotel. Pinang Peranakan Mansion is another which has been opened to tourists and filled with the furniture and accoutrements of a wealthy Nonya family of the late 19th century. You can fantasize about living in

its ornate rooms or taking tea in the central courtyard – divine.

The best thing to do in Georgetown is to walk. The small streets lend themselves to wandering and discovering. We saw men making noodles, others painting lanterns for Chinese New Year and women hanging incense sticks. Chinatown and Little India are full of colour and if you get sick of that there's the historic, colonial district to explore where Captain Light stepped ashore at Fort Cornwallis in the 1780s. There's an atmospheric old cemetery and the divine Eastern and Oriental Hotel opened by the Sarkies brothers before they opened the Raffles in Singapore. It's a wonderful place for high tea.

Penang's main beach area Batu Ferringhi has shades of Bali in days gone by. It's a little frayed and the jellyfish discourage swimming but the beach is a lovely spot for a sundowner.

Our most relaxing afternoons were spent beer in hand while

our kids built sandcastles at our feet. Now that's a holiday. There's a night market along the main street every evening, mainly filled with sarongs and tacky watches but it's worth a wander.

The key reason to visit Batu Ferringhi is to eat. The main hawker centre has a phenomenal array of incredible food; curry, roti, seafood, laksa, noodles and rice, all for a couple of dollars to feed a family.

In fact, Penang is renowned for its food and I can't say I've been anywhere better when it comes to eating. It's an incredible fusion of Malay, Chinese and Indian influences – just mouthwatering.

LANGKAWI

Langkawi is a short flight or a 2 and a half hour ferry trip from Penang. I had slightly low expectations because I've heard mixed reports about the island which attracts more tourists than anywhere else in Malaysia. I was pleasantly surprised. The main beach of Pantai Cenang is clean and white and wide. The big expanse of sand is lovely. There's plenty of space for the kids to run and play and the water is clean despite being the busiest spot on the island. The hotels are all low rise and the sun sets straight over the water.

We stayed two minutes away from the beach in a wonderful hotel called Temple Tree which is made up of old houses that have been relocated from all over Malaysia. For the four of us we had the top floor of an old house with two bedrooms, an antique wooden bath and a wonderful living area with open shutters looking out onto swaying palms. As far as family accommodation goes, it was fabulous.

I do think the success of a trip to Langkawi depends on where you stay so choose carefully because there are lots of package hotels.

If you want to splash out the best beaches are at the Northern end of the island. It's worth lunch at least at either the Datai or Andaman Hotel just so you can swim at the pristine beach afterwards. If you can afford to stay here, lap up the luxury and the location. The hotels are nestled in amazing rainforest that extends right down to the wonderful beach and clear water. (The Andaman has a great kids' pool too.) The only downside of these resorts is that they're about half an hour from the main beach if you want to go shopping or have dinner.

All in all Langkawi was a fabulous, family friendly holiday spot. The kids enjoyed it, particularly the renowned cable car up to the second highest peak on the island. Frankly, I found it terrifying!

Year of the Big Cat

Will reminisces about the joys, and the pains, of Khmer New Year.



ACCORDING TO THE WISE elders of Cambodian society, the three days of Khmer New Year are dedicated to offering thanks to the Buddha, honouring their ancestors and helping the poor. While these are noble traditions, in practice they seem to be expressed by throwing water and corn starch at passing motorists.

This all seemed alien to me at first. Growing up in a privacyminded middle-class white American nuclear family, going door to door to sing Christmas carols was considered too obtrusive. My parents taught me to consider trick or treating on Halloween a deeply suspicious activity.

So it was surprising to find strangers celebrating a sacred holiday by hurling powder and liquid at me as I pedalled by. The holiday also imbues many Cambodian teens with a feeling if invulnerability, so they're willing to run in front of your motorcycle — if you're so equipped — to more accurately lob a fistful of corn starch. The fact that this might well blind the driver and render him unable to avoid the prankster never seems to come up.

Despite the chaos, Khmer New Year is the best time for many to experience Phnom Penh. Almost every Cambodian heads to their ancestral homeland during the holiday, and because almost nobody is actually from Phnom Penh, the city empties out. Traffic, if you can avoid the occasional mob of celebrants, is light. Even the police officers clear the streets – that is, if they have made enough from other unfortunate motorists in the days preceding the holidays.

Even some of the foreigners take the option to leave, in a metaphorical or literal sense. A surprising number of the foreign English teachers spend most of the holiday in a drunken stupor, while the better-paid NGO advisers jet off to vacations in other parts of the world.

If you're married to a Cambodian, you'll likely be drafted into a trip to the ancestral homeland.

There you'll be introduced to the parts of Khmer culture

that Hollywood doesn't make movies about. This includes about a dozen traditional games played with "ang kungh" seeds, which serve no purpose other than producing shade trees and inflicting horrific pain in the player's extremities. The rules to these games are complicated and only hastily explained to foreigners, mainly because any fails in the game means the winner gets to smack the loser in the knee, shoulder or head with the seed.

Cambodians love hitting foreigners in the knees with seeds. (If you are a teacher, you shouldn't play this game with your students. Not if you value your ability to use your knees.) Once it gets out that a foreigner has come to the village to play traditional games, youngsters from surrounding villages will flock to you, just to get a crack at cracking your knees. They won't hold back against a white person, because it's commonly held that white people don't feel pain. Retaliation is not advised. Failing to elicit the right sound from the seeds when knocking someone else's knee just earns you more blows against your knees.


Gambling is another fun Khmer New Year pastime. This is something you probably shouldn't try unless you don't mind losing money or can understand "Change the rules so the long nose loses" in Khmer.

For us, the closest Cambodian Buddhist temple is in Beaverton, Ore., a suburb of Portland. The Khmer New Year ceremony is appropriately solemn. There are traditional dances. There's no water or powder being hurled about. The strongest attraction is the traditional cakes that enterprising Cambodians sell at the temple during the holidays.

It's quite dull, but exceedingly proper. My parents would like it. Susasdei Chnam Chmaa Tom!
